



Ewer and Basin

The ewer (a vase-shaped pitcher) and basin, which svmbolize cleansing. are related to two biblical events from Holy Week: when Jesus washed his disciples' feet (John 13:1-17), and when Pilate "washed his hands of" Iesus' before the crucifixion blood (Matthew 27:24). Because of the foot-washing, the ewer and basin have become a symbol of service ministry.

Heating Project Update

We have installed a small furnace in the pastor's study. There were heat ducts run over to the church office and the meeting room. We have installed a drop ceiling in all of the three rooms, we have installed new T-8 lighting and Art Holman painted the rooms.

This is the first of the three furnaces that will be installed in the upper floor of the Ed. wing. Then we can unhook the boiler from the whole Ed. wing. This will let us have zone heating, just heating where we are using the space. The furnaces also will have air condition on them.

All this is done from the giving to the building fund. The trustees thank you all for supporting the fund and the trustees.





Our Church History

In **1848**, a Methodist Episcopal Church was erected at Allentown, Ohio, where formerly a society had formed and met for the public services in the school house. Now the membership of the two groups united in the new church.


In **1850**, the Rev. A Harmount began preaching at the home of James Peltier, north of Elida. This house was later owned by Noah Sherrick. In 1852, the Village of Elida was laid out and plotted by Griffith John, its founder.

In **1853**, a new organization of Methodists was formed in Elida. The Revs. Harrison Maltbie and N. C. Love were preachers on the circuit. This society was organized in the home of James Kennedy, later owned by S. D. Crites, which is now 114 W. Main St. The following persons formed this fellowship: James Kennedy, Malinda Kennedy, James Peltier, Jane Peltier, Henry Herring, Nancy Herring, Smith Baxter, Mary Baxter, Nathan John, Lucy John, Griffith John, Rachel John, Margaret Cremean, Jesse J. John, Elizabeth Boyer, Fleet Clark, Mary Clark, Elizabeth Priddy, and Catherine Evans.

In **1856**, the society erected the first Methodist Episcopal Church in Elida. It was a frame building, sided with black walnut lumber, and located south of the present Lutheran Church, approximately where Route 309 now passes through Elida. This was also the site of the Elida Cemetery. It was completed in 1856 for a total cost of \$1,000. The Rev. Jason Wilcox attended the new church until Rev. Francis Plumb, the first pastor, took over. He served the church from 1858-1860.

In **1874**, the Elida Charge was formed. This was made up of three churches: Elida, Morris Chapel, and Zion. The deed for Morris Chapel Church was recorded in 1869. The Zion Church deed was recorded in 1875, and the deed for Elida Church was recorded in 1895. The three churches were very closely tied together. Many meetings were held in unison and the congregations had many good times together socially. The membership of the Elida Charge was 280. Rev. Dwight Cook was pastor of the Elida Church, which had a membership of 104.

In **1890**, the existing brick structure was erected at a cost of \$7,500. It had a seating capacity of 500, with membership of 180. It maintained a live Sunday School and a large active Epworth League. The Rev. Walter H. Leatherman was the pastor. The Board of Trustees consisted of J. J. John, Abia John, N. L. Boyer, William Pierson, S. S. Sherrick, Smith Baxter, Noah Sherrick, David Brenneman, S. D. Crites, and G. R. Leist. The old frame church was moved to the Elida elevator lot and used as a warehouse.

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

Baked Broccoli



Living Our Faith

Taking Up the Cross

"That's her cross to bear," it's said of someone's hardship or inconvenience. The challenge might be as serious as poverty or as trivial as crabby neighbors. However, when Jesus called people to "take up their cross," he didn't mean it that way. Nor was he referring to anyone imposing suffering on another.

When Jesus said, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me" (Matthew 16:24 and parallels), he spoke of a radical new way to engage a society that more often called people to take up swords and fight for self-preservation. He called people to peace, not violence — and from being self-focused to following him.

That is also Jesus' call today. The cross isn't a euphemism that lets us dismiss someone's suffering. We don't appoint someone else to bear it. When we choose the cross, we do so for ourselves in response to Jesus' invitation that, one way or another, ultimately leads through death to new life.

No More Sting



One spring day, a father and son were driving when a bee flew in the window and buzzed around. Because the boy was deathly allergic to bee

stings, he panicked. But the calm father reached out and caught the bee in his hand, holding it tight.

After a few moments, the dad reached over, opened his hand and showed his son the stinger, stuck in his palm. "It's okay," the father said. "I took the sting, so the bee can't hurt you."

Likewise, people who know Jesus as their victorious Savior no longer need to fear the sting of death. "O death, where is your victory? O death, where is your sting?" (1 Corinthians 15:55, ESV).
