



## THE ReFOCUS PROCESS COMING JANUARY, 2011

A verse from the hymn, "What Gift Can We Bring?" sung on Consecration Sunday offers this thought: 'Give thanks for the past, for those who had vision,

Who planted and watered so dreams could come true.

Give thanks for the now, for study, for worship,

For mission that bids us turn prayer into deed.'

How did St. Paul's reach its position in the world, in our community today? Obviously our predecessors—those who passed through our doors and sat in our pews—had vision.

"The point is this: the one who sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and the one who

sows bountifully will also reap bountifully." 2 Corinthians 9:6

The seeds these people sowed, then nurtured, watered, and cultivated represent some of the bounty we enjoy today at St. Paul's. Through study, they set goals and priorities, meditated upon them, then 'turned prayer into deed.'

What is our prayer, our vision for the future of St. Paul's U.M.C.? Undoubtedly, it will involve change. We will apply our guiding convictions, values, and biblical purpose to explore and develop a vision, ministry structure, and strategic plan to re-discover or re-Focus God's purpose and calling for St. Paul's for impact within our community and for living our church's mission statement: "...to be an inviting community of Christ's disciples."

## CONSECRATION SUNDAY CELEBRATED

As part of the Consecration Sunday Program, we held a Leadership Dinner in our fellowship hall on November 9th. Around thirty of our church leaders and spouses attended the dinner and Reverend Jeff Motter, Assistant District Superintendent, was our guest speaker. Leading up to Consecration Sunday, we had Lay Speakers talk each of the three Sundays about what St. Paul United Methodist Church meant to them and how important it is to continue supporting our church so we may continue to serve God. Pastor Ruth Solo delivered a message on November 7th referencing Bible stories about God's blessings. Then, Consecration Sunday was held on November 14<sup>th</sup>, and Reverend Motter gave an inspirational message about how God has blessed each of us. A Victory Celebration catered luncheon held after the service was enjoyed by all who were present. Our Financial Secretary and Finance Chair reported that St. Paul's church received 42 pledges on commitment Sunday, for a total commitment of \$129,267. Motter for taking time to be our guest leader. And thank you to everyone who pledged for 2011 so that St. Paul's church may continue with God's work. ## ST. PAUL'S MISSIONS ACTIVITIES/COMMITTEE WORK SEPT./OCT., 2010

The 2010 Christmas Offering will be designated for i) Meals 'til Monday, and ii) St. Paul's Special Needs Fund;

**Tim Piper, Jamie Wyant**, and others attended the August Lima Area Methodist Men's breakfast August 28 at I.U.M. Jamie presented a report on the 2010 St. Paul's-led United Methodist Children's Home Mission Week this past July that was attended and supported by numerous other United Methodist churches in our area. Pastor Neal Whitney reported on the Allen County Fair's Kid's Fun Zone to which St. Paul's donated \$250. Elida Schools Superintendent Don Diglia reported on Meals 'til Monday initiative led by Allentown U.M.C. St. Paul's is attempting some degree of support as yet to be determined. Next L.A.M.M. meeting is Nov. 6 at Allentown U.M.C.;

**Maedene Holmes** led a very successful 2010 school & health kits campaign. She reported during the October 3 Sunday service that she and others packaged 31 school and four health kits September 30 for Pastor Ruth's delivery to the District Office in Ottawa October 1;

**Tim Piper** led St. Paul's efforts to support Family Promise Week at I.U.M. Oct. 10-17. St. Paul's had a few volunteers for evening care-giving and for meal preparation/donations;

October 29 was a fifth Friday and meant St. Paul's day at Our Daily Bread Soup Kitchen on Central Ave. in Lima. **The Mosers, Brunks, and Bill McKinney** represented St. Paul's this date as meal prep., servers, and clean-up volunteer personnel;

**Tim Piper and the Sdaos** are still leading a very strong 5 Loaves Food Pantry contribution by St. Paul's every month;

Marty White presented the annual Missions Committee report on Missions Sunday, September 29, prior to Linda Craft's Russian Mission trip report and slide show. With data supplied by Treasurer Gene Craft, Marty reported that for the period Sept. 2009 to Sept. 2010 St. Paul's gave approx. \$13,200 in support of any and all missions. This sum represents approx. 8% of the church's working budget;

On Sept. 22 & 23, **Jamie Wyant** led about 8-9 men in the building of a handicap ramp at a residence on S. McPheron St. on the east side of Lima;

The Holmans and Crafts led a St. Paul's effort of new or used shoe donations to assist the Thrivent Financial for Lutherans Chapter 30016 'Shoeman Water Projects'. The shoes are sold and proceeds used for water supplies to needy areas of the world. 170 pairs of shoes (wow!) were donated from St. Paul's;

Committee met Sept. 21, no mtgs. Oct. & Nov. Either a short mtg. Dec. 21 (regular mtg. night or one Dec. Sunday after church to wrap-up 2010 business.)

#### Los Posada

In Mexico, a celebration called Los Posada reenacts the journey of Mary and Joseph to find a room in Bethlehem. Los Posada happens during the last 12 days of Advent. Each night Mary and Joseph go from house to house asking if there is room for them to stay. Some places say there is "no room" just like the innkeeper. But finally, on Christmas Eve, one place welcomes Mary and Joseph to stay.

Reenact the Los Posada journey with friends and family by preparing a small picnic. Place a basket inside one room of your house and shut the doors of all the rooms. Pretend together that you are travelers like Mary and Joseph, looking for a place that will welcome you. Search the house together. At each door ask, "Are we welcome?" Open the door and if the picnic is inside, share the goodies. While you eat, share stories of times when you have experienced hospitality.

1 tsp.	poppy seeds	Cook for 30 minutes or until bubbles at 350 degrees.



Share some tea together as you take turns reading aloud this Russian fable; then talk about how Babushka might be able to tell whether she would be welcomed at your home. Babushka old was an grandmother who lived in Russia many years ago. She lived alone on a corner where two roads met. Her days were filled with cleaning and cooking, and even though she hardly ever saw anyone else she was happy.

Late one winter night she was sipping her tea when she heard a knock at her door. She saw some shepherds with their sheep standing outside her house. "What do you want?" she asked them.

"Grandmother," they said, "we have heard that a baby has been born in Bethlehem who will be the Savior of the world. We want you to come with us and see this child."

"Oh no!" said Babushka. "I cannot leave my clean, warm house to travel with you in the darkness. Maybe I'll go tomorrow."

"If you cannot come, could you let us come in and warm up and have some tea?" asked the shepherds.

"I have just enough for me, and you are all dirty. Perhaps my neighbor down the road can help. Goodnight." And she shut the door.
