

NOAH'S ARK

The image of an ark, or boat — often shown with pairs of animals — recalls the story of Noah and the

"Great Flood" in Genesis. The floodwaters represent God's judgment on sin, while the ark reminds us of his gracious power to save and redeem. In this account, Christians see a foreshadowing of our baptism into Christ: "And baptism, which [God's rescue of Noah and his family prefigured, now saves you ...

(1 Peter 3:21, NRSV)

January 12 Baptism of the Lord Sunday

The celebration of the Baptism of the Lord, observed on the first Sunday after Epiphany each year, serves three principal functions in the Christian year:

The first, to relieve the Feast of Epiphany (January 6) from what had become too many observances at once.

The second, is to allow Epiphany to become reconnected to the Christmas Seasons.

The third, is to begin the season of Ordinary Time after Epiphany and give that season a distinctive focus.

"Dyeing" With Christ

The Greek word *baptizo*, which means to immerse, became associated with the dyeing trade. When a cloth is immersed in dye, the union leads to an altered condition. The cloth's previous color no longer exists; it has a permanent new identity.

Baptizo, which has no English equivalent, is a spot-on description of what happens in the sacrament of baptism. When we're merged with Christ through water and the Word, we leave behind our original sinful condition. Through that union, Jesus gives us a new identity in him — so "we too may live a new life" (Romans 6:4, NIV).

Bible scholar James Montgomery Boice offered another great example of *baptizo* from, of all places, a 200 B.C. pickle recipe. Nicander, a Greek poet and physician, explained that a vegetable must first be "dipped" (*bapto*) into boiling water and then "baptized" (*baptizo*) in a vinegar solution. "Both verbs concern the immersing of vegetables in a solution, but the first is temporary," Boice writes. "The second, the act of baptizing the vegetable, produces a permanent change."

In the New Testament, *baptizo* "more often refers to our union and identification with Christ than to our water baptism," according to Boice. "Christ is saying that mere intellectual assent is not enough. There must be a union with him, a real change, like the vegetable to the pickle!" And like the cloth to the dye.

Hymn History

O God, Our Help in Ages past

"Then Sings My Soul" Book 1, By Robert J. Morgan

1719

Lord, You have been our dwelling place in all generations. Before the mountains were brought forth, or ever You had formed the earth and the world, even from everlasting, to everlasting, You are God. Psalm 90:1-2

Another hymn in Isaac Watts' 1719 Psalms of David Imitated is based on Psalm 90, and is perhaps Watts' most bracing hymn. It was played on the radio by the BBC as soon as World War II was declared, and was later sung at the funeral service of Winston Churchill. Some of the original verses have fallen into disuse, but as you read them, think of the ailing hymnist, sitting at the desk in his room on the Abney estate, pouring over Psalm 90 and penning these words:

Our God, our help in ages past, / Our hope for years to come, / Our shelter from the stormy blast, / and our eternal home.

Under the shadow of Thy throne / Thy saints have dwelt secure; / Sufficient is Thine arm alone, / And our defense is sure,

Before the hills in order stood, / Or earth received her frame, / From everlasting thou art God, / To endless years the same.

Thy Word commands our flesh to dust, / "Return, ye sons of men:" / All nations rose from earth at first, / And turn to earth again.

A thousand ages in thy sight / Are like an evening gone; / Short as the watch that ends the night / Before the rising sun.

The busy tribes of flesh and blood, / With all their lives and cares, / Are carried downwards by the flood, / And lost in following years.

Time, like never rolling stream, / Bears all its sons away; / They fly, forgotten, as a dream / Dies at the opening day.

Like flowery fields the nations stand / Pleased with the morning light; / The flowers beneath the mowers hand / Lie withering ere 'tis night,

Our God, our help in ages past, / Our hope for years to come, / Be Thou our guard while trouble last, / And our eternal home.

P.S. We also have great Christmas carol from this 1719 collection. As Watts studied Psalm 98, especially verses 4-9, he worded them this way: *Joy to the world, the Lord is come! Let earth receive her King!*




Make a catch of fish to show what happens when Jesus calls his first disciples.

What you need:

- Cardboard egg carton
- Acrylic paint
- Paintbrush
- · Darning needle
- · Fishing twine
- Scissors
- Googly eyes or buttons
- Glue

What you do:




- On a protected surface, turn the cups upside down. Paint the outside of each cup and both sides of the tails. Let dry.
- Thread the needle with an arm's length of twine. Tie a knot at the end.
- Thread the needle through the end of the tail. Tie another knot an inch from the tail.
- Thread the needle through one upside-down cup. Pull the twine through until the cup rests on the knot.
- Continue tying knots an inch above each cup and threading on another cup until you've strung six cups. Tie a knot above the last cup and leave a long string to hang the fish. (You can make two fish with each egg carton.)
- Add googly eyes or buttons to the last cup to make a face.

Living Our Faith

When Life Gets Out Of Control by Heidi Hyland Mann

In September 2024, a North Dakota teen's car malfunctioned, becoming unstoppable and reaching 113 miles per hour. For 40 minutes, 18-year-old Sam navigated a bridge into Minnesota, intersections with train tracks and highways, small towns and — almost — the road's dead end.

But after Sam called his mom and 911, multiple first responders gathered. Police drove near him, staying on the phone and calmly asking about the accelerator, emergency brake and remaining gas. Ambulance crews were ready. The highway patrol laid speed sticks to puncture the tires (it didn't work) and cleared intersections ahead of the runaway vehicle. All the while, Sam's mom prayed. Finally, an officer sped ahead so Sam could run into his squad car, bringing his own to a halt.

Not making light of what could have turned tragic, sometimes our lives get out of control too. We speed through work, school, relationships, parenting — trying to accomplish, achieve and gain faster than others. We cram as much in each day as possible, seemingly unable to slow down. The harried pace can endanger our physical, mental and spiritual health.

Often, we're "saved" only as people who care come alongside us to help. Perhaps family members express concern, professionals suggest remedies, loved ones pray for us. Finally, when all we can do is crash into the loving care of God, we come to rest. It may take time to recover emotionally, to dare get back "behind the wheel," to trust life to carry us at a safe speed again. But thanks be to God for placing support systems around us when we need them most.
