



Our Lenten Focus



Lent, the church-year season that begins on Ash Wednesday, is a time of penitence and spiritual renewal. Some people give up a luxury or vice during Lent as a form of self-denial; others undertake a project that benefits others.

The point isn't to denigrate ourselves or to see how much we can do without. Instead, Lent helps us reflect on Jesus' death. As Timothy Keller writes in *The Reason for God:* "The Christian Gospel is that I am so flawed that Jesus had to die for me, yet I am so loved and valued that Jesus was glad to die for me. This leads to deep humility and deep confidence at the same time. It undermines both swaggering and sniveling. I cannot feel superior to anyone, and yet I have nothing to prove to anyone. I do not think more of myself nor less of myself. Instead, I think of myself less."

2019 Missions Activities Report

St. Paul's Congregation and Missions Committee Efforts During 2019:

- Jesus said to "feed my sheep." Donations of food for the <u>Allentown UMC Five Loaves Food Pantry</u> continued to be strong in 2019 with St. Paul's individuals faithfully filling the food bins every month. An estimated \$1,500 worth of food was donated to the food pantry by St. Paul's in 2019! Thank you to all who donated food to feed those families who are in need in our Elida community;
- St. Paul's has monetarily supported the <u>Meals 'til Monday</u> mission which provides weekend meals to children from various elementary schools in and around Allen County, including Elida Elementary;
- St. Paul's continued to serve the needy at the Central Avenue, Lima, <u>Our Daily Bread Soup Kitchen</u> on every fifth Friday that occurred during the year. Numerous individuals represented St. Paul's as volunteers at the soup kitchen during the four 2019 dates, serving 100 to 150 persons at each gathering. Thank-you for your service in this important mission;
- Bev Nesbitt, and her band of faithful workers processed 110 school kits and 94 health kits donated by numerous members of our congregation as part of this annual mission effort. This exceeded St. Paul's effort in 2018. Pastor Paul delivered the kits to the local collection point for the West Ohio Conference Festival of Sharing;
- The small group, <u>Crafty Creatures</u> continues to bless our congregation and our community with their mission of <u>prayer shawls</u>, <u>blankets</u>, <u>and quilts</u>. They also made significant contributions to our annual mission, <u>Christmas Tree of hats</u>, <u>gloves</u>, <u>mittens</u>, <u>and scarves</u> which were donated to Samaritan House and other local shelters;
- Our members gave a total of \$850 during <u>Coins-at-Communion</u> on the first Sunday of each month. Recipients of these funds included <u>many local missions</u> as well as <u>UMCOR</u>. Our members also gave \$851 to <u>United Methodist Special Sundays</u> such as <u>UMCOR Sunday</u>, and <u>Student Day</u>;
- St. Paul's donated \$182 to the 9th Annual Brad Joseph Memorial Golf Outing in July. St. Paul's had a golf foursome with their golf fees going to the memorial fund. Also, five of our members assisted with running the outing. The Brad Joseph Memorial Fund has given out scholarships for medical mission trips to Kenya, Dominican Republic, Haiti, Mexico & Uganda in the past ten years;
- Jamie Wyant led an effort by our members to build at least three <u>wheel-chair ramps</u> in 2019 for people with special needs to gain access to their houses. This continues to be a unique mission both funded and constructed by St. Paul's members;
- On November 2nd members of St. Paul's Church handed out coffee, hot chocolate and pencils to parents and their children at the church for our <u>Trick-or-Treat Night Mission</u>. Over 300 cups of hot beverages were distributed along with pencils having St. Paul's name and website on them. Members of St. Paul's Church also participated by donating candy and manning the trunks for <u>Trunk-or-Treat</u> that same evening. Our members enjoyed this memorable evening;
- St. Paul's donated \$500 to help start a <u>mission in Haultuco, Mexico</u>. Our participation will help start a mission in southern Mexico to develop a camp for youth in the Haultuco area so they may <u>learn</u> the Gospel of Jesus Christ;
- St. Paul's members designated our Easter offering for the <u>Light The Way</u> and <u>Mission Possible</u> missions of the <u>West Ohio Conference</u>. We donated \$543.50 to each of these missions. We also designated our Christmas offering to <u>Lima Samaritan House</u>, <u>Lima Rescue Mission and UMCOR U.S. Disaster Relief</u>, and \$625.67 was donated to each;
- Our youth and a few adults left \$123.30 on "the cow" in the hallway to send to <u>Heifer International</u> to purchase items for families around the world. Thank-you to our youth and adults for their generous donations;







Ingredier	nts	Instructions
1/3 cup + 1 Tbl.	Evaporated milk	Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
1 box	German Chocolate cake	Grease and flour 9x9 inch pan. (can use parchment paper and spray lightly.)
1 stick	Butter, melted	Pour evaporated milk in bowl with cake mix. Add melted butter.
1 cup	Nuts (pecans or walnuts), chopped	Add chopped nuts, mix ingredients together. Batter will be thick. Divide the dough in half, down the middle.
3/4 can	La Lechera caramel (thinned with a little evaporated milk until	Press into bottom of pan to make first brownie layer. Bake 8 to 10 minutes or until set.
1/2 cup	smooth) Chocolate chips	Thin canned caramel with a little evaporated milk until smooth, spread caramel mixture over first baked layer.
1/ 4 cup	(semisweet) Powdered sugar (sifted)	Sprinkle Chocolate chips over top of caramel layer.
17 4 cup 1 owdered sugar (sirted)	On clean surface, press remaining dough into square and set on top of chocolate chips. Bake an additional 20 to 25 minutes.	
		Cool then refrigerate. Top with powdered sugar. Can also wrap in parchment paper and freeze in ziplock baggie, add powdered sugar before serving. (These freeze well.)



This tasty treat doubles as a game to play with a buddy.




What you need:

Looking for Love

Though not a fan of making New Year's resolutions, Jen Kramer decided to add meaning to 2018 by declaring it #theyearoflove. Each day she wrote a "love note" to a different person, expressing gratitude and offering encouragement. Recipients ranged from waiters and custodians to relatives and a terminally ill friend.

The experiment may have stemmed from the sudden, unexpected death of Kramer's father while she was away at college. "Why don't we say those things to people while they're here?" she tells the *Chicago Tribune*. "It's easy to be kind, and it's easy to tell people how you feel."

Kramer's campaign didn't cost a cent, yet it changed her life and touched hundreds of people in the process. Wherever she went, she discovered that "love showed up." It's simple, Kramer says: "You just have to look."
