

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Dear Friends.

This is a landmark year for your pastor. This year, Rich and I will have been married **40 years**. This year, I will also turn **60 years old** (although that

isn't until near the end of the year!) This year marks the 15th anniversary of my being in appointed ministry, and the 10th anniversary of my ordination. It's an important year in my life. This year also marks the beginning of a new chapter in the life of St. Paul's UMC. As we move through the Refocus process, we are looking at the good that has happened in the past, as well as acknowledging some of the challenges that the people of St. Paul's have faced together (and a few times not so together).

What stands out for me as I consider the current reality is the comfort which we all enjoy in this place among these people. Comfort is good when we know that we can count on people to support and encourage us, to celebrate with us and to share our lives in meaningful ways with us. At the same time, comfort can become what stops us and keeps us from growing closer to Christ and from becoming who God would have us become as Christ's church. In the midst of our journey through the Refocus Process, I am drawn to a prayer by Sir Francis Drake written in 1577. It reminds me that I am afflicted with comfort, too, and that I need to be disturbed from this comfort. I commend this prayer to you as a church who is refocusing our ministry toward the future with our community:

"Disturb us Lord, when we are too well pleased with ourselves, when our dreams have come true because we have dreamed too little, when we arrive safely because we have sailed too close to the shore.

Disturb us, Lord, when with the abundance of things we possess, we have lost our thirst for the waters of life; having fallen in love with life, we have ceased to dream of eternity; and in our efforts to build a new earth, we have allowed our vision of the new heaven to dim.

Disturb us, Lord, to dare more boldly, to venture on wider seas where storms will show your mastery; where losing sight of land, we shall find the stars. We ask you to push back the horizons of our hopes and to push us into the future in strength, courage, hope, and love." Amen.

PASTOR'S SCHEDULE:

Your pastor is required to have 40 face-to-face hours of continuing education each year. It is necessary that she take the time to have the continuing education to meet these requirements by the West Ohio Conference Office of Ministry. She is also allowed 30 days of vacation, including four Sundays, each year between July 1 and June 30. This time does not carry over, and there are some years when your pastors have not gotten all of their allotted time.

All pastors in the West Ohio Conference and the Northwest Plains District are encouraged to take one day of spiritual retreat each month and a week of spiritual retreat each year. That has not always happened. But, imagine what it would be like to have a pastor that wasn't connected on a regular basis with the power of God.

In an effort to keep you better informed about the pastor's time off, here are the upcoming dates in March that Pastor Ruth will be gone for continuing education, vacation days, or spiritual retreat/renewal. Of course, there are emergencies that can take us all away at times, so be aware that no planned schedule is fixed.

February 28 - March 4 — Continuing Education: Sing a New Song—introduction of *Worship and Song*, the new UM worship song book with worship helps.

March 14 — Personal Spiritual/Renewal day

When the pastor is out, the office will have the name of a pastor to contact in case of emergency hospitalizations and deaths.



LEARNING TO REFOCUS AT ST.PAUL'S

Personal growth and motivational expert Stephen R. Covey states, "Perhaps, in utilizing our human capacity to build on the foundation of generations before us, we have inadvertently become so focused on our own building that we have forgotten the foundation that holds it up."

The mission statement of St. Paul's is 'To be an inviting community of Christ's disciples.' The ReFocus Team developed a biblical purpose statement: 'St. Paul's U.M.C. exists as God's people embracing His grace through humble service to all.' How shall the congregation of St. Paul's serve the Elida community with Christian hospitality and discipleship? What are our values and priorities as we live, grow, and minister throughout Elida, Allen County, Ohio, and the world?

ReFocus Summit meetings February 26, and March 26, 9:00 a.m. -3:00 p.m. in the church's fellowship hall will assess our past, define the present, and clarify the future as we seek God's purpose for St. Paul's and the ways he has equipped us to shape our destiny by living out our biblical purpose statement.

On Saturday, January 29, 2011, we began St. Paul's formal ReFocus process. The first segment was to examine where we have been – our church's history. Nineteen members including Rev. Solo developed a Journey Wall. You can view it in the Fellowship Hall. Yellow stickies represent pleasurable or rewarding experiences throughout the decades beginning with 1950; pink stickies represent not so rewarding experiences during our church's history; blue stickies represent 'lessons learned' and were affixed chronologically as discerned by meeting participants; and green stickies represent values the meeting participants discerned from the experiences of our historical church – good or bad – highlighted on the Journey Wall.

The ReFocus Team intends to develop and finalize one or two values based upon the survey (Journey Wall) of our church's history. In this manner, the Team hopes to improve the effectiveness of our congregation as Christ's disciples in and for our Elida community. Thus far we have determined that listening and communication skills are essential values; nurturing of our family units; minimizing control while conquering fear in all our interactions are values we need to emphasize and implement.

Everyone has a voice in defining our intentions and commitments for the future. Join your fellow parishioners in this exciting journey as we re-build the life and ministry at St. Paul's U.M.C., Elida for today and for future generations. Contact the church office with notice of your attendance for the next two Summit sessions February 26 and March 26, 9:00 a.m. – 3:00 p.m. in the Fellowship Hall.



ST. PAUL'S MISSIONS ACTIVITIES/COMMITTEE WORK YEAR-END 2010 AND KICK-OFF YEAR 2011

- Committee's most recent meetings Sept. 21 and Dec. 21, 2010;
- The Committee distributed evenly to the Samaritan House & to The Lima Salvation Army on Dec. 22 the 2010 donations to our annual hat/mitten tree of 22 pairs of gloves, 17 scarves, and 14 hats;
- The committee set the 2011 'coins for communion' designations & submitted them to Treasurer Gene Craft;
- Led by Tim and Corinne Piper and assisted by many, we continue to support Lima Area Methodist Men's group; Family Promise; 5 Loaves Food Pantry;
- Slone Whetstone is our liaison to the community's Meals 'til Monday mission;
- Jamie Wyant announced during a recent Sunday service that we've committed to the construction of two handicap ramps in east and south Lima; however, to date, the necessary third-party funding hasn't provided for purchase of materials and such work is currently on-hold;
- ◆ The United Methodist Children's Home mission work week for 2011 is on hold pending their operational and financial statuses. Recent reports from the Home indicate financial hardships and the termination of its residency program. They are continuing their counseling and foster parent programs. Jamie and Marty have been in contact with Todd Hanes to assess matters from our perspective. The Home expects to make some decisions regarding its future operational and financial positions during Jan. 2011 and we will respond accordingly. Tim Piper is exploring other work week options for our consideration;
- ◆ 2010 highlights: our congregation was able to make significant contributions to the Brad Joseph Memorial Golf Outing and welcomed his Uncle to a June worship service; the Committee did a better job with our annual health/school kits project; Relay for Life Team ended a very successful and impressive 10-year run; donations to UMCOR's Haiti relief effort totaled \$720 during Jan. '10; 2009 Christmas offering was \$1,900 for Elida-Gomer-Allentown Ministerial Assn. & St. Paul's Special Needs Fund; Easter offering was \$705 for Miracle offering at Annual Conference; UMCH missions work week received over \$3,000 in cash contributions to make St. Paul's the leading congregation for the July work week; F.O.R.O. and Linda Craft's Russia mission trip received over \$1,500 in financial support from St. Paul's last year; weekly pledge donations designated 'Missions' have generated a reasonable working fund for the Committee....which is something new; our congregation donated approx. 8% of our total working budget to outside mission efforts as reported to the congregation on Missions Sunday in Sept.;
- December 31 was a '5th Friday' and Elida St. Paul's mission day at Our Daily Bread Soup Kitchen in Lima. Carole & Denny Grapner, Linda Holman, Linda Craft, Phyllis Hines, Michele & Sue Theodore, & Corinne Piper represented our church this date;
- We contributed \$80 in October and \$148 in December to the United Methodist Children's Home in response to its \$5 on the 5th campaign;
- ◆ 'Coins for Communion': Aug. \$78 Hope Visitation & Exchange; Sept. \$67 Heartbeat of Lima; Oct. \$87.87 Samaritan House; Nov. \$87.52 Our Daily Bread Soup Kitchen, Lima; Dec. \$101.67 Salvation Army, Lima; Jan. 2011 \$89.26 Hope Visitation & Exchange Center, Lima;
- 2010 Christmas offering, \$1,057.91, split between Meals 'til Monday and the St. Paul's Special Needs Fund;
- Our congregation hosted the February 5, 2011, quarterly breakfast meeting of the Lima Area Methodist Men (L.A.M.M.) The men heard a presentation concerning the ACTS 434 mission effort in our community;

Learning about Forgiveness

March 9, 2011 is Ash Wednesday, the first day of the Season of Lent. Each year on this day we read from Psalm 51, a song that talks about what it feels like to ask for and receive forgiveness. This is an important theme of the Season of Lent. It is a time when we practice prayer, generosity, and when some people decide to give up something for a time, or take on a new project.

Many people think that Psalm 51 was written by King David. David was Israel's most powerful king. He helped to unite the kingdom of Israel and gave the people a sense of peace and security. But David made mistakes too. In 2 Samuel 11:1—12:24 we find David, strolling on the roof of his palace. He happened to see a beautiful woman bathing and David sent someone to find out more about her. He learned that her name was Bathsheba, and she was the wife of Uriah.

The king could ask anyone to do anything, so David sent messengers to Bathsheba and they brought her to the king. Even though he knew it was wrong, King David couldn't resist. He wanted to sleep with her, and she couldn't say no.

After Bathsheba returned home she learned she was pregnant with the king's baby. When David learned this, he decided to try to cover up his sins. He ordered that Uriah be brought home from battle. That way, perhaps Uriah would go home to be with his wife, sleep with her, and come to believe the baby was his own.



But when Uriah returned he did not go home. Instead, Uriah told King David, "Until all the other soldiers are out of danger, I will not enjoy the comforts of my own house." It was an honorable decision, but now Uriah would know that Bathsheba's baby was not his child. And so David made a deadly decision. He knew it was wrong, but he sent Uriah into the worst of the fighting and then ordered the troops to abandon him so that he would be killed in battle.

Later, David received news from the battlefield that Uriah had been killed – along with many other men. He sent for Bathsheba, she became his wife, and bore him a son. But the thing that David had done displeased God. David had forgotten about God.

Nathan the prophet came for a visit and told a parable about how a greedy, rich man took the only beloved lamb of a poor man. David said that the rich man deserved to die. Nathan simply said, "You are the man."

Right then and there, David understood that the story was about him, and that God was angry with him. David was truly sorry for his sin and repented. Though he did not die, the child that Bathsheba had unfortunately did.

Many bad things come out of David's sin, as is often the case with

sinful choices. The most important message of the story has to do with the grace of God.


God calls us saints, names us as holy people in our baptisms, and claims us as part of God's own family. At the same time, we tend to follow our own impulses – disobeying God, ignoring the laws meant to guide our lives, and mistreating ourselves, our neighbors, and our world. We are disobedient, yet loved by God. We are, at once, saints and sinners.

The words of Psalm 51 speak powerfully about what it means to ask for and receive forgiveness. Read Psalm 51:1-17 two times. The first time through, think about the story of King David. The second time through, think about yourself. When have you wanted to ask for forgiveness? When have you been asked to forgive someone else? Which was harder for you?

To get a picture of what forgiveness looks like try this activity. Write down something you feel badly about and want to be forgiven for, or draw a picture to represent it. Then use things like paint, erasers, and correction fluid to either "blot out" or "cleanse" what has been written. How does it feel to see something transformed in this way? How does it remind you of times when you have received forgiveness from someone?

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Connecting With ...

How Many Loaves Have You?

World Day of Prayer is an international movement of Christian women from many traditions who come together to observe a common day of prayer each year. In many countries it is celebrated the first Friday of March. This movement has been initiated and carried out by women in more than 170 countries and regions.

Through World Day of Prayer, women around the world affirm their faith in Jesus Christ and share their hopes and fears, their joys and sorrows, and also their opportunities and needs. Women are encouraged to:

- become aware of the whole world and no longer live in isolation
- be enriched by the faith experience of Christians from other countries and
- take up the burdens of other people and pray for and with them
- become aware of their talents and use them in the service of society
- affirm that prayer and action are inseparable and that both have immeasurable influence in the world

This year, the women of Chile are organizing the worldwide theme, "How Many Loaves Have You?" The Bible study comes from 1 Kings 17:8-16 and Mark 6:30-44. The story of the widow of Zarephath (1 Kings 17) is about a woman's courageous choice to share the tiny bit of oil and flour she had left. This story has special meaning for the history of Chile after it was scarred by times of extreme exploitation.

The story from the Gospel of Mark (Mark 6:30-44) describes a time when Jesus preached to hungry crowds. The disciples advised Jesus to send them away so that they could buy food, but Jesus had a very different idea. He told the disciples: "You give them something to eat." He sent them out to discover how many loaves they had. Like the story of the widow, the five loaves of bread and two fish they discovered were meager among so many; yet Jesus shows how even a little bit can be enough for all.

After enduring a devastating earthquake in February 2010, the women of Chile encourage us to enter a process that draws us into the Bible, into the context of Chile, and into the real situations of our lives and communities by asking ourselves, how many loaves do you have? What are your gifts? What can you share?

Friday March 4, 2011 is the official day of observance for World Day of Prayer. Consider how you might join them in prayer and celebration. They will begin their observance with a procession carrying a panera. This is the name that Chileans give to their everyday bread basket. Bread is central to their daily life, and sharing bread is a universal sign of hospitality.

During the month of March, take the opportunity to enter into prayerful solidarity with the women of Chile and with people around the world. They invite us to reflect on the mystery of the widow's oil and the flour that did not run out, as well as the mystery of the feeding of the 5000.

Take this opportunity to ask yourself: How many loaves have I? What are my gifts? What can I share? For more information about a World Day of Prayer service near you, please contact your National Committee.


