

BAPTISM TOWEL

In last month's bulletin, the symbol was the scallop shell, pointing down with three drops of water falling from it to symbolize the baptism. The water droplets stand for the Trinity: Father, Son, & Holy Spirit. Several years ago, Joanna Hurd started cross stitching towels for the baptisms at St. Paul's. Deb Hurd is continuing this tradition for Joanna. The towels have the scallop shell and the water droplets (blue for boys and pink for girls) and then it has the church name, child's complete name, and the date of the baptism on it. This is a special time in the life of that person and the towel is given to them as a good reminder of that special day.

Missions Year-End Report

ST. PAUL'S CONGREGATION AND MISSIONS COMMITTEE EFFORTS DURING 2015:

St. Paul's and other UMC churches hosted quarterly meetings of the **Lima Area Methodist Men's group** (L.A.M.M.), to listen to presentations on local mission work. The LAMM group donated \$150 to the **Camp Wesley Cabin Project**, \$150 to **Lima Family Promise** and \$150 to the **Lima Rescue Mission**. Thank you to everyone at St. Paul's who donated food, helped serve breakfast and attended the breakfasts;

Jesus said to "feed my sheep." Donations of food for the Allentown UMC **Five Loaves Food Pantry** continued to be strong in 2015 with St. Paul's individuals faithfully filling the food bins every month. An estimated \$1,500 worth of food was donated to the food pantry by St. Paul's in 2015! Thank you to all who donated food to feed those families who are in need in our Elida community;

- St. Paul's has monetarily supported the **Meals 'til Monday** mission which provides weekend meals to children from various elementary schools in and around Allen County, including Elida Elementary;
- St. Paul's continued to serve the needy at the Central Avenue, Lima, **Our Daily Bread Soup Kitchen** on every fifth Friday that occurred during the year. Numerous individuals represented St. Paul's as volunteers at the soup kitchen during the four 2015 dates, serving 150 to 200 persons at each gathering. Thank you for your service in this important mission;

Maedene Holmes and her band of workers assembled **school kits (116) and health kits (36)** donated by numerous members of our congregation as part of this annual September mission effort. This exceeded St. Paul's effort of 78 school kits and 25 health kits in 2014. Pastor Paul delivered the kits to the local collection point for the West Ohio Conference **Festival of Sharing**;

The small group, **Crafty Creatures**, continues to bless our congregation and our community with their mission of **prayer shawls**, **blankets**, **and quilts**. They also made significant contributions to our annual mission, **Christmas Tree of hats**, **gloves**, **mittens**, **and scarves** which were donated to Our Daily Bread, Lima Rescue Mission and Samaritan House;

St. Paul's donated \$166 to the 8th Annual Brad Joseph Memorial Golf Outing in July. St. Paul's had a golf foursome with their golf fees going to the memorial fund. Also, four of our members assisted with running the outing. The Brad Joseph Memorial Fund has given out scholarships for medical mission trips to Kenya, Dominican Republic, Haiti, Mexico & Uganda in the past seven years;

Jamie Wyant led a team from St. Paul's (and other local churches) on a mission to **the U.M.C. Camp Wesley** near Bellefontaine. Volunteers completed work to put shutters on cabins, putting an extension on the boat dock and replacing half of the roof on the crafts building. A **2016 Camp Wesley mission** is planned to finish the roof, work on the boardwalks and the small bridge on the path around the lake and to do some of the carpentry work on the new all-weather cabins which will be built by contractors;

On Thursday, October 29, members of St. Paul's Church handed out coffee, hot chocolate and pencils to parents and their children at the church for our **Trick-or-Treat Night Mission.** Over 350 cups of hot beverages were distributed along with pencils with St. Paul's name and website on them. Parents and children were very appreciative of the hot beverages and the break from trick-or-treating;

St. Paul designates a special offering every year to the **Camp Sierra Linda U. M. Church Camp** in Monterrey, Mexico this year we contributed \$370 to the camp to sponsor intercity youth from Monterrey, Mexico to attend the camp and **learn the Gospel of Jesus Christ**; (Continued on Page 5)

St. Paul designated a special offering for the **Miracle Offering**, which went to **No More Malaria**. Our donation of \$370 will go towards the worthy effort to eradicate Malaria worldwide in our lifetime;

Our youth and a few adults left over \$300 on "the cow" in the hallway to send to **Heifer International** to purchase items for families around the world. Thank you to our youth for their generous donations;

Money was given to **UMCOR** for disaster relief here in the U.S. and for disasters around the world;

St. Paul's Church again participated in a worldwide mission by **Samaritan's Purse** called **Operation Christmas Child**. Jamie Wyant headed up the collection of 163 shoeboxes, surpassing last years collection of 104 boxes. The shoeboxes were filled with gifts for boys or girls, and given to **Samaritan's Purse** to distribute to children worldwide. Thank you to all who filled boxes with gifts for these children;

The people of St. Paul's United Methodist Church **donated over \$17,700** to special missions, coins-for-communion, United Methodist Special Sundays, special designated Sundays and other missions and ministries of our church. See "2015 ST. PAUL'S SPECIAL MISSIONS GIVING SUMMARY", for a complete listing. Thank you to all who donated to these missions.

Also many thanks to members of our congregation who faithfully volunteered at Our Daily Bread soup kitchen, worked on quilts, hats and mittens, assembled health and school kits, filled Operation Christmas Child shoeboxes, worked or played golf at the Brad Joseph Memorial Golf Outing, helped hand out hot chocolate and pencils on Trick-or-Treat night, helped with LAMM breakfasts, donated food faithfully to 5 Loaves Food Pantry, worked on ramps, volunteered at Camp Wesley church camp and donated to special missions, projects and funds.

You are truly a blessing to the many people who have been served by the sweat and generosity of our congregation at St. Paul's United Methodist Church. **Praise God for his blessings upon our efforts to further His Kingdom!**





Methodism in America

The first Methodist Church was organized in London in 1739 by John Wesley. Methodism swept through England, and in time, crossed the Atlantic and was destined to influence the whole American continent.

The first American Society was organized in New York by Philip Emsbury, a local preacher. In 1768, the first Methodist Chapel was built on John Street, New York. In 1771, John Wesley sent Francis Asbury to America. He was destined, under God, to influence and shape the growing connection in America more than any other man.

On Christmas Eve, 1784, in the historic Christmas Conference at Lovely Lane Chapel in Baltimore, MD, Thomas Coke and Francis Asbury were elected, ordained, and consecrated Bishops by this Conference. The liturgy was adopted from John Wesley. The Methodist Episcopal Church in America was formally established on that night.


Francis Asbury (1745-1816) is of course, the most important figure in early American Methodism. His energetic devotion to the principles of Wesleyan theology, ministry, and organization shaped American Methodism in a way matched by no other individual. He set the pace for the itinerant ministry by riding more than 250,000 miles preaching, establishing Methodist societies, and superintending the American work as directed by Wesley.

Before the Elida Methodist Church was erected, people of the community found ways of worshipping without the convenience of a church structure. In 1830, Rev. Joseph J. Hill preached in this part of the country. He is listed as the first Methodist Missionary to preach here. He was a Methodist circuit rider. Circuit riders visited the area at irregular times. The circuit consisted of a 300-mile ride made every four weeks. They followed the rivers and streams, covering an area between St. Marys and Defiance, Ohio. For their effort, the riders were paid \$150 per year. Preaching was held for several years in the homes of Griffith John and Isaac Boyer. Circuit preachers visited them at irregular intervals.

In 1831, the first Methodist Society was organized in the home of John Summersett. This house was located on a spot which is now in the village of Elida. The preacher in charge was Jesse Pryor. Twelve persons united with the society: namely John Summersett, Rachel Summersett, Griffith John, Rachel John, Sally John, Rachel Jamieson, Isaac Boyer, Elizabeth Boyer, Smith Cremean, Polly Cremean, William Bryan, and Elizabeth Bryan.

Vegetable Casserole by Pam Lozano **Ingredients Instructions** Frozen mixed vegetables Cook vegetables in salted water for 10 minutes, leaving them crisp. 1 pkg. Drain. Put in bowl and add other ingredients and mix. (12 or 16 ounces) 1/2 cup Mayonnaise Put in casserole dish and spread crackers on top. 
