

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Here we are at the beginning of a new adventure. I am coming to Elida St. Paul's with one agenda, following God's Call. I have been praying as I hope you have been for the last several months about what it is we are supposed to be doing in Elida. The "we" I mention includes you and I but the largest part

of we in this equation is God. One of the unique things about who I am, is the fact that I encourage all people to find out where God is leading them. I will even miss a few Sundays along the way, but I used the word encourage in the first sentence of this paragraph and that is what I am doing, encouraging you to be uncomfortable. Encouraging you to seek what God wants from you, encouraging you to look at finances of the church, encouraging you to ask hard questions and go after the answers that scare us all. Encouraging you to be all God created you to be.

I do want to say when this is all over and I move away, (we are United Methodists after all) you and God will still be here at St. Paul's in Elida. That's the other odd thing I bring to ministry. I believe you the people of St Paul's should be driving the programs of the church. Because if I start it and run it, when I leave, it will leave with me. But if you start it and I support it, you can run it long after I am gone. Let me give you a couple of examples that I know about; building ramps for people in need is something that is exciting. The senior's ministry you have once a month is wonderful to see and has a lot of potential to serve God's people. I am sure there are other examples but these are the ones I know about already. How many more things do you or could you be doing if you were brave enough to follow God? Let's find out together.

I was supposed to write about my family, where I am from, and what I am like. If you want to know all these things about me then you will have to show up on July first. The title of the sermon is "Who Do People Say That I Am?" and I promise to answer that question on Sunday morning during the sermon.





How Many Loaves Do You Have?



A boy had five loaves and two fish

"What are you going to do about all these hungry people?" That is really the question before the disciples In John 6:1-21 as more than 5000 people gathered to hear Jesus teach and to witness his healing ways. The 12 whom he chose as his disciples, these interns of faith, are caught off guard by this massive crowd and the obvious need to provide them something to eat. They don't have enough money to cater lunch for everyone, and even if they had the means, there are no kosher delis nearby to provide the food. Most of these people live miles away, traveling the distance by leaving their homes early in the morning to be here with Jesus. There is no way in the world they could all go home for a quick bite to eat and then come back for the afternoon. What are the disciples going to do about this dilemma?

Thank goodness for Andrew. He is always willing to engage others openly and ready to try new and daring ways of solving problems. Andrew discovers the hidden resources of a young boy in their midst. The boy has brought with him a sack lunch of two small fish and five biscuits. It is a boy's

meal and even Andrew is not quite sure what can be done with such modest resources. Yet, that seems to be all the food there is in sight and the boy has made the generous offer to share what he has brought.

It turns out that the boy holds the key to the whole situation. When his meager food supply is placed unreservedly in Jesus' hands, Jesus does miraculous things with it. The whole crowd is fed. A small boy's lunch has caused big things to happen.

Today, hunger still stalks the globe. In a world of plenty, many are starving to death. Jesus' mandate is still a directive for us: "What are you going to do about it?" We must be willing to address the issue of physical hunger in the midst of the world if we are truly to receive the "bread of life" in Christ.

It seems to me that we are required by Jesus to invest what we possess for the welfare of all. No gift is too small for God's purposes. A small sack lunch provided the means for the multitude to be fed. The serious error in our judgment is that we often think in negative terms: the church is too small, the community is too unresponsive, the resources of our people are too limited. Christ calls us to give what we have, inadequate as it may seem, and let God use it. We may well be amazed at the results . . .

God gives us the means to make a difference in the world, to help feed the famished. If we are going to accept the challenge, there are two things we should know. One, that faith alone will not alleviate human suffering. Faith by itself, without works, is no faith at all. Two, neither will bread alone stop hunger. It took God's power to turn the bread into plenty for all, but God used even the meager resources offered and produced a feast. Let's stop thinking we don't have enough and begin to think that God can do amazing things with what we have to offer

We must not think of ourselves or our resources as insignificant. We are to come to Christ with what we have and who we are to be used and reshaped in the process for good. How many loaves do you have? Don't worry; it is more than enough for the work of ministry in Christ's name.

Annual Conference

Preliminary Report from 2012 Annual West Ohio UMC Conference

The annual West Ohio UMC Conference was held at Lakeside, OH, June 10th thru the 13th. It was an inspiring time. The praise groups and choirs were excellent. I will try to give more information later. This time I am trying to get in just a few of the high lights.

There were about 2,627 in attendance at the conference. The focus of giving was the health care kits and money to fund the purchase of a new airplane (a turboprop Cessna) for the "Wings of the Morning" mission program in Africa.

"Tucked into a corner of the Lubumbashi International Airport, among the decaying relics of military planes and abandoned freighters, is The United Methodist Church's hangar. In a country with few roads and very little infrastructure, the small white, warehouse metal with the church's signature Red Cross and Flame is a remarkable sight. Founded in 1960, Wings of the Morning, an aviation ministry supported by the church, provides help and hope for the sick, wounded and dying in remote areas of the country with lifesaving medical treatment. Gaston Ntambo, for the past 14 years, has flown accident-free while war raged and violence left close to 4 million people dead from starvation or disease in the remote areas where Ntambo regularly goes." (from Bishop Ntambo's bio)

Our membership contributed to the 11,263 Health Kits that were collected and the Miracle Offering. Our Miracle Offering contribution was put in the Tuesday morning collection for this. The total of that was \$493,425.23. Another collection taken Wednesday brought the amount up to \$580,882.00. With the pre-conference giving and another spontaneous collection, the total raised was \$952,283.00. Some churches then pledged various amounts to be given in the next month with the goal of fully funding this airplane.

The Bishop of this area in Africa was at our conference and gave the message for the Tuesday morning worship service. Bishop Ntambo was elected to the episcopacy in 1996 and serves the North Katanga area, Democratic Republic of Congo and also the chancellor of Africa University of Nigeria. interim Bishop Bishop Ntambo has planted about 157 churches in the region of Bukama and Zlubudi and has opened two congregations in Nairobi.

Ntambo's first term as bishop occurred as a brutal war began the same year. During that period, cholera also killed thousands. In the midst of war and disease, the bishop brought hope to the North Katanga region. Partnering with UMCOR, he brought needed agricultural products into the area. After years of war, he helped to broker a peace settlement for North Katanga and now guides the church to assist with clear water, housing,

nutritious food, solid education, and decent livelihoods.

Bishop Ntambo was very personable and spoke well. Gaston, the pilot of "Wings of the Morning", is Bishop Ntambo's son and was also present at the conference. They were both very moved and voiced their gratitude for the generosity of West Ohio UMC membership.

I was also glad that we as a church have given to this effort. Thank you.



1 cup	Flour	Preheat oven to 400 degrees.	
2/3 cup	Packed brown sugar	Combine first 5 dry ingredients in bowl. Add mixture of







Living Our Faith

Meet King David!

In the Season after Easter we learned that Jesus is the good shepherd. During July, we'll get to know another of the Bible's shepherds - David. He would one day become Israel's most powerful king, but he wasn't a very likely person to become king at all. When the prophet Samuel anointed David to be king he said these words: "The Lord does not see as mortals see; they look on the outward appearance, but the Lord looks on the heart"

(1 Samuel 16:7).

Besides being a shepherd, David was a great musician. He is also credited with writing about half of the Bible's psalms, which were used in worship as songs. We don't know for certain, but maybe the words of Psalm 51 were part of David's prayers.

Read this psalm from the Bible; then think of a time when you have done something wrong. Did you tell anyone what you had done? Did you suffer any consequences? Did you receive assurance of forgiveness? Do you feel forgiven? Rewrite Psalm 51 in your own words, draw the psalm as a picture, or tell someone else some of your thoughts and feelings.
