






St. Paul's Book Club

MAY 2013 ST. PAUL'S MISSION COMMITTEE REPORT

Thank you to everyone who got online and voted for Owen Weaver, the handicapped young man from Bluffton, to help his family try to win a Van with a wheel-chair lift. With your help, he garnered 18,710 votes and is a semi-finalist. He made it into the top 5%, so a panel of judges will review his story and other finalists to pick the three winners on May 31st who will receive the wheel-chair van. Thank-you for your help.

On **May 4th** The Church at Allentown hosted the Lima Area Methodist Men's breakfast. Reed Nutt and Brooke Sauer of Allentown gave a PowerPoint presentation and narrative of the mission trip to Camp Sierra Linda last March. Work continues to install shower facilities, build soccer fields and repair buildings. Neal Whitney (Allentown), Dave Burkhart (Perry UMC) and Jim Lawrence (Immanuel) were on the trip too. The LAMM group donated \$200 towards materials for the 2013 mission to the camp for ongoing repairs of the camp facilities.

Correspondence was received from the United Methodist Family Services for St. Paul's \$120 donation to the children and families that they serve. A thank-you card was received from the Samaritan House for our recent donation to their women's shelter. The letter and card are on the Mission's bulletin board.

The St. Paul's Book Club donated \$856.95 to Missions designating it to be distributed evenly between the Lima Area Food Bank, The Samaritan House, Meals-til-Monday and Our Daily Bread soup kitchen. Thank you to the Book Club for their generous donation.

On **April 29**th an organizational meeting at St. Paul's was held for the Camp Wesley summer mission. The meeting was well attended and Jamie Wyant gave a PowerPoint about the camp and the expected work to be done. On **May 11**th Jamie Wyant met with Todd Hanes and the new staff and camp director for Camp Wesley. Todd stated that he was encouraged by their commitment and buy-in to the mission project and the vision of the Camp for our kids. Jamie relayed that the projects for this year will be to replace decking, ramp and steps on the dining hall entrances and to clear trails and install sections of boardwalk around the lake. The mission project will happen over several weekends in June and July, which are yet to be determined. More planning will happen at our next Missions Committee meeting.

The Ash Wednesday offering of \$106 was divided equally between the Allentown, Elida and Gomer Ministerial Association (AEGMA) and St. Paul's Special Needs fund. The Easter offering of \$857 was divided equally between the Camp Sierra Linda project to send campers from Monterey to camp and the Miracle Offering. \$52.00 was collected for One Great Hour of Sharing and \$5 was collected for Native American Sunday.

We have been contacted by John Fleming and have arranged that he speak to our congregation on **June 9th** about the 6th Annual Brad Joseph Memorial Golf Outing in July. More details about the outing later.

May 16th there was a program committee meeting for the Elida Youth Center, with a representative from Delphos Trinity UMC explaining how they run their youth program. Plans continue for the youth ctr.


Missions Continued

Volunteers are needed to help with the awareness run. More information will be provided.

Donations of food for the food pantry and volunteers for Our Daily Bread soup kitchen continue to be strong. Three persons at St. Paul's have showed interest in going to Haiti with Living Waters Int'l. to help repair wells.



Spiritual Disciplines Form God's Disciples



Spiritual formation has something to do with the idea of practicing spiritual disciplines. These naturally include spiritual activities such as meditation, prayer, fasting, study, almsgiving, and

worship. We all need time and a means to deepen our lives in God so that we can deepen our relationships with other people and ourselves. "Our world is hungry for genuinely changed people," writes Richard Foster.

Paul got it right when he wrote, "The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. And those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires" (Gal 5:22-24). I think this is the worthy goal and object of the Christian life as we live it now.

If you are like me, your life does not always seem full of "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control." Rather, you have your problems and I have mine. Unfortunately, as members of the body of Christ, we sometimes must put on our game faces and go on. Deep in the dark night of the soul, however, we know that we need more of God than we ever manage to shoehorn into our lives. Thus we need the disciplines of the Spirit and the spiritual life just like we need the four major food groups to survive and to thrive.

Along the way there always seem to be moments of grace or chance or serendipity that help us move on toward God and the relationships that believers claim at their baptism as people of God's reign. Sometimes events occur that remind us of why we do what we do. For example,

a group of lay ministers in my church made visits to an older couple in their home. After one of these weekly visits, a volunteer asked if someone from the missions work group could repair the couple's front door knob; it wouldn't lock. This would be a simple repair, really, probably no more than a 30-minute job.

Upon inspecting the doorknob, it was recommended that the whole doorframe be replaced, and that perhaps a new front door would be nice. When this project was completed, the workers decided to continue inside and partition off a bedroom and then paint the walls. The carpet really needed to be replaced, and how about the kitchen and bathroom – these areas could use a little repair work too.


As workers came by to complete one project, they were dreaming and planning the next project they wanted to do for the couple. The end result was a complete renovation of the inside of the little house. There were new chairs and a couch, a new kitchen stove, new mattresses, some new windows, and a handicapped bathroom. The kitchen floor was leveled so that they did not have to hold the refrigerator door shut with duck tape anymore.

The couple was so excited. All in all, it was a project that started with a doorknob and ended up blessing the lives of all who had a part in it.

This experience makes me realize that even when life is hard, we are surrounded by a group of dedicated believers. Church folk are people who want to live out the life of Christ in community. They give and live the faith. They take Paul's guidance to heart when they follow Paul's counsel to the church at Galatia: "Through love become slaves to one another" (Gal 5:13).





1/4 cup	Corn syrup	Combine corn syrup, brown sugar, and butter in medium sauce pan.
2 T.	Brown sugar, packed	Cook over low heat, stirring occasionally, until it begins to boil. Remove from heat and add cereal. Stir until well coated. Press evenly
3 T.	Butter	into 9" pie pan.

1 qt.	Vanilla ice cream	Warm remaining peanut butter mixture and drizzle over top.







Living Our Faith

Growing as God's Children

During the month of June, many congregations around the world read from the book of Galatians. This is one of the shorter books of the Bible. It has just six chapters, so it is one book that might be easy to read from start to finish.

Galatians is actually a letter that was written to the church in Galatia by the apostle Paul about 20 years after the death and resurrection of Jesus. Galatia was in the area known today as Turkey. Paul's letter was probably read aloud. If you decide to read from Galatians, try

reading it aloud by yourself or with others.

In Paul's time, people paid attention to differences. People had different faith traditions, different customs, different languages, and they felt that certain rules needed to be followed. But Paul reminded the people that Jesus came to help us overlook our differences in order to treat one another with love. Paul said, "There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:28). Paul says that when God looks at us, God doesn't see the differences. To God

we are all wonderful, and together we make something special.

Maybe sometime you have made beads in art class or summer camp. Then you can string those beads together and make a bracelet or necklace. Even though the beads are different, they are all beads. People are a little bit like beads. We are all individuals. We have different colors of eyes and hair. We like different things. However, even with all differences, all of us are God's children.
