Plumb Line

In the writings of the prophets Isaiah and Amos, a plumb line is a symbol of God's judgment of Israel: "I will make justice the measuring line and righteousness the plumb line" (Isaiah 28:17, NIV); The Lord was standing by a wall that had been built true to plumb, with a plumb line in his hand. ... Then the Lord said, "Look, I am setting a plumb line among my people Israel; I will spare them no longer" (Amos 7:7-8, NIV). When Jesus is portrayed as Judge of the world, he is sometimes shown holding a plumb line.



Lemon Surprise Coffee Cake

Ingredients Instructions		
	Streusel:	Heat oven to 350 degrees.
1/2 cup	Flour (all purpose)	Grease and flour a 10 or 9 inch springform pan.
1/2 cup	Flour (all pulpose)	Streusel:
1/3 cup	Sugar	In medium bowl, combine flour and sugar; mix well.
3 Tbl.	Butter	Cut in butter until mixture is coarse crumbs. Stir in coconut
1/2 cup	Coconut	Coffee Cake:
	Coffee Cake:	In large bowl combine flour, sugar, baking powder, baking soda, and salt. Mix well. Add butter, yogurt, lemon peel,
2 1/4 cups	Flour (all purpose)	lemon juice, egg and egg yolk. Stir mixture with spoon until well blended.
1 cup	Sugar	Spread 2 cups of batter in greased and floured pan.;
1/2 tsp.	Baking powder	sprinkle with 3/4 cups of streusel. Drop lemon pie filling (or lemon curd) by 1/2 teaspoonfuls over streusel to with in
1/2 tsp.	Baking soda	1/2 inch of edge. Spoon remaining batter over lemon pie filling (or lemon curd); sprinkle with remaining streusel.
1/2 tsp.	Salt	Bake at 350 degrees for 50 to 60 minutes or until toothpick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool 10 minutes.
3/4 cup	Butter (softened)	Remove sides of pan.
2/3 cup	Vanilla yogurt	Glaze:
2 tsp.	Lemon peel (grated)	In small bowel combine all glaze ingredients; blend until smooth. Drizzle over coffee cake.
1 Tbl.	Lemon juice	Cool 1 hour. Serve warm. Makes 12 servings.

16th-Century Guidance For Today

How can we know whether we're following God's will? Sometimes we act, only to see in hindsight that we caused harm. Or self-righteousness blinds us to the good guidance of others.

St. Ignatius of Loyola pondered the difficulty of aligning our actions to God's ways. He taught the need for "discernment of spirits" — examining Internal thoughts and emotions to see if they originate with and lead to God. Ignatius called it "consolation" when he felt loved by God and eager to care for people in need, and "desolation" when something left him full of darkness and fear that moved him away from God and neighbor.

Think of a time you made a decision and then felt peaceful, full of light, convinced it was "right." And when have you done something despite feeling tangled in knots about it, and perhaps later felt worse? Life isn't always so clear-cut, but the more we practice discernment, the better we will recognize and follow God's will.
