





# Connecting With ...

# Dan Best Retirement What happened to the last 43 years??

That's a question that I have asked myself quite a few times since I began planning for my retirement over the past year. Forty three years is the time that I had worked at the Department of Agriculture and several financial institutions through my career.

Through this retirement process it also dawned on me that what my grandparents and parents told was correct - time certainly does go faster the older you are!!

The 43 years began when I graduated from The Ohio State University with a B.S. degree in Agricultural Economics. The economy and the job market were not very strong at that time and the only solid job offer that I accepted was with the Dept. of Agriculture in Chicago. I recall setting off for Chicago in my 1967 Ford Galaxy (a car that started most of the time) with no friends, contacts or place to stay in a very large strange city. I was pleased to discover that there were over 20 other recent college graduates that were in the same straits and I made several friends and together we rented an apartment and socialized after work and on the weekends. The job involved collecting and testing grain as it was loaded on to ships and trains for export.

After 6 months I was offered a job again with the Dept. of Agriculture but with a Govt. lending agency called Farmer's Home Administration. A great benefit with this job was that it was located in Bowling Green, Ohio, which was much closer to family and friends in Lima. For the next 6 years I learned about making and servicing agricultural and home loans. The greatest benefit of this job and any other job since then was that I met a co-worker - Margie who would eventually become my wife!! I also stayed busy after work building a house in Bowling Green. My next job was with the Farm Credit System in Ottawa, Ohio, that also involved making farm and home loans in a 4 county area. I also kept busy after work building a house in Findlay. I stayed with this job for 6 yrs,

Acting on a tip from a friend, I applied for my next job as a commercial loan officer at the Toledo Trust Bank in Delphos. I accepted that position and moved to Elida. The most note worthy item about my tenure here was that the name of the bank changed 4 times in 10 yrs. The joke around town was that the bank signs were installed with Velcro so that they could be quickly and easily changed.

My next job was with a smaller bank in Defiance, again making and servicing mostly farm loans. After 3 years of driving to Defiance, (by the way, there is no good way to drive from Elida to Defiance) Bryan, Archbold and many other smaller towns in far northwest Ohio, I had an opportunity to transfer to an affiliate bank much closer to home in Lima. From there it was 8 yrs. at First Federal Bank in Ottawa and Lima.

The last 9 yrs. of my career I spent at The Union Bank Co. on Elida Rd. In Lima. My responsibilities there were making & servicing mostly commercial loans and some farm loans.

With reflecting back on my career it seems like I couldn't hold a job, but each change gave me a great opportunity to meet a variety of people and to make good, long-lasting relationships with my clients and co-workers. So, I guess that I wouldn't have changed a thing. By the way, I still haven't figured out what happened to those 43 years!!





## Connecting With ...

#### **Marty White Retirement**

After nearly 40 ½ years with Buckeye Pipe Line Company, now an affiliate company of Buckeye Partners, L.P., founded in Lima as part of the Rockefeller empire in 1886, I retired May 1, 2019. Buckeye's last corporate headquarters in Ohio was located on the corner of S. Dixie Highway and Buckeye Road, Lima. Today, the building is occupied by St. Rita's Occupational Health and a few other tenants. Buckeye relocated its headquarters to Macungie, PA (adjacent to Allentown, PA) in the late 1960s. It was here that Kathy first joined Buckeye in 1976 and I followed in December, 1978. Kathy left Buckeye in 1979 for Stanley-Vidmar, a division of The Stanley Works, but Buckeye couldn't seem to shake me loose. After years of listening to stories about Lima and Midwestern company operations and administration from associates that relocated to the Allentown, PA area, I found myself in Lima following a job relocation in 1992....and the rest is history.

Most of my company activities were in the area of 'Real Estate, Right of Way, and Damage Prevention.' There is no formal training, for the most part, for this position - only patience and perseverance....lots of patience! My degree is from the School of Hard Knocks (actually, from Moravian College in Bethlehem, PA, in Business Management.) Consequently, I feel I could deliver sermons over a month of Sundays on the nature and mindset of the average property owner or public agency. company spokesperson during emergency response or other media issues, I have given numerous on-camera interviews. I have been before the court several times in Lima (Common Pleas and Appellate), Lucas County, OH, and Genesee Co., MI. As an agent in Buckeye's Right of Way Dept., I was expected to be a jack-of-all-trades. Time-permitting, that's O.K. but it gets old....which is why I retired from my full-time position of 60-70 hours per week and am moving on to a new position (or job status) as *contract* agent for Buckeye - same desk, same office on Buckeye Road (the smaller office built in 1978 closer to the Army tank plant.) Under this job scenario, I hope to drop to 40 hours per week with far fewer balls in the air. So, not exactly the complete definition of 'retirement' but definitely a step in the right direction until Social Security/Medicare kick in, assuming these benefits still exist in 3-4 years.

# **EASY** Connections

The United Methodist Church is a denomination that focuses on building connections between the local church and community, between other congregations and with the united church. Its goal is to lead people into a connection with God through Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit.

For the past few years, the St. Paul UMC congregation and the Immanuel UMC congregation have worked together at EASY to connect with middle school students and their families. Those who volunteered had fun, laughter, and, at times, frustration with the current and former students. Through the years, we saw shy students turn into confident, outgoing teens. We celebrated with them as they passed tests and raised their grades. We talked with parents and suggested ways to interact with the school more effectively. We found hidden interests through board games and skills groups. We listened to stories of families where the connection had broken and the pain those breaks caused in their lives. We watched them develop leadership skills to help younger or struggling students. We got to follow them into high school as they returned to volunteer or just stop by for a chat.

After six and a half years, our volunteers' lives have changed and we have come to the conclusion that we cannot continue with the same structure for EASY. It nearly brought us to tears on the last day as formerly difficult students gave us hugs and said they would be back in the fall. The EACC board is talking about ways to continue in some form but we haven't figured out what that will be. The need for love and relationships among these children is great and brings wonderful rewards to them and our community.

The EACC is at a turning point as we work towards new leadership and community interaction. The needs of Elida continue to be much the same as they were when we developed ReFocus with Rev. Solo: activities for our youth, seniors, and families. In fact, they became the focus of St. Paul's Mission Statement. The board will work toward involving more community members so please join us if you would like to further our outreach to our neighbors.

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# **Living Our Faith**

#### What Rain Reveals



Unless you're a pluviophile (someone who loves rain), a stretch of sunshine-free days can seem drab and dreary. To make South Korea's long monsoon season more colorful, art students created murals on some Seoul sidewalks with

hydrochromic paint. It's invisible on dry surfaces, but as soon as water hits, vibrant images appear. Rain transforms gray pavement into bright scenes of fish, whales and turtles.

Life's storms, whether literal or figurative, can dampen our enthusiasm and even challenge our faith. Yet adversity often reveals God's true colors—and ours. And by praising God "rain or shine," we, as his artwork, reveal that our Creator and his every brushstroke are trustworthy.

#### A Father's Legacy

For Joseph Dodson, the pressures and responsibilities of parenthood felt compounded when he and his wife adopted a son. Dodson, a Bible professor, wonders if Jesus' earthly father also struggled with doubts and fears.

Scripture doesn't say much about Joseph, but he clearly left Jesus "a significant legacy," Dodson writes in *Bible Study Magazine*. Joseph obeyed God — despite the risk to his reputation — by marrying a pregnant woman. Joseph, a son of David, raised *the* Son of David as his very own. To protect his family he fled to Egypt, foreshadowing the "new exodus" of Jesus' saving ministry. And Joseph heard neighbors mock Jesus as "the carpenter's son."

"Joseph taught Jesus much more than woodworking," Dodson writes. "He modeled for his adopted son how, for God's glory, he must drink the Father's cup no matter the cost."
