

# Christian Symbol SCROLL

A scroll may symbolize the writings of Scripture, particularly the Old Testament. In Luke 4, Jesus reads from the scroll of Isaiah in his home synagogue at Nazareth. A scroll may also symbolize the Day of Judgment, with the names of the elect, or saved, written on it. In Revelation 5, the creatures and elders around God's throne sing to Christ the Lamb: "You are worthy to take the scroll and to open its seals, because you were slain, and with your blood you purchased for God persons from every tribe and language and people and nation" (v. 9, NIV).

# Missions Year-End Report

#### ST. PAUL'S CONGREGATION AND MISSIONS COMMITTEE EFFORTS DURING 2014:

- \* St. Paul's and other UMC churches hosted quarterly meetings of the **Lima Area Methodist Men's group** (L.A.M.M.), to listen to presentations on local mission work. Over \$500 was donated by LAMM to mission projects, both local and in the Ohio Conference;
- \* Jesus said to "feed my sheep." Donations of food for the Allentown UMC **Five Loaves Food Pantry** continued to be strong in 2014 with St. Paul's individuals faithfully filling the food bins every month. Thank you to all who donate food to feed those families who are in need in our Elida community;
- \* St. Paul's has monetarily supported the **Meals 'til Monday** mission which provides weekend meals to children from various elementary schools in and around Allen County;
- \* St. Paul's continued to serve the needy at the Central Ave., Lima **Our Daily Bread Soup Kitchen** on every fifth Friday that occurred during the year. Numerous individuals represented St. Paul's as volunteers at the soup kitchen during the four 2014 dates, serving 100 to 200 persons at each gathering;
- \* Maedene Holmes, and her band of workers assembled **school kits (78) and health kits (25)** donated by numerous members of our congregation as part of this annual November mission effort. Pastor Paul delivered the kits to the local collection point for the West Ohio Conference **Festival of Sharing**;
- \* The small group, Crafty Creatures continues to bless our congregation and our community with their work of prayer shawls, blankets, and quilts. They also made significant contributions to our annual mission Christmas Tree of hats, gloves, mittens, and scarves which were donated to Our Daily Bread;
- \* St. Paul's donated \$100 to the annual **Brad Joseph Memorial Golf Outing** in July. St. Paul's had a golf foursome with their golf fees going to the memorial fund. Also, four of our members assisted with tournament-day administrative duties. The BJ Memorial Fund has given out scholarships for Medical Mission trips to Kenya, Dominican Republic, Haiti, Mexico & Uganda in the past six years;
- \* Check out our **Missions Committee bulletin board** located on the wall of the education wing hallway outside the Pastor's office on which are posted **'thank-you' letters and upcoming mission opportunities**;
- \* Jamie Wyant led a team from St. Paul's (and other local churches) on several weekends on a "summer mission project" to **the U.M.C. Camp Wesley** near Bellefontaine during June, July and August. Volunteers completed work on building a new boat dock, building a new storage building for paddle boards and finished the boardwalks on the path leading around the lake; A 2015 Camp Wesley mission is planned;
- \* On Thursday, October 30<sup>th</sup> Gary Hurd, Cari Metzger, Corinne Piper and Tim Piper handed out coffee, hot chocolate and pencils to parents and their children at the church for our **Trick-or-Treat Night Mission.** Over 350 cups of hot beverages were distributed along with pencils with St. Paul's name and website on them. Parents were very appreciative of the hot beverages and the break from trick-or-treating;
- \* St. Paul designates a special offering every year to the **Camp Sierra Linda U. M. Church Camp** in Monterrey, Mexico. This year we contributed \$441.50 to the camp to sponsor intercity youth to attend the camp and learn the Gospel of Jesus Christ;
- \* St. Paul designated a special offering for the **Miracle Offering**, which went to **No More Malaria**. Our donation of \$441.50 will go towards the worthy effort to eradicate Malaria worldwide in our lifetime;
- \* At Christmas time a new mission for St. Paul's was the **Operation Christmas Child**. Jamie Wyant headed up the collection of 104 shoeboxes filled with gifts, donated by our congregation and given to **Samaritan's Purse** to distribute to children worldwide. Thank-you to all who donated to this mission;
- \* The people of St. Paul's United Methodist Church **donated over \$14,500** to special missions, coins for communion, United Methodist Special Sundays, special designated Sundays and other missions and ministries of our church. See "2014 ST. PAUL'S SPECIAL MISSIONS GIVING SUMMARY", Thank you to all who donated to these missions.

Many thanks to the members of the Mission Committee for 2014: Jamie Wyant, Norm Grigby, Maedene Holmes, Carrie Metzger, Dillon Staas, Martha Vazquez, Dennis & Shara Bowsher, Tim Piper and Pastor Paul Scannell. # Ronnie's Ramblings

On the Sunday that I announced that I was going to retire in a few weeks, Pastor Paul had a sermon on the gift that the Lord gave us on Christmas: The presence of Jesus in our lives.

As I look back from the time Mary and I were married, how the presence of Jesus and the goodness of the Lord has been in our lives.

We bought the house we live in now on the north side of Elida. A neighbor man came over and introduced himself as Bill McKinney. He was a great help to us getting moved in after we were married in August, 1969.

A few years after we were married I had a chance to go to work at Ford. After a long week of trying to decide what to do we decided it was best if I staved at Elida Machine and Tool.

As time went along we had a boy, Brian, and a girl, Christie. I was helping my dad farm. A Mr. Basinger offered to give us 3 acres of land across from the Bluffton Bowling Alley to build a new house and move across the section from dad. We had a house designed but decided we could not leave this area because of Bill and Esther, the school, and friends at St. Paul's.

I started to farm on a farm that my grandfather owned 4 miles north of the home farm. This was a great 80 acres of great dirt. Nine years later the farm was sold to close the estate. Mary and I decided not to buy it after a long 6 days of trying to decide what to do. We called it the 80 acre mistake for not buying it.

Then in the spring of 1986, Mary had a major brain bleed. She was in St. Rita's for 90 days. Some people say that in time of trials there was one set of tracks that carried them, tracks of the good Lord. Well, for the Steiners, there was a herd of tracks that carried us that summer. Tracks from the neighbors, the members of St. Paul's, family, friends, and my boss at work. It was then that I began to understand why we made some of the decisions that we made early in our life. The good Lord knew what laid ahead for the Steiners. He guided us when we did not realize it. The best blessing that we had was my job at Elida Machine and Tool, and my boss, Terry Slane, and his wife, Carol. When Mary was sick he told me to come to work when I could, late and leave early, still paying me for 40 hrs. He gave me guidance and advice on what to do that summer.

Until 4 years ago he paid for all our health insurance and made all the payments to our profit sharing account. We were one family all 48yrs., 6 mo., and 11 days that I worked there. I loved working at the shop. We worked for plastic, stamping, guardrail, and food industries, seeing different jobs every day. I got to design new dies and see some of the newest and biggest machinery in this part of the state.

When we remodeled the church basement, I would take off work to attend meetings or to solve a problem. This was ok for me to do. Only at Elida Machine and Tool could this happen.

Thank goodness for the guidance of the good Lord through our life's decisions. Just to think if we had moved, work somewhere else and bought a farm, we could not have paid for our medical bills.

Mary and I thank the Lord for giving us the presence of Jesus in our life and all the people that let the Lord work through them to help us in times of need.

Retirement will be a big change for us, but I think we can handle it.


#### 2014 FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

Per 2013 Commitment Sunday, we anticipated minimum cash receipts of \$139,304 +\$23,220 (above). At Year-end 2014, we realized \$182,602 in cash receipts into the General Operating Fund and \$26,734 into the Building Fund. From the General Operating Fund, we spent \$164,097 and \$13,900 in building fund/capital expenditure items. Despite the record cold in early 2014, our church utilities (electric, gas, cable, water/sewer) were only over budget by \$1,425 (\$14,425 v. \$13,000). We paid our district and conference apportionments in full (again), \$18,783. Program ministries expenses were under budget thanks, in part, to those participating in the Senior ReFocus who donated food or materials to the program.




