



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We're all searching for the Truth.


Sometimes the search is easy — simply type the question into Google and the answer pops up. But, sometimes, our questions are complicated and the answers are difficult

I hope this spring finds you well,





Mexico Mission

Eyeglass Mission Report By Corinne Piper



For most of us, getting a pair of glasses is an every day, if expensive, task. But in many parts of the world, obtaining glasses is beyond people's means or availability. This is one more reason people are mired in poverty.

Enter **VOSH/International** (Volunteer Optometric Services to Humanity) "a Non-Profit Organization on a Mission to bring Vision to Every Person on the Planet. The Voice of Optometry in Developing Nations Since 1971... Approximately 670 million

people worldwide are functionally blind or visually impaired because they do not have a pair of eyeglasses."

Tim and I were privileged to be part of a VOSH—Alabama trip to Colima, Colima State, Mexico, February 19 through 28, 2016. We joined 28 others from around the eastern U.S. and hosted by five Lions Clubs in Colima as part of a short-term clinic to evaluate the vision of 2068 people in four days and provide several hundred pairs of recycled glasses (from the --- pairs that were sent ahead). By partnering with local Lions clubs, sustainable programs and local optometric capacity are developed in the communities as well


Traveling with us were two ophthalmologists and an optomotrist who provided more extensive visual evaluations when needed. These examinations found 61 cataracts, 11 pterygiums (a growth in the eye caused by sun damage), 9 retinal and 6 glaucoma problems which will receive additional care. Thirty-seven special glasses will be made with the \$750 our group donated. More than 2500 sunglasses were given out to help protect people from further sun damage.

VOSH-International's goal is "to eradicate untreated refractive error-that is-to help people see again by correcting their vision with glasses. And once they can see, they can improve the quality of their lives and their own vision for a future for generations to come." Tim and I look forward to returning to Western Mexico next year to continue working toward that goal.

Spotlight On Seniors



Meet Hazel Dunn and Evelyn Sarber. Evelyn has been a member of St. Paul's since 1961. Both were born in American Township. Hazel was born on October 13, 1919, and Evelyn was born 3 days later on October 16. Hazel lived on N. Cable Road and Evelyn lived on Diller Road. Their mothers were sisters from PA who married brothers from OH. Hazel was the 2nd born in her family of 3 girls and 3 boys. Evelyn was in the middle of her family of 4 girls and 1 boy. They call themselves double cousins.

They each lived on a farm and walked to school. They attended the Ash Grove School until the 8th grade. The school was located west of the Ash Grove Church that is at the intersection of N. Cable, Beery, and Gomer Roads. Hazel's family raised pigs on their farm and once Hazel had to take some pigs to another farm on her walk to school. There was no water at the school, so the students had to walk to Ash Grove Church to get water. After the 8th grade they attended Elida High School. Their township school ran out of money when Evelyn was in the 8th grade, so the children had to attend a local school, with a different teacher every 2 weeks.

Hazel worked at Westinghouse after high school, where she met her husband, Bill. Westinghouse later transferred Bill to Florida, Cleveland, and Marion, OH. Hazel has one daughter, LaDean, by a previous marriage, who lives in the state of Delaware. Hazel also worked at the Marion, OH, library. After Bill passed away, Hazel moved back to Lima and lived at Gatehouse Apartments. She now lives at Lima Manor.

Evelyn attended Northwestern School of Commerce in downtown Lima after high school. She worked for 3 years at Thomas Communion Service Co., known as the "biggest little business in the world." They supplied and promoted the use of individual glass communion cups and finished wooden offering plates to churches all over the world. Evelyn also worked at the National Bank for 5 yrs. and parttime at the YMCA for 10 years, before starting to work at Standard Oil BP. She retired from Standard Oil in 1985, after 30 years of service. The very next year she began volunteering at St. Rita's Medical Center, where she continues to do so today. She met her husband, Frank, at the National Bank, and married him on January 13, 1945. Frank passed away in 1960. Evelyn's son, John, and his wife, Susan, live in Columbus, OH.

When asked about the most exciting place they had traveled, without hesitation, they both agreed it was their trip to visit their mothers' relatives in Waynesboro, PA, when they were 13 years old. They went on Memorial Day and didn't return to OH until Labor Day. They went to their church's annual meeting in Dayton, OH. Their Uncle Paul Hess had come to the meeting from PA. He took Hazel and Evelyn back to PA with him. Their parents gave each of

them \$5 to spend while they were gone. They spent time with their grandparents and many aunts, uncles and cousins. On the first night there was a bad storm that broke the glass in the window in their bedroom. After spending a couple of days with their grandparents, they went to live with Aunt Annie and Uncle Will who lived in an old stone house on a farm. They had to help on the farm by gathering sheaves of wheat. Their relatives lived in the area of PA that had big hills. Hazel and Evelyn learned to ride a bicycle in those hills. More than once they landed in the ditch.

They went from Waynesboro, PA, to Winchester, VA, riding in the rumble seat of a sports coupe driven by a cousin living in Philadelphia, PA, to stay with Uncle Willis and Aunt Elizabeth. Uncle Willis and Aunt Elizabeth managed the large Wertz cherry and apple orchard where annually the cherry blossom parade was held. Here, along with 5 more cousins in that family, they picked cherries early in the morning until they filled a gallon bucket and stopped for the day as they had earned \$1. In the afternoon they hitched up the old mule and a riding horse to an old wagon that had a brake on it. It was not common in our area of Ohio for a wagon to have a brake. They drove the wagon to Winchester to buy an ice cream cone for 5 cents. The horse and mule knew the way and always gave them a fast ride home!

Uncle Willis had a Model A Ford and one day 7 kids went to Washington, D.C., in that Ford, from pre-school age to 15 years. The 15 year old cousin drove them. While in D.C., they visited The Smithsonian Institute, Washington Monument, White House, Tomb of the Unknown Soldier, Mt. Vernon and more. They walked, or ran, to the top of the Washington Monument. Hazel won!

They also went to visit Uncle Willis' wife's family in Lancaster, PA, for 2 weeks. There they went shopping for a swim suit for Atlantic City, NJ. Eight of them went to Atlantic City in a Buick open touring car. While there they had a picnic, swam in the Atlantic Ocean, found out there really is salt in ocean water, walked on the boardwalk, and ate salt water taffy.

At a later date they had a great time at Hershey Amusement Park and Gettysburg. On Memorial Day, Hazel's parents drove to PA and brought the girls back home to Ohio, through the Shenandoah Valley of Virginia where their Grandfather Miller was born and married. What an exciting summer they had. As they both said, "No grass ever grew under our feet!"

Evelyn visits Hazel every day but Saturday and takes her for a ride in her car on Sunday afternoon. Evelyn manages to slide Hazel into her car and put her wheel chair in the car when they go out to eat!

What a delight it is to visit these two interesting ladies and listen to their stories about their adventures while growing up. Spend time with them and you, too, will be entertained!

Congratulations



Congrats to Reggie McAdams and the Akron Zips for a fine basketball season. Akron finished with a record of 26-9, winning the MAC regular season and finishing runners-up in the MAC tournament losing on a last second shot by Buffalo. Akron played Ohio State in the N.I.T., playing them even-up in regulation, but lost in overtime 72-63. Reggie has been named a Second-Team All-MAC selection, and is the Zips' third leading scorer with 400 points with an 11.4 points per game average. He ranks 38th in the NCAA for 3-point FG made, he had 98 three-point baskets this year, tops in the MAC, hitting 41% of his 3's! Reggie was 39th for 3-point FG percentage, and 47th for 3-point FG made per game (2.77). For his career, Reggie scored 975 points for the Zips. Congratulations to Reggie, and to Vickie and Brent who went to guite a few ballgames! We are proud of you! Good luck in finishing your Civil Engineering degree!

SHAVING CREAM EARTH


God created this wonderful world and told us to care for it. Remember that by making a unique painting.

What you need:

- A cookie sheet
- White shaving cream
- A wooden craft stick
- Paint (blue and green)
- A straw
- A paper plate

What you do:

- 1. On the cookie sheet, spray shaving cream in a circle (the same size as the bottom of the paper plate). Smooth it out with the craft stick.
- 2. Squirt the blue and green paint on top of the shaving cream in loopy, squiggly patterns. Swirl the paint around with the straw.
- 3. Place the bottom of the paper plate on top of the paint. Press it down gently so the whole plate bottom is covered in paint.
- 4. Lift up the plate and gently remove excess shaving cream with the stick.
- 5. After the painting dries, hang it on your wall.

A Shepherd's Role


While traveling in Iran, writer Eric Bishop asked a villager about an earthen enclosure topped with dry thorns. The man said sheep stayed in the round space at night for safety. "What are the thorns for?" Bishop asked. "If a wolf tries to break in and attack the sheep," the man replied, "he'll knock against the thorns, and they'll make a noise, and the shepherd will wake up and drive off the wolf."

The English word character comes from Greek for a sharp-pointed instrument. Much of this original meaning is implied in the word as we use it, for isn't character the means by which we make an impression on the world? To be sure, the instrument itself is not a finished product

Pointing out the enclosure's doorless entrance, Bishop asked why a wolf wouldn't just enter there. Because, replied the villager, "that's where the shepherd sleeps; the shepherd is the door."

Suddenly Bishop understood why in John 10 Jesus calls himself first the door, or gate, for the sheep and then the Good Shepherd. Because Jesus is the shepherd, he's also the door that keeps us, his sheep, safe within his care.
