

When Is Easter?

Every year the date of Easter changes. The main reason is that unlike holidays which are tied to specific dates, Easter always falls on a Sunday. Also, because the events of Jesus' death and resurrection occurred in the context of the Jewish Passover festival (remember, Jesus and the disciples were Jewish), the date follows the Jewish pattern of being tied to the lunar calendar.

Easter Sunday is always the first Sunday after the first full moon on or after March 21, the vernal equinox, or the first day of spring in the Northern Hemisphere. Thus, Easter can fall anywhere in between March 22 and April 25.

To add to the confusion, Eastern churches (such as Russian and Greek Orthodox) use a slightly different calendar, and their Easter is about two weeks after the date celebrated by Western churches.


Several proposals have been raised throughout history to arrive at a fixed date, but none of them have taken off. The most recent occurred in 2001 when Eastern and Western dates coincided for the first time in centuries.

Proposals have included fixing the date on the second Sunday in April, or agreeing always to have seven Sundays in the Season after the Epiphany. Others have proposed a fixed calendar date of April 9, believed to have been the actual date of the original resurrection, but such a date would mean that Easter would seldom land on a Sunday. None of these proposals have ever been taken very seriously.

There is one major advantage to having the date change each year. As Christians we are called to follow Jesus and that often means being out of step with the rest of the world. When we follow a calendar that is just a little out of step it reminds us of the call to challenge the direction the world may be going. The floating date of Easter can help us remember and celebrate this.





Gathered Around the Cross



The story of Jesus' arrest, trial, and crucifixion is a rich and detail-laden story. We could spend hours discussing parts of phrases, but how much better it might be if we could just have some of the feeling we get in that old spiritual "Were You There When They Crucified My Lord?" Something hauntingly spiritual and powerful lives in that question. In truth, even those who were there may not have had any idea about what was really taking place. Only in retrospect, especially with the perspective of faith, do some people like the writers of the Gospels tell us that something cosmically significant and everlastingly important was taking place at the moment when Jesus was on that cross . . .

If we take the perspective of John's Gospel, we find that Jesus must look hard in order to discover any true friends in the crowds gathered around the cross. But look he does, and in the process he sees his mother, and the disciple whom he loved. John tells us that two other women were there as well, his mother's sister (whose name for the sake of confusion is also Mary), and Mary Magdalene . . . And then John tells us there are others. Soldiers are nearby, and two others are being crucified with him, but in John's telling of this story Jesus doesn't talk with them. Far into the background are Pilate and the chief priests, and off in hiding are all the rest of the disciples, including bold Peter, sulking now for having denied Jesus. Paul is off making tents somewhere,

not having any idea of what's going on in Jerusalem. There's a good chance that at least a couple of the Gospel writers are still in school and may have only heard rumors about Jesus. They would have to get their evidence about what happened on Good Friday from those few witnesses who actually did have the courage to stick around and watch the whole thing creep ever so slowly and deliberately to its end.

But what looks like defeat is, strangely, the fulfillment of a life directed toward such a moment. At least in John's Gospel the picture we have of Jesus is of someone who is about as far from a helpless victim as you can get. It isn't that he would wish his death, for indeed he had prayed with real tears that this was a cup which might be taken away. But when finally the time comes for him to drink this cup, he does so with a kind of commanding presence that has eternal consequences. His final words, so difficult to utter because it takes his last breath to get them out, are "It is finished."

What was finished, of course, was just about to start. Except for those four who stood by the cross, it will take a while before they can come to terms with what happened. It will take some time for his disciples to be regathered and spirited for the missionary work that lies before them. It will take some time before Paul gets turned around by a bolt of lightning. A number of years will pass before some followers feel compelled to write down the entire story. Many of us can identify with them at this point as we testify to the time it has taken us to get to this point in our faith walk.

On that cross-marked day so long ago only Jesus, it seems, had any inkling about the eternal ramifications of what was taking place. Now we find ourselves reflecting on what took place on the day Jesus died. From the perspective of the cross, when Jesus said "It is finished," he was saying that the bridge of reconciliation was finally and completely established. This bridge moreover was laid down in love and sacrifice and meant for everyone in the world. All who walk into this forgiveness will need to pause by his cross and see Jesus looking at them with the love he had for his mother and that disciple. Praise God that he looks at us with the same love.

Featured Recipes from St. Paul's Great Cooks

Slow Cooker Apple Cinnamon Steel-Cut Oatmeal

Ingredients		Instructions
2	Apples, peeled, cored, cut into 1/2 inch pieces	Coat inside of 3 1/2 quart (or larger) slow cooker with cooking spray. Add all ingredients (except optional toppings) to slow cooker. Stir, cover, and cook on low for approximately 7 hours (slow cooker times can vary). Spoon oatmeal into bowls and add additional toppings if desired. Store leftovers in refrigerator. Freezes well. To reheat single servings: Put 1 cup cooked oatmeal in microwave proof bowl. Add 1/3 cup fat-free milk. Microwave on high for 1 minute; stir. Continue cooking for another minute, or until hot. Recipe can be doubled in 6-quart or larger slow cooker. Increase cooking time by 1 hour. When freezing, put in 1 cup bags so you have single servings ready to go.
1 1/2 cups	Fat-free milk (can substitute almond milk)	
1 1/2 cups	Water	
1 cup	Uncooked steel-cut oats (can NOT be substituted!)	
2 Tbl.	Brown sugar (or substitute maple syrup)	
1 1/2 Tbl.	Butter, cut into 5-6 pieces	
1/2 tsp.	Cinnamon	
1 Tbl.	Ground flax seed	
1/4 tsp.	Salt	
Optional garnishes	Chopped nuts, raisins, maple syrup, additional milk or butter


Ingredients		Instructions

Living Our Faith

Easter the leap of faith

Life after death. It is our deepest longing; our bravest statement of faith. Easter gives us the hope that life continues in some way after we die: that death isn't the end. That Jesus is still with us.

Other hopes are attached to this fundamental one. Like, the hope of seeing Jesus face to face; of reuniting with loved ones who have died; of being healed; of being rewarded for the hard work; of being comforted for all we have suffered.

We cling to the promises and prophecies of the New Testament. And we are fascinated by the stories of

people who have had near death experiences. We long to know the real truth.

But could it be that in our finite condition, with our limited consciousness, we are simply not capable of grasping the whole truth? Our imagination fails us because we do not have the experiential tools to construct ultimate meaning.

It is a great leap of faith, to trust in the unseen. To state our belief in a God of love. To trust in resurrection. To be able to be hopeful for ourselves and our world.

Faith is not certainty, it is trust and a willingness to go forward into the unknown. Doubts and questions keep us open to the possibility that the truth is even more amazing than we anticipate. When we try to hold onto certainty about facts we limit

God and stifle our imagination.

Easter is a celebration of the great leap of faith, the ultimate act of defiance against despair. No matter what this great unknown holds for us we can trust that it will be all right - Jesus is in it.

And even though our minds cannot yet grasp the truth about resurrection and eternity, we may entrust ourselves to what one hymn writer described as "the silence of eternity, interpreted by love." (Dear Father, Lord of humankind - John G. Whittier)
