

The nimbus is a halo of light often shown in art behind the head of a religious figure such as Mary, Joseph, the disciples, the four evangelists and so forth. Though often just a simple circle, one with three rays symbolizes the Trinity, so this style of nimbus — or a triangular one — may be seen behind Christ.

Elida After School Youth Program (EASY)


HAPPY NEW YEAR!

Spotlight On Seniors



Meet Mary LaRue, member of St. Paul's since March 28, 1948. Mary was born in Jackson Twp., Allen Co., on December 3, 1919. She was one of 4 children: 2 sisters and her brother. Basil Hall. They lived on a farm in Jackson Twp. near Lafayette. She was raised in a very strict home by her mother and father. Mary attended two one-room country schools, Halltown and Fieldstown, before attending Lafavette School. She graduated from Lafayette-Jackson High School in 1937. She was one of 28 students and she was the salutatorian. When she was 17 years old she was hired to work in a 5 and 10 cent store, but was fired after only one day because she was not yet 18!

She met her future husband, Weldon LaRue, when they both attended a family reunion at the same park. Weldon was 4 years older than Mary and they married on June 19, 1938. They moved to an apartment on Catalpa Ave. in Lima and paid \$15 a month in rent. Weldon got a job at a hamburger shop and was paid \$15 per week. After he left the hamburger shop, Weldon began working for the state highway department. He and Mary had 1 son, Ron, and 3 daughters, Myrna, Carol, and Elaine.

They started their own greenhouse in Elida, known as LaRue's Flowers and Greenhouse. They first sold only vegetables and then added flowers. Myrna and Elaine worked with the flowers and Carol took care of the books along with their niece, Lois Cook. Mary and the girls eventually did the flowers for many weddings, often busy with the weddings on the weekends. They had LaRue's Flowers and Greenhouse for 55 years.

Mary said just getting away from their business whenever they could was a vacation for them. They traveled to Florida and did a lot of camping in Tennessee, Kentucky and New York state. Weldon passed away in 2007, 10 days before their 69th wedding anniversary. Mary now lives at Elmcroft of Lima, but you can find her in the last pew on the left almost every Sunday.

Megan Bible came to St. Paul's in high school at the invitation of Jenni Theodore. Megan grew into a deep commitment with God and was part of our youth group as well as Trinity UMC. She was an active leader in the Chrysalis program, the student version of "Walk to Emmaus" program. Her mother, Karen's attendance with us, also blessed us as a church.

Megan moved to The Ohio State University campus where she followed her mother's vocation, and studied art education. She was a Residence Assistant for four years at OSU. On graduation, she became a middle school art teacher at London, Ohio, schools. During that time she continued her faith journey at Rock City Church, Hilliard, OH, with her finance, Sergio Tostado.

Two years ago, Megan was diagnosed with cancer and underwent various treatments. She continued to be active at church and school, with running and enjoying life. 


Enjoy this healthy apple snack after a busy day of learning.
