

The General Conference of the United Methodist Church will be meeting at the end of April, and beforehand, there will be a lot of rumors about what is happening in the UMC. I want to say to you that until after the General Conference, no one knows what the delegates will do, and come forward with, as a direction for the UMC. We will probably have some things to vote on and discuss after the General Conference, but even that will not be official until all the Annual Conferences in the world, have an opportunity to ratify whatever is decided. What I am trying to say is don't panic, if you hear crazy rumors, come talk to me and I will tell you what I know, and be patient as we move forward. The General Conference does not end until May 3, so there will be no definite news until then. I'll keep you informed, and I encourage you to pray for the leaders of our church who have been elected to the General Conference that they would follow God's call as they decide on the direction of the UMC. Until then. I will see you in the mission field.

VICTOR'S CROSS

Also called the conqueror's cross, the victor's cross is composed of the Greek cross, recognized by its four equal

arms, adorned with Greek letters in each quadrant. The top left letters stand for *Jesus* and the top right letters stand for *Christ* (the horizontal lines above them indicate that they are abbreviations). The four letters across the bottom spell the Greek word for *conqueror*.

Keep On Shining

Charles W. Naylor (1874-1950) was a traveling evangelist until misfortune struck. First a tentpole fell on him as he prepared for a meeting. A year later, a bus accident left him partially paralyzed.

Despite experiencing chronic pain, Naylor became a prolific author and hymnist, dictating almost 150 songs. He often wrote about God's loving care amid adversity. One of his hymns begins:

When the winds of persecution blow, When the streams of hatred tow'rd you flow, When your foes in number seem to grow, Just keep on shining.

"God's comfort in our times of sorrow is not an imaginary thing," Naylor wrote. "It can be so real that it is a balm for our wounded spirits. Having passed through the experience more than once, [I know] how real and vital and sustaining the comfort of God can be."

History of a Hymn

'Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus

"Then Sings My Soul" By Robert J. Morgan

1882

In God I have put my trust; I will not be afraid. Psalm 56:11

How fitting that a missionary should write a hymn about faith and trust. Louisa M. R. Stead was born about 1850 in Dover, England and became a Christian at age nine. She felt a burden to become a missionary in her teenage years. When she was 21 or so, she immigrated to the United states and attended a revival meeting in Urbana, Ohio. There the Lord deeply impressed her with a missionary call.

She made plans to go to China, but her hopes were dashed when her health proved too frail for the climate there. Shortly afterward, she married a man named Stead. But sometime around 1879 or 1880, Mr. Stead drowned off the coast of Long Island. Some accounts say that he saved a boy who was drowning, and other accounts say both Stead and the boy perished. Other records suggest it was his own four-year-old daughter, Lily that he saved. In any event, the family's beach-side picnic ended in tragedy for Louisa.

Shortly afterward, taking little Lily, Louisa went to South Africa as a missionary, and it was there during those days she wrote, "Tis So Sweet to Trust in Jesus."

Louisa served in South Africa for fifteen years, and while there she married Robert Wodehouse. When her health forced a return to America, Robert pastored at a local Methodist church. In 1900, her health restored, Robert and Louisa attended a large missionary conference in New York, and were so enthused by the experience they again offered themselves as missionary candidates.

They arrived as Methodist missionaries in Rhodesia on April 4, 1901. "In connection with this whole mission there are glorious possibilities," she wrote. "One cannot in the face of the peculiar difficulties help saying, "Who is sufficient for these things?" but with simple confidence and trust we may and do say, 'Our Sufficiency is of God."

Louisa retired in 1911, and passed away in 1917; but her daughter, Lily, married missionary D. A. Carson and continued the work for many years at the Methodist mission station in southern Rhodesia (Zimbabwe).


2024 Summer Camp Opportunities Offered in Partnership with East Ohio

Cole Slaw

Ingredients		
4 cups	Cabbage, shredded	
1 small	Onion, chopped	
1	Green Pepper, chopped	
to taste	Celery seed	
Dressing:		
3/4 cup	*Sugar- may use substitute	
1/2 tsp	Salt	
1/2 cup	Salad oil	
2/3 cup	Vinegar, apple cider	
1/2 cup	Water	

In large bowl with lid, mix together first 4 ingredients. Stir dressing ingredients together in small bowl, then combine with cabbage mixture.

Let Stand for at least 6 hrs. before serving. Good for up to 2 weeks. Keep in refrigerator.

Use scrap paper to fuel new growth and make a gift that keeps on giving.

What you need:

- Scrap paper
- Water
- · Herb or flower seeds
- Blender
- Strainer
- · Cookie sheet
- Towel
- Adult help

What you do:

- Tear the scrap paper into strips and place in a bowl. Cover the paper with water and let it soak overnight.
- Pour the mixture into a blender and blend about 10 seconds.
- Strain and squeeze the paper pulp to remove excess water. Place in a bowl.
- Sprinkle seeds over the pulp and mix to incorporate them into the pulp.
- Shape the pulp into a flat layer on the cookie sheet. Use a towel to soak up excess water. Allow the paper to dry completely.
- Tear paper into shapes or fold into a card. You can plant the paper directly into soil. Water it and then watch your plants grow!



The skeleton flower, a perennial native to Japan, has delicate petals that change from opaque white to almost transparent when wet. After it rains, only the flower's intricate, skeleton-like veins are visible.
