

Dear Friends,

With June comes summer, and the "lazy, crazy, hazy days" according to the old pop song. When the weather turns insufferably hot, we like to kick back and not do so much, lest we sweat. Summer is also the time to get away for a vacation (or two), and the time when many extended families come together for reunions. Picnics, days at the beach, and amusement parks provide special entertainment for many of us.

In the midst of summer are also the reminders of those whom Christ has called us to be especially aware of. Inner cities teem with people whose apartments are so hot, they sit on the streets trying to catch shade in doorways, moving along the sidewalks with the shade of the buildings. Several years ago, in my first year in Findlay, OH, I was amazed at the young families with little children who sat on the sidewalks to escape the heat of their apartments over the downtown stores. We bought an extra fan for the local charity that offered relief to folks in such places.

We also see more homeless people sleep in the open during summer. When Rich and I went to San Antonio several years ago, as the weather got warmer, the homeless slept in the doorways, on the sidewalks, and along the riverwalk. We took our leftovers from the restaurants and gave them away to the folks in the doorways. I remember thinking of them later in that season as rains came and the Weather Channel reported flooding on the riverwalk.

As a member of the board for Samaritan House, I am reminded regularly that people here in Allen County struggle with the same issues of poverty as those in other communities where I've lived and visited. As we go about our easy days of summer, let us remember that Christ has called us to ministry with the poor at all times. Please don't forget the least of these in the midst of your summer days. Random acts of kindness go a long way to show God's love in Christ.

Each year at Annual Conference a Miracle Offering is given from each congregation through the lay member or pastor. In this celebration of our connection, amazing things have been done in the name of Jesus Christ. The goal this year is to receive \$325,000 through the Love First Miracle Offering to support leadership development efforts in the West Ohio Conference and in the world. \$75,000 will go to support clergy and lay leadership training in our four mission partnerships: South-east Asia, the North Katanga Conference in the Congo, the Oriental Conference in Mexico and the Volga District in Russia. \$100,000 will go to support West Ohio Conference's Next Generation leadership development efforts. And finally, 10,000 school kits (valued at \$150,000) are to be assembled and delivered for children in the United States and across the globe.

Community Survey


Over a year ago, a special ad-hoc committee was appointed by Ad Council to conduct a community survey that will help us to determine who our neighbors are and what are their needs. The survey was planned over a year ago, but the amazing (God thing?) is that as we begin to move into the second phase of ReFocus, a community survey is a part of the work that needs to be accomplished in order to develop a strategic plan.

The committee has determined the questions we will use, a brochure is being developed by Judy Chaffins, and a trial survey is scheduled for the first part of June. What we need now are people who will help conduct the survey. Tim Piper has divided the village north of the railroad tracks into thirty sections. We are asking for thirty volunteers to partner with each other and canvass two sections each. One volunteer will be the speaker, the other will be the recorder. So, if you would like to help, but don't feel comfortable talking to people door to door, but can record answers, we can still use your help.

We will be asking volunteers to sign up the first two Sundays in June, and a training for all volunteers will be held Thursday, June 18th at 7 PM in the Fellowship Hall. We then ask that the surveys be completed by July 19th so that the data can be compiled by the time it's needed for our ReFocus meetings the first of next year.

RELAY FOR LIFE NEWS

The St. Paul's Relay for Life Team is gearing up for the Relay Walk 2009. Again this year our team will be participating in the Allen County Relay for Life Walk, June 12-13, at the Allen County Airport on Hanthorn Road. The festivities begin Friday, June 12, at 6:00 PM and continue through the night to 6:00 PM Saturday. At 7:00 PM Friday evening, survivors and caregivers are invited to participate in a Survivors' Walk, after which a reception is held in the large hanger. If you are a survivor and would like to walk in this special walk and would like a T-shirt that says ":survivor" on it, please contact Linda Holman by May 6th. All of those who have had cancer are invited to participate in the walk to honor survivors, even if you are not on the Relay Team.

Later that evening, at dusk, a luminary ceremony is held. Luminaries are purchased by those who want to light the path of hope in honor or in memory of a loved one and are placed around the track. These luminaries remain on the track the remainder of the evening, lighting the path for walkers. Luminary forms may be purchased for \$10 each after the worship service the first three Sundays in May. For an additional \$1, a photo of that person will be projected on an outdoor screen during the ceremony.

Throughout the evening, activities such as an auction, BINGO, contests, line dancing, and children's activities are available. Entertainment for the entire 24-hour period keeps participants involved and awake! While all of these activities are going on, someone from each team is walking the track. This could be you! A few weeks before the event, an opportunity will be given for you to signup to walk some of that 24-hour period. You may walk for our team even if you are not an actual team member. Our team will also be selling drinks for the 24-hour period and a non-walker will be needed to stay at the tent to sell these items.

During the month of May, moons and stars can be purchased for \$1. These stay in the church hallway for the entire summer and are a reminder to us of those who have gone before us and those who have beaten this disease. They off hope to those newly diagnosed. The moons and stars will be sold after worship during the month of May.

The Relay for Life Team would like to thank St. Paul's UMC for continued support for this mission project, both financially and through participation. See you at the Allen County Airport June 12-13!

THE SAFEST PLACE

How to stay safe in the world today.

- 1. Avoid riding in automobiles because they are responsible for 20% of all fatal accidents.



The Focused Living Retreat will take you on a journey into your personal history, where you will discover how God has been at work during your whole life to prepare you for what God is calling you to in the future as a member of St. Paul's UMC.

The Trinity

Like Muslims and Jews, Christians are monotheistic. We believe in one God, supreme over all creation, and yet there is the trinity – the Father, the Son, and the Spirit. The Creator, Redeemer, and Sustainer. The Source, Word, and Holy Spirit.

The key thing that all three seem to have in common is that they are somehow ways of saying that one God has three forms, or personalities, or nuances, or substances. In other words, more than anything, the trinity seems to be our way of putting words to a vast and divine mystery that is, when you think about it, well beyond our comprehension.

God is – that's the piece that seems easiest. It's only when we try to explain or understand what that means that we run into trouble.

Certainly the Hebrew Scriptures clarify that God is creator. But

how? A big voice in Genesis 1, and someone playing in the mud in Genesis 2, and someone beyond approach in Psalm 8, and someone who has a child or a helper working close by from before the beginning. So is this one being, or different forms of the same?

Jesus is clearly the son, present from the beginning, too. Yet John says that Jesus is the Word of God.

And what about the Spirit of God: creating (Genesis 1:1), blowing invisibly like the wind (John 3), or coming like flames of fire (Acts 2). Words for *Holy Spirit* are always feminine in Hebrew, always neuter in Greek, yet generally thought of as male in English. So, how do we best understand the work of the Spirit?

Perhaps the best thing to say is that God is God, beyond our understanding and our speaking, yet close as the next breath. Comforting as a parent and friend, vast as the farthest universe, and everything in between. Praise the Triune God, the eternal one in three; the eternal three in one.

Ingredients	
1 can (14-15 oz.)	black beans (not drained)
1 can (14-15 oz.)	kidney beans (or any other type)
1 can (4 oz.)	olives (optional)
1 can (15 oz.)	corn, drained
4	basil leaves
2	cloves garlic
1/2	red onion
1/2	white onion
4	baby Bella mushrooms, sliced
1/2 -12 oz. can	diced tomatoes
1 can (4 oz.)	green chilies
1/2 cup	salsa
1	chopped jalapeno
1 1/2 tsp.	cumin
1 Tbsp.	brown sugar
1 section	chocolate bar (optional)
1/2	red pepper, chopped or flakes
	salt and pepper

Throw all ingredients into a pot. Heat to boil.

Lower heat, simmer for approximately 20 minutes.

Salt and pepper to taste.

Instructions

Serve with shredded cheese, sour cream, and tortilla chips.

Add hot sauce for more kick.



While listening to a Mother's Day sermon in 1909, Sonora Smart Dodd thought how much she would like to honor her father. While Dodd primarily wanted to honor this selfless man who had raised her and five others after their mother died in childbirth, the popularity of the day soon spread.
