

There is a story of a priest who was returning to his rectory one evening when he was accosted by a robber, who pulled a gun and said, "Your money or

your life!" As the priest reached into his coat pocket, the robber saw his Roman collar and said, "I see you're a priest. Never mind. You can go." The priest tried to reciprocate by offering the robber a candy bar he remembered was in his pocket. The robber replied, "No thank you, Father. I don't eat candy during Lent."

We tend to think of those who practice the disciplines of Lent as being somehow more perfect than others. We think they are people who don't fall to temptation and sin. Yet, that is exactly what Lent is all about; to remind us that we all fall short. We all have something that we must get rid of in our lives if we are to be the people God intends for us to be.

In the season of Lent, we have the opportunity to examine ourselves honestly before God and seek to live according to God's law of love toward all. I hope during this season, you are following one of several of the disciplines, involved in study of God's word, and being transformed into the likeness of Christ. And then, we can celebrate together the resurrection of Christ and the newness of all of our lives.





OUR ANNUAL TOURNAMENT GAME/ PARKING EXTRAVAGANZA FUND RAISERS!

ReFocus Effort





On February 26, 2011, Summit Meeting 2 was held. Participants reviewed and discussed results from a community survey our church members conducted last year. We learned what our neighbors seek in their daily lives from our schools, from our elected officials and governing bodies, and from local churches. They conveyed concerns with the integrity and vitality of our community and what voids need filled or opportunities need developed in growing prosperity among young and old alike. In preparation for this meeting, we also interviewed our leaders in local government and school district. From these surveys and discussions we determined 1) Who lives in our community and who attends St. Paul's; 2) The nature of our visitors and new members. This led us to examine who we minister to, how we change lives, and where we stand in the community. Video clips from movies 'Patch Adams' and 'Sister Act' helped inspire theories of mission and strategic values at St. Paul's. When common elements of these theories were examined, substantial impact areas appeared for use in a Vision Statement drafted by the Team. First draft of the Vision Statement:

> St. Paul's vision is for the Elida Community to be led to Christ Through words and deeds enabling senior citizens to feel valued, youth to have purpose, and families to be nurtured and supported.

On March 26, 2011, Summit 3 will explore ministry structure, goals, and strategic initiatives for follow-up and implementation during an April Leadership Retreat. The end result is to transform our vision into reality by impacting lives and supporting our community. All are welcome to join us as we refocus St. Paul's for the future.





Holy Week

Each year, the Christian church reviews the events leading up to Jesus' death and resurrection in a series of special days called Holy Week. The story of Jesus' suffering and death is difficult for people of all ages; still, it is at the heart of the Christian faith. Take time to experience the emotions of these Holy Week events together with others.



Palm Sunday Matthew 21:1-11

In some congregations, this is called Palm/Passion Sunday because the service begins with a telling of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem and then later, the entire story of Jesus' death is read, which is sometimes called "the passion." The Jewish people in Jesus' time had been waiting over 500 years for a king. The Hebrew prophets had said God's promised messiah would govern Israel and also bring peace on earth and reconciliation with God. Many in the crowd expected Jesus to lead a revolt to overthrow the Romans and reestablish the kingdom of Israel, but the crowds would learn that Jesus was very different than the messiah they expected.


Maundy Thursday John 13:1-17, 31b-35

On this night, during a celebration of the Passover, Jesus knelt to wash the feet of his disciples. After this meal Jesus also shared the last supper with his disciples - a meal we still remember and celebrate today in Holy Communion.



Good Friday John 18:1--19:42

For Christians, Good Friday is one of the saddest days of the year. The same people who had shouted "Hosanna!" on Palm Sunday now cried "Crucify him!" This day of sorrow reminds us that even in impossible situations God can bring life and hope.



Easter Sunday John 20:1-18

In the joy of Easter morning, the darkness of Jesus' death is turned to light and his wrongful death is turned to new life for all God's children. Easter celebrates new life, new joy, and new possibilities. This is a special Easter greeting you can share with friends and family!

One: Alleluia! Christ is risen.
All: Christ is risen indeed.



Palm Sunday... reminds us that at the moment of what seems to be the height of Jesus' public acceptance also begins the process of His public betrayal, His public failure, His public abandonment. Only in the mind of God is Jesus any longer a success, it seems... Here in the Passion narrative we trace the struggle, one scene at a time, between the Word of God and the ways of the world.

Missions Committee Report

The St. Paul's Missions Committee met February 15, 2011. Actions from that meeting and other Missions activities:

- Marty, Kathy, and AJ White participated in Family Promise at Elida I.U.M. Friday, March 11. They
 provided an evening meal to a mother and her three children and joined with a couple from I.U.M.
 for evening entertainment activities;
- Our congregation hosted the February 5, 2011, breakfast meeting of the Lima Area Methodist Men (L.A.M.M.) Many of our members provided the menu items; Corinne Piper and Mary Grigsby helped with the breakfast set-up and service to meeting attendees. Tim Piper is our church liaison to this group;
- Allentown U.M.C. Pastor Neal Whitney reported to Tim Piper that the Five Loaves Food Pantry headquartered at Allentown U.M.C. is serving approx. 200 families each month, up from about 110 families one year ago. St. Paul's pantry donations, handled by Tim and the Sdaos, remain remarkable and steady;
- Jamie Wyant made a motion, seconded by Greg Schade during said Feb.15 meeting that our congregation, through its Missions Committee, donate \$220 or four \$55 scholarships to Camp Sierra Linda, Monterey, Mexico for its 2011 camp season. This camp and a related construction mission trip to re-build portions of it, are mission priorities of our Northwest Plains District this year. If you are interested in attending the July, 2011, Mexico construction mission trip, see Tim Piper or Marty White. Cost, including air and ground transportation, lodging, meals, and taxes is \$1,100;
- Slone Whetstone arranged for a presentation to our congregation during the March 6, 2011, service by a leader of the local Meals 'Til Monday non-profit organization. It was reported that over 75 sacked meals are prepared every Monday and distributed every Friday. Distributions initially were limited to Elida School District but now extend into Perry School District. Annual cost per child is \$120. Part of our 2010 Christmas offering went to this local mission;
- Jamie Wyant built a handicap ramp by himself during December, 2010. He stated it was a small ramp which didn't require additional assistance. As for the other two proposed ramp projects he advertized during a December Sunday service, Marimor funding hasn't arrived yet so these two projects are still on hold;
- Our annual summer mission trip to the Worthington United Methodist Children's home has been cancelled. Todd Hanes has declined leadership of on-site logistics and finances because of financial and personnel problems that have caused the home to drop its residential program. No one has agreed to step into Todd's former leadership position and for St. Paul's to attempt such leadership at this late date in February would be heroic to say the least. The Committee is looking into other mission work week options at present.





When Is Easter?

Every year the date of Easter changes. The main reason is that unlike holidays which are tied to specific dates, Easter always falls on a Sunday. Also, because the events of Jesus' death and resurrection occurred in the context of the Jewish Passover festival (remember, Jesus and the disciples were Jewish), the date follows the Jewish pattern of being tied to the lunar calendar.

Easter Sunday is always the first Sunday after the first full moon on or after March 21, the vernal equinox, or the first day of spring in the Northern Hemisphere.

Thus, Easter can fall anywhere in between March 22 and April 25.

To add to the confusion, Eastern churches (such as Russian and Greek Orthodox) use a slightly different calendar, and their Easter is about two weeks after the date celebrated by Western churches.

Several proposals have been raised throughout history to arrive at a fixed date, but none of them have taken off. The most recent occurred in 2001 when Eastern and Western dates coincided for the first time in centuries.

There is one major advantage to having the date change each year. As Christians we are called to follow Jesus and that often means being out of step with the rest of the world. When we follow a calendar that is just a little out of step, it reminds us of the call to challenge the direction the world may be going. The floating date of Easter can help us remember and celebrate this.
