


## EASY Update

#### **Church Cancellation Notification List**

The church cancellation notification list has been used a couple of times over the past month. If you did not receive this information, please contact the church office with how you wish to be notified, either by cell phone text message, email or a phone call. If there is a **level 2 snow emergency** we will be canceling services automatically. Where do you look for snow emergency levels? <u>www.allen-ema.com</u> is the official site for Allen County Ohio Emergency Management Agency where you can see what snow level we are currently under or listen to local radio or TV stations. The Lima TV station and WLIO and WBCL radio stations are also notified. Church may be cancelled due to other unforeseen circumstances, for example, heating issues or flooding. We may also be using this notification system to send out an all church reminder or other necessary information. It is important that you keep your information up to date with the church office.



#### Christian Symbol ROOSTER

The rooster is reminiscent of Peter's threefold denial of Jesus on the night of Jesus' trial (Matthew 26:34, NIV); thus, it may represent faithlessness in general, especially in the face danger. Because of the of rooster's early-morning call, it's also symbolic of watchfulness: "There-fore keep watch," said Jesus, illustrating the return of the Son of Man, "because you do not know when the owner of the house will come back – whether in the evening, or at midnight, or when the rooster crows, or at dawn" (Mark 13:35, NIV).

Welcome to Elida and St. Paul's, Title. We are pleased to have you here this year!










## Winter Activities




## **Connecting With ...**

#### **Comforting Those Who Mourn**

Words aren't always necessary — or even beneficial — when people are hurting. In <u>Killing</u> <u>Giants, Pulling Thorns</u> (Zondervan), Charles Swindoll tells of a girl who went to comfort the mother of a deceased playmate.

"What did you say?" the girl's parents later asked.

"Nothing," she replied. "I just climbed up on her lap and cried with her."

Joseph Bayly, who experienced the deaths of three children, shares a similar experience in <u>The View From a Hearse</u> (David C. Cook): "I was sitting, torn by grief. Someone came and talked to me of God's dealings, of why it happened, of hope beyond the grave. He talked constantly. He said things I knew were true. I was unmoved, except to wish he'd go away. He finally did.

"Another came and sat beside me. He didn't talk. He didn't ask me leading questions. He just sat beside me for an hour or more, listened when I said something, answered briefly, prayed simply, left. I was moved. I was comforted. I hated to see him go."


Ingredients		Instructions

## **Living Our Faith**

#### Luke's Passion Story

There's always a little awkwardness when reading Luke's account of the entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday (Luke 19:28-40). The key reason is that Luke does not mention any palms!

All the other Gospels mention branches, but not Luke. Is this intentional or is it merely a writer's omission? Did he think they were not important? We may never know. But Luke does give another wonderful detail unique to this Gospel. The religious leaders tell Jesus to order his disciples to stop shouting words of praise. Jesus replies, "I could - but it wouldn't do any good, because if they were silent, the very stones themselves would shout." In other words, not only do all the people recognize Jesus as God's chosen one, but also all of creation.

Luke is confusing, to be sure, in that its details differ from the other Gospels and 1 Corinthians 11:24-25. But does it matter?

The point is still the same as the others: just before dying Jesus shared a meal with his closest friends. In that meal Jesus invited them and us to

remember him in the eating of every meal.

Remembering Jesus - it's not so much about what we do as it is about simply doing it.

#### St. Patrick's Day Trivia

You may know that St. Patrick used shamrocks to teach about the Trinity, but did you know these other facts about him?

• St. Patrick wasn't Irish. (His parents were Roman citizens living in either Scotland or Wales.)

• He was kidnapped and sold as a slave at age 16. After escaping six years later, he joined a monastery in England.

• March 17 is the date of St. Patrick's death, not his birth. He died in 461 A.D.

• The color originally associated with St. Patrick is blue, not green.

• The harp, not the shamrock, is the national symbol of Ireland.
