

Consecration Sunday Is Coming

Congregations that approach financial stewardship from a biblical perspective do not view the money Christians give to their church merely as a way to pay its bills. Rather, such congregations see financial contributions as a way to help people grow spiritually in their relationship with God by supporting their church's mission and ministry with a percentage of their incomes. Our congregation's finance committee has selected the *New Consecration Sunday Stewardship Program* as a way to teach the biblical and spiritual principles of generous giving in our stewardship education emphasis this year.

New Consecration Sunday is based on the biblical philosophy of the need of the giver to give for his or her own spiritual development, rather than on the need of the church to receive. Instead of treating people like members of a social club who should pay dues, we will treat people like followers of Jesus Christ who want to give unselfishly as an act of discipleship. New Consecration Sunday encourages people toward proportionate and systematic giving in response to the question, "What percentage of my income is God calling me to give?"

During morning worship on Consecration Sunday, November 22, we are asking our attendees and members to make their financial commitments to our church's missionary, benevolent, and educational ministries in this community and around the world. Every attendee and member who completes an *Estimate of Giving Card* does so voluntarily by attending morning worship on Consecration Sunday. We urge people to attend who feel strongly opposed to completing a card. The procedure is done in such a way that no one feels personal embarrassment if he or she chooses not to fill out a card.


We will do no home solicitation to ask people to complete cards. During morning worship our guest leader, District Superintendent Rev. Steve Bennett, will conduct a brief period of instruction and inspiration, climaxed by members making their commitments as a confidential act of worship.

We will encourage participation in Consecration Sunday events through the Consecration Sunday team and governing board members. Since we will make no follow-up visits to ask people to complete their cards, we will make every effort to inform, inspire, and commit everyone to attend Consecration Sunday worship.

Thanks in advance for your enthusiastic participation in Consecration Sunday events.



Scripture Based



End of the World

"It's the end of the world as we know it," sang R.E.M. a few years back. Skeeter Davis sang a song of the same title a generation ago. But is it really?

Each year the Gospel readings at the end of the Season after Pentecost tend to come from some of the apocalyptic or end of the world sayings of Jesus. Sadly, they often get misinterpreted.

It seems that many people in this day and age get excited about the prospect of the world ending soon. Maybe because the state of the world often seems depressing and hopeless – wars, epidemics, people not caring about the environment – we would like to escape.

However, to say that the Bible speaks about us, even though it was written several thousand years ago, is dangerous at best. At the same time the Bible clearly speaks to us.

In Mark 13 Jesus talks quite extensively about the end of

the world. In that process, he tells the disciples quite clearly that there will be many things that happen prior to this. He even goes so far as to say that even Jesus himself does not know the date and time (Mk 13:32). Why should we?

Instead of being concerned with the end of the world, Jesus seems more concerned with how we live in the meantime. If we try to do the will of God and follow the path of Christ, does it really matter when it all comes to conclusion?

Ruth

The book of Ruth appears in several versions of the lectionary for November 1st and 8th. While the entire book is not read, the beginning and ending are, and in such a way that the middle of the story is pretty much implied.

It is an intriguing story. Many scholars believe the story was written at a time in the 9th century BCE when there was a great deal of racism against the Moabites. In this particular story, Ruth, a Moabite, is painted as the heroine of the story and thus it reminds people that the ancestor of the great King David was one of these disliked people. The

story becomes a reminder, then, that there really is no place for racism among the people of God.

Ruth offers to stay with her mother-in-law Naomi and to care for her. This enables Naomi to remain a member of society, rather than become an outcast. In the process, Ruth carefully captures the attention of Boaz and marries him. They have a child named Obed whose grandson is King David.

The gentle and subtle reminder shines through: all people can be good and all people can be used by God for the greater good of the community. We do well to remember this simple truth today. Rather than leap to judgment and a desire to cast people out, God challenges us to be always welcoming, recognizing not the differences but the similarities in all the people of the world. No easy task, perhaps, but one that has resounding positive effects on everyone.



Celebrating...

A Jesse Tree

Happy new year! That's right, the church year begins at the end of November with the start of the season of Advent. In the West this year Advent begins November 29th because it is the fourth Sunday before Christmas. In the Orthodox churches, Advent begins of the feast of St. Martin on November 11. Either way, it is a special season to help us get ready for the celebration of Jesus' birth at Christmas.

There are many traditions connected with Advent. Probably the most familiar is the *Advent wreath* with its four candles, one of which is lit each week during the season. Often a central candle represents Jesus, the Light of the World, and is lit on Christmas Eve.

Another important Advent symbol is a Jesse Tree. Jesse was the father of King David and in ancient times was seen as the first real ancestor of Jesus. We know from the Bible that there are, of course, many women and men who came long before Jesse, but the name for the tree has stuck. An important Bible verse for Advent makes the connection between Jesse and Jesus: "A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots" (Isa 11:1). Many people think this refers to Jesus.

Traditionally, an ornament is placed on the tree each day of the season, which would involve 25 ornaments starting November 29.

On December 24th you hang an ornament of the baby Jesus on the top of the tree.

You can use any kind of tree for a Jesse Tree: regular Christmas tree (if you are going to use the tree for the whole season you will probably want an artificial one); a tree made from nailing some small dead branches together; or even a tree drawn on a large sheet of paper and placed on the wall.

Here are some ways to make ornaments:

- Traditional ornaments are white (although they do not have to be). You could cut these out of thin styrofoam or heavy white cardboard. You could also use corrugated cardboard and paint it white.
- Look for some images from old Christmas cards. Often you can cut out a symbol, such as a star, angel, manger, Mary, Joseph, Bethlehem, the magi, their gifts, and other things.
- Use some of the ornaments you would normally hang up at Christmas, such as a globe, star, flower, bird, etcetera.

Here are some traditional Jesse tree symbols and scripture verses that go with them:

Globe – it symbolizes creation and affirms that everything God made is good (Gen 1—2)

Altar – to represent Abraham's sacrifice (Gen 22)

Stairway or ladder – to represent Jacob (Gen 28:10-22)

Stone tablets - with the Ten

Commandments (Ex 20:1-17)

Star of David – six-pointed star such as on the Israeli flag (1 Sam 16:1-13)

Symbols of joy – balloon, streamers, or other symbols to represent the joy of the season or that of Elizabeth and Zechariah (Lk 1:5-25)

Angel – the Bible has lots of stories of angels, especially in the story of Joseph (Mt 1:18-25)

Mary – picture or drawing (Lk 1:26-38)

Ark and Rainbow – symbolize God's faithfulness and care for humanity even in the face of human disobedience and God's promise to sustain the creation forever (Gen 9:8-17)

Key People in Jesus' genealogy – there are many women and men listed in Matthew 1:1-17. (Look them up in the Bible, choose some, and think of a symbol for each of them).

Joseph's Coat of Many Colors – symbolizes God's care of the chosen people, the Hebrews and the sustaining of the Messianic covenant (Gen 37:3)

Ten Commandments – shows us God's will and instruction on how to live (Ex 20:3-17)

Horn of Oil – symbolizes Samuel and the oil he used to anoint David as King (1 Sam 16:1-13)

Crown – symbolizes King David, son of Jesse and an ancestor of Jesus.

Temple - symbolizes King Solomon, David's son,





Working in batches, dip ravioli in the Store-bought bite-size cheese 1 cup buttermilk to coat completely, allowing the excess buttermilk to ravioli (about 24) or preferred drip back into the bowl. 
