The Armor of God



In Ephesians 6:10-20 the author writes about being strong in our faith. We are told to "put on the whole armor of God" (v. 11) in order to defend ourselves from enemies.

Instead of being military hardware, we are invited to wear some clothing that at first might have seemed to the Ephesians as a joke. Tie truth around your waist? Wear the gospel of peace as shoes? These things seem strange.

Maybe the author of the letter (we're not sure who it really was) wanted

to make a different kind of point. Perhaps they were trying to say something like "you know, there is a lot of fighting in our world, and there are a lot of dangerous and difficult forces out there. The way to tackle them all is not to try to fight them the way we've fought for years, but in a different way – Jesus' way."

In verses 14-17 the author lists some kinds of "armor" we can put on. What might that look like?

Using a marker, draw a huge outline of a person – make it as big as you can. One option is to take a piece of butcher paper, or tape several small sheets together. Then, lie down on the paper, with your legs slightly apart and hands away from your body. Invite someone to draw a rough outline of your shape with a marker.

Illustrate some of the things in the Bible passage – you can write down words that describe the actions, or draw pictures, or cut out pictures from magazines and glue them on.

- A **belt** of truth. We use a belt to hold up our pants or skirt and for holding things together. Think about truth. When we are honest in what we think and say and believe, it holds together. Use your imagination to think of ways to express holding the world together.
- A **breastplate** of righteousness. This armor protects our heart and other organs from being pierced by arrows. Instead of hardening our heart out of fear the author suggests something else. How can we defend ourselves from other's hurts?
- **Shoes** of peace. How can you share God's peace in our world? What images might you use? How can we counter the world's hurt by telling others about God's unconditional love and grace?
- A **shield** of faith. What do we carry out in front? What do others see first about us? Draw a large shield and add words or pictures that speak of our faith in God.
- A **helmet** of salvation. Salvation is that sense of knowing that God loves us, no matter what. What kind of hat would tell others that we know and love God? Draw it.
- A **sword** of God's word. Instead of a sword that we can poke, stab, and hurt people with, we are invited to tell the message of God's love. Draw some wonderful words of love and reassurance in a big balloon (like a cartoon) coming out of the mouth.

Our Church History

On December 30, 2007, Jone Lane retired as St. Paul's organist after 14 years. Marty White, PPR Chair, presented Jone with a Penn State shirt (really, Marty?), which he quickly exchanged , after much laughter from the congregation, for an Ohio State shirt. The Bell Choir played "O Little Town of Bethlehem" during the worship service and a cake and punch reception was held in the Narthex after the service. The cake was made by Pastor Ruth's daughter. Linda Holman will become the organist.

At the end of this year, St. Paul United Methodist Church again received a "One Hundred Percent Achiever Church" certificate for meeting in full its apportionments which support United Methodism's Ministries across the West Ohio Conference and throughout the world.

The basement renovation continued into 2008. In March that year, the renovation was complete. On March 30, a reception was held in the newly renovated fellowship hall to celebrate the second confirmation of the following students: Molly Fessler, Audrey Fox, Doug Guess, Tahler Sdao, Michele Theodore, and A.J. White. Punch and cookies were served and banners made by the students were on display.

In May, St. Paul's two high school graduates were honored with a breakfast for them and their parents, prepared and served by Gail Fessler and Sue Theodore. Doug Guess and John Segovia were the graduates.

On June 1, 2008, a dedication for the new fellowship hall was held. The Garmann and Miller families, the architects for this major project, were our guests. A large fern was a gift from them. The Song of Praise that morning was "Standing on the Promises," highlighting the theme for our renovation, Standing on the Promises, Building on the Premises. Rev. Solo and Rev. David Chivington, Assistant Lima District Superintendent, conducted the service. Judy Chaffins was the special music and sang "Beautiful" by Paris. Steve Moser conducted the Children's Moments and Tim Piper and Norm Grigsby also spoke during the service. The congregation then moved to the new fellowship hall, where communion was served to everyone. After communion, Ron Steiner, Jamie Wyant, and Tim Piper spoke to the congregation. A beautiful flower arrangement was a gift from Heyne Construction, Inc. Everyone enjoyed a delicious carry-in meal, the first one served in our new fellowship hall.

1 qt.	Vanilla ice cream	before cutting. Warm remaining peanut butter mixture and drizzle over top.







Prayer From The Heart

John Bunyan said, "In prayer it is better to have a heart without words than words without a heart." A story told by a 19th-century Jewish rabbi shares the same idea:

A disheveled old man entered a synagogue for the first time. Not realizing he was holding the prayer book upside down, he tried to follow the congregation's singing, but his words were incorrect. Finally, he simply looked toward heaven, repeating one Hebrew word over and over.

After worship, some people complained to the rabbi, "Why didn't you ask him to leave?" He replied, "That man said more to God with his one word than some of us will ever say in our whole lives. God hears the words of the heart."
