

Let's extend a Christian welcome to those who seek a church home, so that they will make St. Paul's their church home.



Immediate strategies to block gambling

For 19 years the Ohio Council of Churches, the United Methodist Church and tens of thousands of others in the faith community have successfully stopped predatory gambling from entering the state of Ohio with slot machines and casinos. Some next steps being taken to continue to ensure that slot machines and casinos do not open to prey upon the citizens of Ohio include:

Ask the Ohio Supreme Court to declare the current slot machine proposal unconstitutional on several grounds.

Mobilize the millions of Ohioans who have voted 4 times against slot machines to engage in a grassroots campaign to block the installation of slot machines at race-tracks.

Educate our church members and other citizens about the political cowardice and narrow self interests that led current elected officials to sacrifice the wellbeing of Ohio families to predatory gambling.

Demand that the Ohio General Assembly and the Governor enact additional sources of revenue to adequately care for the wellbeing of the citizens of Ohio in this new biennium without slot machines.

Work at the municipal and county levels to slow down the installation of slot machines at racetracks until this proposal is overturned by the Supreme Court and/or withdrawn by the governor and General Assembly.

CHANGE IS COMING

Community Survey



Over a year ago, a special ad-hoc committee was appointed by Ad Council to conduct a community survey that will help us to determine who our neighbors are and what are their needs. The survey was planned over a year ago, but the amazing (God thing?) is that as we begin to move into the second phase of ReFocus, a community survey is a part of the work that needs to be accomplished in order to

develop a strategic plan.

The committee has determined the questions we will use, a brochure is being developed by Judy Chaffins, and a trial survey is scheduled. What we need now are people who will help conduct the survey. Tim Piper has divided the village north of the railroad tracks into thirty sections; see map in the library. We are asking for thirty volunteers to partner with each other and canvass two sections each. One volunteer will be the speaker, the other will be the recorder. So, if you would like to help, but don't feel comfortable talking to people door to door, but can record answers, we can still use your help.

The Community Survey Task Force has the survey, and it was tested on June 13th by Pastor Ruth and Linda Craft. We found that people are very willing to talk with us, and share their thoughts and ideas. We are hoping to complete the survey before the weather turns cold and the days become shorter. It is important to do this work as a part of the upcoming tasks for the ReFocus Summits we will be offering this winter. A sample of the survey is in this edition of the newsletter for you to consider. A training will be scheduled for completing the Community Survey when we get some teams of two persons signed up for each section of the village.

Annual Conference

REPORT FROM 2009 WEST OHIO UM ANNUAL CONFERENCE

At Lakeside Worship and Business were two main parts of the experience of the 2009 West Ohio United Methodist Annual Conference. Monday morning included Communion. One of the featured speakers was Pastor Junius Dotson – Sr. Pastor of Saint Mark UMC. He was featured Monday morning and Tuesday afternoon. He was an inspirational speaker. **Junius Dotson** was ordained to the ministry of the United Methodist Church in June, 1992. In 1996, he responded to the challenge of beginning a new and innovative church in the Silicon Valley, Genesis United Methodist Church. Currently thousands of people, from Wichita and beyond, gather each Sunday to hear the thought provoking, faith-filled messages of Pastor Junius Dotson.



Pastor Dotson is well prepared both spiritually and academically. He is a leader who responds to challenges and opportunities in new and creative ways. Pastor Dotson draws together people who share his vision for the future. He believes that effective ministry is about training, developing, and empowering leaders to establish ministries that address the needs of the "whole" person – body, mind and spirit.

On Tuesday we heard Sue Nilson Kibby – Executive Pastor, Ginghamsburg UMC. She was very interesting and included innovative ways in which they had encouraged their membership to become active in many ways at church. **Sue Nilson Kibbey** is an ordained Elder in the United Methodist Church. As Ginghamsburg Church's Executive Pastor, Sue teams with Senior Pastor Mike Slaughter to create and deploy the vision of the church, coordinates the senior management team, and serves as team leader for all discipleship staff (children, student and adult). Sue also leads human resource initiatives and teams with the senior staff on daily business functions/decisions.



As the creator of "Ministry by Strengths," which equips churches to deploy staff and unpaid servants into ministry, Sue serves as a trainer, consultant and coach to conferences and clergy gatherings across the country. Her book on the art of leading and managing the church, <u>Ultimately Responsible</u>, was released in Fall, 2006 (Abingdon Press). She has authored <u>Starting a Single Adult Ministry (Cook Communications)</u>, named the "Single Adult Ministry Book of the Year" by the National Association of Single Adult Leaders, as well as written for and edited <u>Transformation Journal</u>: Journey Through the Bible in a Year and Transformation Journal: A Daily Walk in the Word (both Abingdon Press).



Co-Teaching Pastor at the Wednesday morning Worship Service was Michael Slaughter. **Michael Slaughter** is Lead Pastor, Ginghamsburg UMC. He is the three decade dreamer of Ginghamsburg Church and spiritual entrepreneur of ministry marketplace innovations. His life-long passion to reach the lost and set the oppressed free has now made him a tireless and leading advocate for the displaced children, women, and men of Darfur, Sudan, named by the UN as the worst humanitarian crisis in the world today.

Under Mike's leadership, Ginsghamsburg Church has become known as an early innovator of small group ministry, the Church "media reformation" and cyber ministry, with the Ginghamsburg website averaging 50,000 visits monthly from around the world. Since initiating The Sudan Project in January, 2005, Ginghamsburg has invested over \$3.7 million into humanitarian relief in Darfur. The resultant agricultural project, child development program, and safe water initiative are expanding to reach a quarter of a million Sudanese refugees and villagers. As a mentor, Mike travels globally to speak and use his "gift of irritation" to equip ministry leaders to minimize brick and maximize mission to that they may fully

deploy the mission of Jesus into the world. Mike is also the author of multiple books for church leaders. Visit <u>www.mikeslaughter.com</u> for more information. These three speakers had inspiring messages.



Featured guest performers were the Hope for Africa Children's Choir. This group was amazing . When they performed there was constant joyful movement and song. They performed several times during different services and on Tuesday evening they were outdoors at the Gazebo. There were also a liturgical dance group, a praise group and other special solo's along with short ministry moments to add to the worship experience.



On the business side were the reports, Constitutional Amendments, and recommendations to be brought to the conference. There were 32 Amendments to the Constitution. These were Voted by the General Conference April-May, 2008. and passed, by 2/3 vote. These proposed changes require further approval at annual conferences the following year. So they were presented to our Annual Conference for vote. The 32 amendments were grouped into 5 groups, for discussion. Group 1 (amendments 4, 10, 23, & 26) are related to the world-wide nature of the UMC. Group 2 (amendments 3, 5, 7, 11, 12, 13, 14, 16, 18, 20, 21, 24, 25, 27, 28, 29, 30, 31, & 32) are also related to the world-wide nature of the church but deal primarily with a name change, which if approved would need this name change in these related portions of the constitution. Group 3 is a single (amendment #1) proposing a change in the language defining the availability of the ministry of the church to all persons. Group 4 is a single (amendment # 19) related to who is able to vote for delegates to General and Jurisdictional Conferences. Group 5 contains seven (amendments 2, 6, 8, 9, 15, 17, & 22) which are unrelated and were discussed together.

At the end of discussion, ballots were distributed and voted. Before the end of conference we were given the results. Only amendments 8, 9, 17, 19, and 22 were passed. There were some heartfelt disappointments voiced on the failure of our conference to pass amendment #1. We will not know the final outcome on these amendments until all annual UM area conferences are completed and all conference votes counted.

There were 9 recommendations. Recommendation #1 was about Healthcare. Recommendation #2 was for No Casinos in Ohio. Recommendation #3 was concerning program "Strength for Today, Bright Hope for Tomorrow" which involves developing principled Christian leaders for the church and the world. Recommendation #4 concerned Council on Finance and Administration Recommendations. Recommendation #5 concerned the Central Conference Pension Fund. Recommendation #6 was a resolution on Investigation Companies Supporting the Occupation of Palestinian Territories. Recommendation #7 was on the Episcopal Residence Committee Report. Recommendation #8 was on Board of Pension and Health Benefits. Recommendation #9 was about the Commission on Equitable Compensation. (for clergy). After various discussions all were approved. There were 2615 delegates at conference. There were over 10,000 school kits collected. The Love First Offering by end of conference amounted to \$370, 185.00. The next West Ohio UMC conference will be June 6-10, 2010.



Roll the sau- sage and cheese up in the noodle. Place in pan. Repeat until done. Pour rest of sauce over top of rolls. Cover with foil and bake for 35 min. Bake uncovered for 15 more minutes.
