





Christ the King Sunday November 25

King of kings and Lord of lords



In the Bible, no one is called "Lord of lords" but God and Christ. Although a couple of Old Testament earthly kings (Artaxerxes and Nebuchadnezzar) are

referred to as "king of kings," only in reference to Christ is the term capitalized — "King of kings."

Earthly rulers can claim supremacy, but we celebrate Christ the King Sunday as the culmination of the liturgical year to testify that our Lord Jesus is Ruler of *all*. In the words of the famous "Hallelujah" chorus from Handel's *Messiah*: "King of kings and Lord of lords; and he shall reign for ever and ever!"

The earliest official reference to using "Taps" at a military funeral is described in an 1891 manual. During the Civil War, a Union soldier "was buried at a time when the battery occupied an advanced position concealed in the woods." Because it wasn't safe to fire the customary three volleys over the grave, Captain John Tidball decided the sounding of "Taps" would be an appropriate substitute ceremony.

Previously, "Taps" signaled the end of a soldier's work day, but it has since come to honor the end of his or her earthly life. Horace Trim's lyrics remind us of God's constant presence:

Day is done, gone the sun From the lakes, from the hills, from the sky All is well, safely rest God is nigh.

Thanks and praise for our days 'Neath the sun, 'neath the stars, 'neath the sky As we go, this we know God is nigh.





October 6th, Deb Hurd & Martha Vazquez had the honor of representing St. Paul's UMC at Our Daily Bread's Annual Volunteer Appreciation Dinner. The dinner was cooked and served by the Culinary Arts students at Apollo Career Center and they did a super job.

Our Daily Bread reaches out to many in the community and we are so fortunate to have such a wonderful facility. A special thanks goes out to Randy Kimpel - Director, "Miss Sharon" Downton - Chef, and Cory, Heidi, and Justin - the Essential Kitchen Assistants.

There have been lots of new things happening at ODB. St. Rita's donated a new washer and dryer and also finished 2 new showers for the people to use at the facility. The First Church of New Knoxville donated all new tables and chairs. Thanks to both of these groups.

Some statistics from 2017 which is amazing: a total number of 40,693 meals were served at an average of 170 meals per day. An average food cost per meal was 9 cents and an average service cost per meal was \$2.95. This final figure is outstanding - the total amount of PURCHASED food for the <u>entire year</u> was only \$3,525.00!!!!! All of the rest of the food was donated. This goes to show that we are indeed stepping up to be the hands and feet of God but providing for the hungry.

God bless all who donate or volunteer!!!!






Samaritans Purse Operation Christmas Child




Pumpkin Bars

4	Eggs	Beat first 4 ingredients together until light and fluffy.		
1 2/3 cups	Sugar	Sift dry ingredients together and add to pumpkin mixture

2 cups	Flour (sifted)	Bake at 350 degrees for 25 to 30 minutes. Cool.

1 tsp.	Salt	Spread over cooled pumpkin bars.



Living Our Faith

More Than Skin Deep

Gratitude, said Martin Luther, is "the basic Christian attitude." Yet gratitude is much more than a state of mind. Often it's a decision, and it becomes an act of humility when we recognize our depravity — and our need for a Savior.

The 10 disgraced lepers who beg Jesus for mercy (see Luke 17:11-19) are described as *allogenes,* Greek for "outcast." (All humans, sick with sin, fit that description!) The leper who returned to give thanks received more than just physical healing, according to Scripture. When Jesus says, "Your faith has made you well," he uses the Greek that means "Your faith has saved you." The grateful leper, recognizing his depravity, humbly decides to return and give thanks, knowing — through faith — that his skin *and* his soul have been healed.

Little Word, Big Difference

God says to give thanks in everything. That doesn't mean you need to give thanks *for* everything. You don't need to give thanks *for* that bad day. Or *for* that bad relationship. Or being passed over at work. Financial hardship. Whatever it is — you are not to give thanks *for* the difficulties but rather *in* the difficulties.

That is a very important distinction, and one I think we often miss. Giving thanks *in* everything shows a heart of faith that God is bigger than the difficulties and that he can use them, if you approach him with the right heart and spirit, for your good and his glory.
