
## **Christian Symbol**



CHI RHO

"Chi" and "rho" are the first two letters in the Greek spelling for Christ (XPICTOC, pronounced "Christos"). The

blending of these two letters into one symbol formed a "sacred monogram." Early Christians created many such symbols as codes to indicate their discipleship while avoiding detection by Roman persecutors. Many variations of the Chi Rho symbol exist, incorporating a cross, a shepherd's crook, the Greek letters alpha and omega, an anchor and other images.



"I drop kindness pebbles in still water every day, and I watch the effect they have on other people's lives. My favorite kindness pebbles are compliments. Drop a compliment and watch the ripple effect that it has in your life."

Remarkably, these cheery words come from a father who has faced many dark, difficult days. In *6 Minutes Wrestling With Life*, John Passaro tells of his daughter's heart-wrenching battle with meningitis. The struggles didn't make him bitter; rather, he frequently offers uplifting words on social media.

What if we followed Passaro's example and complimented people regularly? Philippians 4:8 (NIV) instructs us to think about things that are noble, lovely, admirable, excellent and praiseworthy. By extension, turning those positive thoughts into words causes "kindness pebbles" to spread God's light in ripples throughout someone's day — and, doubtless, through ours.

# Hymn History

### Jesus Loves Me 1860

That Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith; that you, being rooted and grounded in love, may be able to comprehend with all the saints what is the width and length and depth and height—to know the love of Christ which passes knowledge; that you may be filled with all the fullness of God. Ephesians 3:17-19

Anna and Susan Warner lived in a lovely townhouse in New York City where their father, Henry Whiting Warner, was a successful lawyer. But the "Panic of 1837" wrecked the family's finances, forcing them to move into a ramshackle Revolutionary War-era home on Constitution Island on the Hudson, right across from the Military Academy at West Point.

Needing to contribute to the family income, Anna and Susan began writing poems and stories for publication. Anna wrote "Robinson Crusoe's Farmyard," and Susan wrote "The Wide, Wide World." The girls thus launched parallel literary careers which resulted in 106 publications, eighteen of them co-authored.

One of their most successful joint projects was a novel titled *Say and Seal* in which a little boy named Johnny Fox is dying. His Sunday School teacher, John Linden, comforts him by taking him in his arms, rocking him, and making up a little song: "Jesus loves me, this I know, for the Bible tells me so...."

The novel became a best-seller, second only to *Uncle Tom's Cabin;* and when hymnwriter William Bradbury read the words of John Linden's little song (written by Anna), he composed a childlike musical score to go along with them. "Jesus Loves Me," soon became the best-known children's hymn on earth.

Despite their success, the Warner sisters never seemed able to recover from the staggering financial reverses of 1836. Years later a friend wrote, "One day when sitting with Miss Anna in the old living room she took from one of the cases a shell so delicate that it looked like lace work and holding it in her hand, with eyes dimmed with tears, she said, "There was a time when I was very perplexed, bills were unpaid, necessities must be had, and someone sent me this exquisite thing. As I held it I realized that if God could make this beautiful home for a little creature. He would take care of me.""

For forty years, Susan and Anna conducted Bible classes for cadets at West Point, and both were buried with full military honors. They are the only civilians buried in the military cemetery at West Point. To this day, their home on Constitution Island is maintained by West Point as a museum to their memory.



The children's cantata was held on December 18, 2011. The children did a wonderful job that was loved by all!



## **Homemade Hot Chocolate**



Ingredients		Instructions
1 (12 oz.) can	Evaporated milk (Not non-fat)	Makes 15-18 cups, 1/2 batch for 7 to 10 guests
1/4 cup 1/4 tsp.	Cocoa powder Salt	<ul> <li>Use a slow cooker (6qt. or larger).</li> <li>Add cocoa and hot water to bowl. Whisk until mixed</li> <li>Add Cocoa mixture along with chopped chocolate,</li> </ul>
20 oz.	Semi sweet chocolate (can use bars)	milk, heavy cream, evaporated milk, and salt to slow cooker.
1/2 cup	Sugar (used 1/4 cup for cocoa bar)	Cook on high for 4 hours or <u>low for 6 hours (best)</u> .
2 1/2 cups	Heavy cream	Stir every hour to keep chocolate from settling on the bottom.
10 cups	Whole milk (nothing less than 2%)	Leftovers can keep in refrigerator for 1 week and
1/2 cup	Hot water	warm in microwave.

2 Tbl.	Butter	Cover and store in refrigerator. Can be reheated.
