





## Pastor Ruth has reFocused!

#### reFocus

The first week of May, Pastor Ruth traveled to Orlando, FL to participate in a training to become a facilitator for an exciting new process for the church called **reFocus**. The process begins with a network of pastors who go through the ReFocused Living Retreat, which takes several months, where they look at their history and how God has been leading and guiding them through good times and bad. They move into how God continues to be with them in the present, and end up with a personal vision statement, core values, and a final personal calling statement out of which they begin to work toward a more fulfilling and rewarding future.

The pastors then take the process back to their church leadership. The church leadership works on the church's history, answering the key questions: Where have we been? Where are we now? Where are we going? What will it take to get us there?

When the work is finished in 18-24 months, the church will have a 5 year strategic plan out of which to work toward the stated vision and callings. This is an exciting process, and an exciting time for St. Paul's to seek God's direction and listen for God's voice in the coming months. Are you ready

Local Outreach Ministries -- The Committee is also gathering information for where we can become more involved in our community. Those missions, agencies, and programs that Coins for Communion supports is now designated by month, with the UMCH project to receive the Coins through June. After that, they will be distributed to those ministries the Committee has chosen to highlight for each month.

**The 5 Loaves Food Pantry --** Watch for Tim Piper's updates on what's needed and how much we've collected. With the current trend in the economy, this is a much needed way of helping our neighbors. Missions will focus on the 5 Loaves Pantry in June.

Our Daily Bread Soup Kitchen -- Be watching for what you can do in July and August for the Soup Kitchen. The Committee is hoping to organize a group to go one day each month beginning this summer to go help serve the people who patronize the Soup Kitchen. We will also bring you opportunities to help in other ways during these summer months.

**Samaritan House** -- As a member of the board, Pastor Ruth will be bringing us some ideas on how we can participate to lend a helping hand to the mothers and children affected by homelessness due to displacement from family violence. We'll focus on the Samaritan House needs in September.

The Missions Committee is beginning to get organized. If you would like to participate, or have a mission idea you would like to take responsibility for, please let us know. We will put it on the board for the September Missions Day when we look at future missions to support at St. Paul's.





## The Rainbow A Reminder

Sometimes people say they prefer the "God of the New Testament" as being much gentler than the "God of the Old Testament." It's kind of ironic, when you think about it, seeing as it is, of course, the same God. Beyond that, the Hebrew Scriptures (Old Testament) present many images of God's gentleness and compassion.

The earliest stories in Genesis and Exodus often portray God trying to form a relationship with the odd creatures that God has made in the divine image. Like any new relationship, it takes time. God gets angry but often relents.

Case in point: in the story of the flood we are told that God destroys everything except the creatures preserved in the ark. Yet immediately following, God places something in the sky as a reminder not to do this again. Curious thing, this reminder. Firstly, it is a bow. Not the kind of bow with which you might tie up a package, but the kind with which you might shoot arrows. "I'm putting it away," God says. "I'm converting a weapon into a Technicolor thing of purest beauty."

This is first and foremost a reminder to God. Yet we, of course, see the rainbow too and remember God's promise never to destroy the earth again. The question then becomes, how will we respond here on our side of the rainbow? Will we remember God's promise and embrace it as our own, or will we carry on with business as usual?
