



## 2014 Annual Conference

Sunday, June 8-Wednesday, June 11, 1,034 clergy and 1,108 lay members gathered on the shores of Lake Erie at Lakeside for the 45<sup>th</sup> annual conference. Bishop Gregory Palmer presided over the sessions and preached at the Monday morning traditional worship service. This year's focus was on being blessed. Much like Pastor Paul's Father's Day message about happiness, Bishop Palmer stated that, "We have gotten caught up in the commodity and materials of blessings instead of the spirituality of blessing." He further added, "We need to chase the blesser, not the blessing."

The Rev. Eric H. F. Law, author of <u>Holy Currencies</u>: <u>Six Blessings for Sustainable Missional</u> <u>Ministries</u> led training sessions on Holy Currencies at various times throughout the week. The six currencies are Money, Time and Place, Gracious Leadership, Relationship, Truth, and Wellness. Rev. Law reviewed the different currencies and how they flow in the cycle of blessings.

In Bishop Palmer's Episcopal Address, the focus was on the hope for change. He also pointed out a few challenges and concerns. One major concern is in our 1,038 churches, 454 of the churches baptized no one in 2013 and 528 of these had zero professions of faith. Churches will not be sustainable with "none"; but the greater worry is about lives needing Jesus Christ. The Bishop said, "I accept the zeroes as a fact but I do not accept them as our future. We have a great deal of work to do, don't we?"

Throughout the week, West Ohio's commitment to <u>Imagine No Malaria</u> was interwoven in services. I was proud to place St. Paul's check in Tuesday morning's collection basket to help with this cause. By the end of the conference contributions and commitments totaled \$395, 429.57. Two and a half million dollars was collected before Annual Conference, so we may surpass the three and a half million dollar goal before the third year. By the way, we were told that Northwest Plains District is the second highest giving district. West Ohio Conference gave 1.1 million dollars to UMCOR and is the largest donator in the jurisdiction and second top giver in the nation.

Numerous other events, lessons, celebrations and the business of the church were conducted. If you would like to view more information, summaries, photos and videos, go to westohio.umc.org/2014weekreview.

#### St. Paul's Missions Underway

At **Camp Wesley**, a small group of missioners have completed the summer mission project to remove the old boat ramp and replace it with a new, larger ramp. The ramp is used by campers to launch canoes and for other water sports for campers. A special thanks to **Jamie Wyant** for heading up a team, which also included people from **Lima Trinity UMC**, and **Elida Immanuel UMC**. \$1,039 was collected by our congregation for the mission project at Camp Wesley. The remainder of our \$2,000 pledge to the Camp Wesley mission will be paid from our Mission's fund. Thanks to all who are helping with the work and to our parishioners who have generously donated funds to make this mission project possible. Also, our **Coins-for–Communion** collection of **\$94.54** for May was donated to the West Ohio Conference UM Church Camps fund.

Friday, May 30<sup>th</sup>, was St. Paul's opportunity to volunteer our services at **Our Daily Bread Soup Kitchen** to serve meals to individuals in our community who are in need of help. 'Thank you' to all volunteers who helped serve at Our Daily Bread, for being part of this 'Fifth Friday' mission work.

**June 29<sup>th</sup>** is **\$5-on-the-Fifth** offering to support the UMCH Family Services, which provides help to families in need, whether it's putting families together through Adoption and Treatment Foster Care Services or keeping families together through Family Mental Health and Post Adoption Services. Prayerfully consider supporting UMCH Family Services.

Every month we are truly blessed by our parishioners who faithfully fill our **Five Loaves Food Pantry** bins with food. Food collections continue to be strong and the number of needy families, who are blessed by receiving the food at **The Church at Allentown**, continues to grow. The next **Food Pantry Sunday is July 13<sup>th</sup>**.

Saturday, July 12<sup>th</sup> is the date of the <u>7<sup>th</sup> Annual Bradley Joseph Memorial Golf</u> outing to raise funds for medical mission trips. We are asking for at least four volunteers to help with the outing and at least one foursome of golfers to play golf in the outing. <u>Sign-up sheets for golf foursomes</u> may be found on the Mission bulletin board. St. Paul UMC will again be a **\$100 Hole Sponsor** for the event. On Sunday, June 1<sup>st</sup>, John Fleming (Brad's uncle) gave a talk during our service about the mission work being funded by the Bradley W. Joseph Memorial Fund. Also, our July Coins-for-Communion collection will go to the Bradley W. Joseph Memorial Fund.

Collection for **School and Health Kits** is just around the corner and will begin in August. 'Thank-You' for being part of St. Paul UMC's missions work and for being the 'hands and feet' of Christ in our community!

will work more hours in the summer. He also mows a couple of lawns. When not working, he likes hanging out with his friends.



## **Growing the Kingdom of God**

I want to tell you about one of the most useful plants I know of. It's called taraxacum and has a really pretty yellow flower. Not only is it bright and colorful, but you can also use the flowers to make a classic light wine, or you can use the young leaves to make salad. If that's not enough, you can toast the roots, grind them up, and brew them for decaffeinated coffee. Or, if you don't like coffee, you can use the young shoots for tea to take as a tonic in the spring. You can even use the older leaves for a good laxative that's high in vitamins A and C.

I love this plant. It's one of the few flowers that I can grow successfully. And yet, most people spend a great deal of time, energy, and money trying to get rid of it. Why? Because they think this wonderful miracle of God's creation is a weed.

You see, it's all a matter of perspective. In the mountains of Eastern Kentucky, those flowers which are also known as dandelions - are put to all sorts of wonderful uses, while in most cities, they're pulled out and tossed aside, judged to be worse than useless. Our standards for judging are not always the same.

In a way, I think that is what Matthew's parable of the weeds is all about: about our perspective being different from God's. About our having different standards for judging - because this is a parable that is all about judging.

There were people who were following Jesus who did not appear to others to be living the kind of life Christ talked about. That's obvious from all the times that the Pharisees accuse Jesus of spending most of his time socializing with sinners and outcasts.

The crowds that followed Jesus were not some idealized group that heard what he said and immediately changed their ways - always doing what was right, always being loving and kind. Those crowds were not made up purely of men and women with strong faith who were seeking to do only the will of God. They also contained liars and cheats, prostitutes and drunks, and people who were out for whatever they could get. It was not a perfect group.

So the problem arose. What should be done with those people who didn't seem to be living the life Jesus described? What should be done about those people who looked, to everyone else, to be unchanged by words of forgiveness and love? What should be done about those people who were giving Jesus a bad reputation? Shouldn't they be told to leave? Told that there was no place in the kingdom for their kind?

It's a problem that has always faced the church. After all, shouldn't we have some kind of standard? Don't we have the obligation to tell people who we think are really sinful that they need to straighten up or leave the church? Shouldn't we be able to judge those who are in God's kingdom and those who are outside of it and then rid ourselves of those who are out for the sake of the rest of us? Isn't that our job?

No, it is not. That's not our job at all, and Jesus makes that clear in Matthew's parable of the weeds. Our job is not to go about deciding what is a weed and what is a valued plant, for our perspective is frequently faulty. Our judgment is not always fair. Our standards are not always God's.

Jesus makes it clear that if we go about trying to decide who is in the kingdom and who is not, we run the risk of throwing out the good with the bad. The judgment is not ours to make. It is God's, and God's alone.

Our job is not to judge. Our job is to sow good seed, to tell the good news of our God of love and grace, and then to tend to the fields we have planted, nurturing and caring for them. As we do this, we will discover we are really helping each other grow and mature until we produce the good fruit of the kingdom.





## Parables of God's Reign
