

Happy March, or more like muddy March? That wonderful time of the year when you are hoping for Spring but ready for the snowstorm that may come along. I have a couple of things I want to address here in my monthly newsletter article. Our Administrative Council met last month, and we

have a potential problem with our finances. We also have a couple of simple solutions to the problem. We have about \$30,000 less in our bank account than we did a year ago. I know it has been hard for all of us, with the increasing cost of goods and services in our world. How do we regain the financial security of that \$30,000? Solution number one: We currently have about 40 families that are regular givers here at St. Paul's Church. If every family gave an extra \$15 a week over the course of the year, we would regain all of that \$30,000. Problem solved! Solution number two: We invite more people to church and over the course of the year, add 10 new families who each give \$3,000 annually. Again, problem solved! I know you may be asking yourself if I am serious, yes I am! There are a lot of great things happening in the life of our church, and we are beginning to have an impact on our community through your actions and prayers. I have been praying about what I should write in this article, and I know God will lead us through the crisis and overcome it with a victory for the Kingdom of God. I want to invite you to be in prayer about our church finances and follow God's leading in resolving this problem.

You should also be praying for your friend, neighbor, family member, coworker, or whoever you chose to give your Valentines cookie to. Someone not attending a church who you know needs to hear, see, and experience the Love of God in their lives. This month, you will receive another assignment for the person you chose. When in conversation with them, maybe begin to discuss St. Paul's and what a positive impact your church family has had on your life. Look for places where God is showing you a way to impact their lives, with God's Love, and be brave enough to be the Love of God in their life. Many times, just listening and loving them right where they are is all that is needed. The phrase I use, "listen, listen, love, love", comes from the fact that most of us just want to know there is someone who cares enough to hear us and love us. Be those ears, encourage your person, and if necessary, use words to show them love.

I hope you will all join me in praying for God's guidance with church, family, and every area of your life. If we follow Jesus and commit to one another, then we will overcome all the obstacles of life. I look forward to seeing you in church, and if you feel like you have a solution to the problem above, come see me, your solution may be the one God uses to get us back on track. Until then, I will see you in the mission field.



Hymn History

Savior, Like a Shepherd Lead Us

"Then Sings My Soul" Book 2, By Robert J. Morgan

1836

For the Lamb who is in the midst of the throne will shepherd them and lead them to living fountains of waters. And God will wipe away every tear from their eyes. Revelation 7:16, 17 (NKJV)

This hymn, originally for children, first appeared in a n1836 volume entitled *Hymns for the Young*, compiled by Dorothy A. Thrupp. Many hymnologist have attributed the words to Mrs. Thrupp, but her authorship is uncertain. One early hymnbook attributed it to Henry Francis Lyte; but that, too, is doubtful.

There's no doubt, however, about the composer of the music. It was the famous William Bradbury, one of the prolific hymnists of the nineteenth century. A native of York, Maine, William moved to Boston at age fourteen to enroll in Boston Academy of Music. There he joined Lowell Mason's choir at Bowdoin Street Church.

Lowell Mason was a banker-turned-composer who became the first American to receive a Doctorate in Music from an American university. A dedicated Christian, he had written the tunes for such hymns as "Joy to the World!", "My Faith looks up to Thee", "Nearer Thy God to Thee", and from Greenland's Icy Mountains." Mason was passionate about training children in sacred music.

Recognizing that young William Bradbury had an inborn talent, mason sought to encourage him at every turn. Soon William was playing the organ under Mason's watchful eye, and earning a whopping \$25 a year in the process.

William was so inspired by his mentor that he moved to New York City to do there what Mason had been doing in Boston—encouraging the Christian musical education of children. He organized and led Children's singing conventions, encouraged music in New York school system, and publishing Sunday school songbooks. During his lifetime, fifty-nine separate books appeared under his name.

Bradbury set into motion a great change in American church music. Prior to his work, most hymns were heavy, noble, and stately. William wanted to write lighter melodies that children could sing. His compositions were softer, full of movement, and easier for children to sing.

In so doing, William Bradbury helped usher in the area of gospel music. He may not have realized that adults would sing his hymns as readily as children would, but he paved the way for the likes of Fannie Crosby and Ira Sankey. Today Bradbury is remembered as the musical composer of such favorites as: "He Leadeth Me," "The Solid Rock," "Just As I Am," "Jesus Loves Me," "Sweet Hour of Prayer" and this one—"Savior, Like a Shepherd Lead Us."



Missions Activities Year-End Report

CONGREGATION AND MISSIONS COMMITTEE EFFORTS DURING THE YEAR OF 2024:

REPORT SUBMITTED BY TIM PIPER, MISSIONS CHAIRPERSON

- Donations of food for the **Allentown Five Loaves Food Pantry** continued to be strong in 2024 with St. Paul's individuals faithfully filling the food bins every month. Thank you to all who donated food to feed Elida families;
- St. Paul's has monetarily supported the **Meals 'til Monday** mission which provides weekend meals to children from various elementary schools in and around Allen County, including Elida Elementary;
- Janna Thompson and her helpers processed 56 school kits and 35 health kits and 31 period packs donated by numerous members of our congregation as part of this UMC annual mission and Pastor Paul delivered the kits;
- The small group, Crafty Creatures continues to bless our congregation and our community with their mission of prayer shawls, blankets, and quilts. They also made significant contributions to our Christmas Tree of hats, gloves, mittens, and scarves which were donated to Crossroads Crisis Center and Our Daily Bread.
- Our members gave a total of \$1,173 during Coins-at-Communion on the first Sunday
 of each month. Recipients of these funds included many local missions, ACTS
 Sunnydale House as well as UMCOR. Our members also gave \$1,532 to United
 Methodist Special Sundays such as UMCOR Sunday, and Native American
 Awareness Day;
- Our members built several **wheel-chair ramps** in 2024 for people with special needs to gain access to their houses. This continues to be a unique mission both funded and constructed by St. Paul's members;
- Up to 6 families were housed at **Family Promise of Lima**. St. Paul's members partnered with local churches to **provide hot meals** for one evening during four designated weeks and sometimes stayed to talk with the families;
- On October 31st members of St. Paul's Church handed out coffee, hot chocolate and pencils to parents and their children at the church for our **Trick-or-Treat Night Mission.** Over 250 cups of hot beverages were distributed. Members of St. Paul's Church also participated by donating candy and tending the car trunks for **Trunk-or-Treat** that same evening. Our members enjoyed this memorable evening while greeting our Elida neighbors;
- St. Paul's members donated the Easter offering to **UMCOR International Disaster Relief**;
- Our congregation members dispensed water for **LifeWise Academy/Sunnydale House's 5K Run** and some of our members also ran in the 5K run; **LifeWise Academy** teaches elementary students about the Bible and life skills;
- Our youth and adults donated \$232 which was left on our "hallway heifer" to send to **Heifer International** to purchase farm animals for families around the world. Thank-you to everyone for your donations;
