

Marla and I have served in prisons all over the state of Ohio in both Kairos and Epiphany ministries. I feel called to use my experience to help launch Kairos here in Lima, if you want to know more you can google Kairos Ministry or talk to me. There will be more information in the weeks to come but for all you bakers this is your warning to be prepared to make cookies. As part of this ministry we share God's love by giving each inmate a dozen cookies and if I did the math right that means the team will have to take in almost 20,000 cookies that weekend. Don't start baking just yet because there are rules, a lot of rules, it is a prison after all and I will be providing directions as soon as I get them.

So stay cool and enjoy the end of summer.

Between 10-12 percent of people on earth are "lefties." Women are about 4 percent more likely to be right-handed than men.


At various times in history, left-handedness has been seen as many things: a nasty habit, a sign of rebellion, a trait indicating creativity and musical abilities.

Missions





golf, of which all proceeds go to the Bradley Joseph Memorial fund. **Shirley** showed up the men by sinking a shot on hole number one to complete an eagle for the hole. Congrats to our whole team for participating!

Norm Grigsby, Jamie Wyant, Sue Theodore, and Tim Piper volunteered to help with the outing selling raffle tickets and participating with various games at different holes on the course. The amount raised by the golf outing has not been totaled but John Fleming, Brad's Uncle who runs the outing, will let us know the total amount raised for missions in a few weeks. Thanks to all who volunteered for this worthwhile mission.

Brad Joseph was a member of our St. Paul's congregation until he was tragically killed in a car accident in the fall of 2007. Brad was our youth director, sang in the Chancel Choir, took care of our church computers and participated in various mission trips. Perhaps his favorite mission was going six years in a row to the United Methodist Medical Mission in Progresso Nuevo, Mexico, where, as a pharmacist, he filled prescriptions for the poor people that were served on the mission. The golf outing is held annually by Brad's family to raise money to send medical interns on medical missions all over the world. Praise God for the life of Brad Joseph and for his family honoring him and God by the mission work being funded by his memorial fund!










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The Business of Church



As promised during Stewardship Season 2013, a quarterly update shall be conveyed to the congregation regarding Building Fund activity and account balance. Including the carryover from 2013, the Building Fund stands at \$19,767.08 as of June 30, 2014. There was no activity during second quarter 2014. To date, \$5,771 has been expensed from the Building Fund – new sanctuary carpet earlier this year.

Capital Improvement account balance stands at \$2,370 as of June 30, 2014. A west entrance door was replaced using \$650 from this account. Parsonage repair expenses totaled \$811.99 at June 30, 2014, most remarkable being a new dishwasher for \$569.00. Total Parsonage Repair budget is \$2,000.

General Building, Equipment, Maintenance expense at June 30, 2014 is \$1,851.10. Most remarkable expenses involved painting, elevette inspection, and three outside door repairs. Total budget for Building, Equipment, Maintenance handled by the Board of Trustees is \$4,000.

Expenses which will be paid during the remainder of 2014 are recently completed new water line hook-ups at the parsonage and church including new expansion tanks, meters, valves, outside faucets, and misc. piping. The utility sink in the kitchen has been removed and the floor drain plugged with cement to cure a major source of basement flooding. The cabinet island in the kitchen has been trashed due to excessive flood damage and will be replaced. The east-side parking lot and driveway will be sealed. Sanctuary window painting is long overdue and is scheduled for this year. Ceiling tiles were replaced in the new library. New windows will be installed in the parsonage basement. Tuck point estimates have been secured for the sanctuary and parsonage; however, the \$20,000 estimate will require significant planning and budget analysis. The Trustees have been and will be busy and the Building Fund monies will be put to good use.


Year-to-date June 30, 2014 General Operating Fund Receipts totaled \$89,998.93 and Disbursements \$84,291.79 for positive cash flow of \$5,707.14. For six months ended June 30, 2013, General Operating Fund Receipts were \$90,041.36 and Disbursements \$80,312.30 for positive cash flow of \$9,729.06. The mortgage was paid off during July, 2013. During first quarter 2013, St. Paul's received an anonymous gift of \$10,000 to be applied to the principle of the mortgage.

Aside from Trustee financial activities described above, the Nurture Committee (ice cream social, graduation, and Mother's Day) and Sr. Citizen Re-Focus (monthly meetings) initiative have been most active financially. For the Camp Wesley 2014 Mission project, St. Paul's pledged and paid \$ 2,000 toward this endeavor of which \$969 was collected from the congregation and \$1,171 taken from the Missions budget. The excess \$140 was for meals expense for the various work week-ends. In general, all Program Ministry Committees should be commended for excellent cost containment and budget control during the first half of 2014, especially since we had to absorb extraordinary utility expenses related to the frigid first quarter 2014.

As of June 30, 2014, the new 40% seed/emergency fund portion of the Building Fund stands at \$976.44. The Memorial Fund has a current balance of \$2,262.73. Our two-year CDs representing our Permanent Endowment Fund just rolled over May, 2014, and the initial endowment of \$10,000 has now grown to \$14,576.10 (however, I am told there have been additions and subtractions to this fund since its inception in 1997.)

The Finance Committee has met every month thus far during 2014 except for May.



Jesus Feeds



Jesus Feeds, But We Remember

It is amazing how food is a catalyst for our memories. Sometimes when I sit down with my family to eat, my mind wanders back to other family meals of long ago. I remember vividly as a child the time my father asked my brother to pass the bread. My brother picked up a loaf of Wonder Bread and passed it to my dad - like a football. I also remembered what happened to my brother after that memorable stunt!

In a similar way, the church household gathers around the Lord's table and remembers the stories of our faith. We remember with gladness the reasons we are part of this church family called the body of Christ. We read Scripture and use these stories in worship to recall other important stories of faith. For example, the feeding of the 5,000 was so vital to the early church that it is the only miracle story common to all four of the Gospels.

In chapter 14, Matthew writes that when Jesus heard about the death of John the Baptist he withdrew to a deserted place to be alone. Unfortunately, Jesus was so popular with the people that they followed him, giving him little time to address his own grief over the death of John, his cousin and colleague. When Jesus saw the crowd, he had compassion for them and cured their sick. The healings lasted all day.

Near nightfall, the disciples asked Jesus to send the crowds home. The disciples' motive was an alleged concern for the people's hunger.

Jesus, however, instructed the disciples to give them something to eat. With only the meager resources of two fish and five loaves, the disciples seemed flustered. Jesus asked the disciples to bring him the loaves and fish and instructed the crowd to sit on the grass.

Jesus blessed the loaves and fish as he looked toward the heavens. I suppose each time we eat and give thanks over our food we enact this miracle of God's providence. After he broke the loaves, Jesus gave them to the disciples to distribute to the hungry crowd. Despite the disciples' apparent skepticism, Matthew writes that all ate and were filled; and they gathered 12 baskets full of broken pieces.

When we gather around the Lord's table, we hear the story of our faith. One of the great miracles of God is that God could gather us together, as alike or different as we may be, and we would dine together in the name of Jesus. When Jesus presided over the Passover meal with his disciples, he said to them as he says to us, "Do this in remembrance of me."

When we gather together to break the Lord's loaf, we also remember. We remember that God provided manna in the wilderness for the children of Israel. We remember our first Holy Communion, and we remember those intimate moments of communion on Christmas Eve or Maundy Thursday. Perhaps we even remember how God makes Jesus known in the breaking of bread. Whenever the church gathers to eat, the church also gathers to remember. We remember God's providence, and we remember that Jesus abides with us.

Memory is one of the most sacred gifts that God has given his human creatures. Certainly, the feeding of 5,000 is a wonderful thing. However, what may be even more extraordinary is the memories that this story summons for people of faith. It brings to recollection that God's providence is greater than any human need. God can and will feed all people, and after the feeding, there will be baskets left over.

Oatmeal Cake By Barb Schade **Ingredients Instructions** Cake: Cake: Preheat oven to 350 degrees. 1 1/2 cup Boiling water Mix the oatmeal and boiling water together. Set aside. Quick oatmeal 1 cup Cream the butter, eggs, white and brown sugar together. 1/2 cup (1 stick) Butter Add the flour, soda, cinnamon, salt and vanilla. Eggs Add the oatmeal mixture and mix well. Soda Melt butter, add milk, brown sugar, vanilla, nuts and coconut. Cinnamon 1 tsp. Spread the frosting over the warm cake and broil in oven until lightly browned. Salt 1/2 tsp. (watch carefully, it can get too brown very quickly.) Vanilla $1 \, 1/2 \, \text{tsp.}$ **Frosting:** Milk (or half & half) 3 Tbl 8 Tbl Butter (melted) Brown sugar 1 cup Vanilla 1 tsp. Pecan or walnut pieces 1 cup 1 cup Coconut



Seductive Melodies

For years, I thought I would like to sing in my church's choir. But for a variety of reasons, I didn't. Then we moved. And some of my new friends grabbed me by the arm and said, "We need you. Come join the choir." "Okay," I agreed. "but just for a few special occasions."

That was eight years ago. I'm still in the choir and loving it. But I've discovered something uncomfortable about myself.

I started when the choir graduated from singing folk songs to more complicated music. I have a fairly good ear for a melody. But I have trouble carrying a part when we sing harmony.

During rehearsal, I can learn the bass line just fine. But as soon as the women start singing the melody, it takes over. My voice involuntarily wanders off and chases that pesky melody.

It's hard to be different. A few people, I'm sure, enjoy dancing to a different drummer. But not most of us. Rather than swim against the current, we

usually prefer to go with the flow. After all, who wants to be known for not paying attention to what others are saying or doing? It implies a kind of egotism, a self-centered arrogance.

And yet, just like singing harmony in a choir, sometimes we have to do just that. We have to switch off the pressures of the world around us. Pressures to spend more, buy more, own more, accomplish more. Pressures to worship the almighty dollar, to ignore the poor and powerless, to climb the ladder of success no matter how many finders get stepped on. It's essential for at least a few people to sing an alternate tune.

The apostle Paul understood this, nearly 20 centuries ago. "Do not be conformed to this world," he wrote in his letter to the Romans, "but be transformed..." For someone who has trouble holding a part, it's a tough task.
