

Pack a Gift and Pray



Missions

Recent St. Paul's Missions

Jamie Wyant built a small ramp for a handicapped person in Lima. Since it was small, he did not enlist any help to build it. June 11th was Work Day at Camp Wesley. A small group of St. Paul's and Immanuel people from Elida worked on the pavilion roof and cleared trees to prepare for the new cabin to be built. Jamie is waiting to see if they need our group to go back in the fall to finish the roof, which is about 70% complete.

Maedene Holmes headed up an effort by the St. Paul's congregation to collect Health and School Kits. We collected 96 school kits and 40 health kits! Additionally, \$334.50 was donated to be sent with the kits and to pay for bags for the school kits. Thanks also to Maedene Holmes for again heading up this annual mission at St. Paul's. On September 7th Maedene, Anne Lehman, Shirley Moser, Martha Vazquez, Bev Nesbitt, Jean Thomas, Lavonne Segovia, Shara Bowsher, Jamie Wyant and Tim Piper helped to go through the school and health kits to check for completeness. Pastor Paul delivered the kits to the collection point where they were taken to the West Ohio Conference Festival of Sharing at Otterbein University on September 17th.

Jamie is again heading up the effort to collect 200 or more Operation Christmas Child boxes from our congregation. The boxes will be collected at St. Paul's church during the week of November 14th through November 21st. They will then be delivered to a collection point by Jamie.

St. Paul's volunteers, Martha Vazquez, Jean Thomas, Helen and Dillon Staas, Deb Hurd, Lavonne Segovia, and Tim Piper served at Our Daily Bread soup kitchen on September 30th. We served 101 persons food prepared by ODB. Our next day to serve will be December 30th.

Donations to Coins-for-Communion and to the Five Loaves Food pantry remains strong by our congregation. Thank you to everyone who faithfully supports these missions.

We are looking for about seven volunteers to help with Trick-or-Treat night to serve hot chocolate and coffee and hand out pencils to Trick-or-Treaters on Thursday, October 27th. This mission is an exciting outreach for our church as we have direct contact with families in our immediate vicinity. If you can help that night, contact the office.

During the August Missions Committee meeting, a motion was passed to designate the June Coins-for-Communion collection to UMCOR, West Virginia flood relief. Our church Treasurer has mailed the check. At the October Missions meeting, the Mission Committee will determine the recipient(s) of the Christmas Offering for this year.


Recently, 'thank-you' letters have been received from Meals-til-Monday, Church World Service, and Samaritan House for donations sent by St. Paul's UMC.

Our Church History (1980-1983)

One of Rev. Puffenberger's special emphases was to have more concern for each other. He instituted a custom of having a single chrysanthemum delivered to a person in the hospital, usually carried by him.

At funerals, he met with the family a day or two before the funeral and had them talk freely about the deceased, exploring their life from early youth. Matters that had been discussed became part of the sermon and a printed summary for those attending, in which there were responsive readings, hymn words, and a unison prayer commending the person became a souvenir.

The matter of doing something about the church structure was initiated. The choices for future development were discussed in neighborhood groups, then tabulated and presented to the Ad. Council. It was decided that renovation of the existing building was the right way to go. The Trustees broke the remodeling into steps, the first being to replace the slate roof.

During this time of planning for renovation, the spiritual life was not neglected. One instrument used was an evaluation of the personal devotional life, the concern for others, the sustaining of others in times of crises, personal ethics, self-improvement, and the interpretation of faith, in teaching, participation in cultural, economic, and political systems, work and witness within and without the church, and taking part in responsibilities in the church and district and conference.

In September, 1980, recognition was given to Mrs. Evelyn Broshes for her memorial to St. Paul's Church. Attendance folders were presented in memory of her husband, Robert.

One event, coming directly from Rev. Puffenberger near the end of this first year at St. Paul's, was a service and dinner recognizing the volunteers in the Elida Fire and Rescue Squad on May 3, 1981. They were special guests at the worship service, followed by a bountiful dinner, contributed by the congregation and enjoyed by all. A plaque was presented to the department and a certificate was given to each member.

As plans were made for remodeling the church building, people were asked to make a 3-year pledge for finances. The trustees engaged an architectural firm to develop plans, including easier access for the handicapped.

During Allen's second year an outreach was introduced which was named Someone Cares. Sue Holmes was the leader and the first year after seeing the needs, especially in Lima's south side, clothing was collected and 135 bags of food packed. A classified ad telling of free food and clothing was put in The Lima News. Before the doors were opened, a line four wide had formed and stretched through the north parking lot over into the schoolyard. Rev. Puffenberger, with a bull horn, announced that people would be admitted a few at a time. The Elida Police and Allen County Sheriff's Deputies helped hold the lines. In an hour all the food was gone; in two hours all the clothing. The disappointed waiting in line had to be dispersed.

Someone cares was later modified so that food and children's Christmas gifts were delivered to homes of those who had applied earlier. Later, for safety, particularly for the young people who helped, the home deliveries were changed to disbursing the donations at Southside Center. St. Paul's developed a caring ministry with Southside and with Cheryl Allen, who headed the center. She spoke at a morning worship service, not long before her fatal illness.





Fueled by Thankfulness

Thankfulness is not a minor virtue. It is not one of the elementary virtues that may be left behind as we become more mature. I believe that thankfulness is essential to the strength of every virtue, and that without it every other branch is starved and lean.

Life without thankfulness is devoid of love and passion. Hope without thankfulness is lacking in fine perception. Faith without thankfulness lacks strength and fortitude. Every virtue divorced from thankfulness is maimed and limps along the spiritual road.

Always Thankful

Martin Rinkart, a German Lutheran minister, wrote the hymn "Now Thank We All Our God" in 1636. At the time, the Thirty Years' War was ravaging central Europe, claiming millions of lives. Rinkart served as pastor in Eilenburg, a walled town that became a crowded refuge for starving fugitives. Although Rinkart was struggling to provide for his own family, he opened his own home to people in need.

After the plague entered Eilenburg, Rinkart conducted up to 50 funerals a day — including services for his wife and the only other two pastors in town. Amid the despair, he wrote many hymns, including "Now Thank We All Our God." Originally intended as a table prayer, it's now sung at Thanksgiving to remember God's "countless gifts of love" — even during hardships.



Now Thank We All Our God
