





Missions Fall Report

Thank-you letters were received for our donations to **Meals 'til Monday** and to the **Brad Joseph Memorial Golf Outing.** John Fleming reported that \$3,810 was raised this year to bring the six year total to \$24,856 in the **Brad Joseph Memorial Scholarship Fund**. St. Paul's donated \$270.81 and a member of our church was a hole-sponsor.

Six individuals from St. Paul's helped serve at Our Daily Bread Soup Kitchen on August 30th. Thank you to Deb Hurd, Margie Best, Mary Williams, Lavonne Segovia and Shara and Dennis Bowsher for serving those in need.

Thank you to those individuals who provided food and helped with the **LAMM breakfast** on September 7th at St. Paul's. Your help made the breakfast a memorable day for those attending. **Joe Earl**, Executive Director of **Meals 'til Monday**, gave an excellent presentation about **Meals 'til Monday** and the LAMM group made a donation of \$150 to **Meals 'til Monday**.

The first two weekend mission trips to Camp Wesley have been completed with all four porches, steps and railings on the dining hall being replaced or repaired. We are planning to go back to Camp Wesley on Saturday, September 21st to work one day on the trail around the lake and to rebuild a footbridge that collapsed. Everyone is welcome to come and help. In 2013, St. Paul's collected \$2,171 for Camp Wesley and for camp meals.

Jesus said to "feed my sheep." Donations of food for **the Five Loaves Food Pantry** continues to be strong with St. Paul's individuals faithfully filling the food bins every month. The next **Food Pantry Sunday** is **October 13**th. Thank you to all who donate food to feed those in need in our Elida community.

The coins-for-communion collection in *July* went to the **Brad Joseph Memorial Fund** in the amount of \$170.81. In *August*, the coins-for-communion collection went to **Meals-'til-Monday** in the amount of \$91.21. The coins-for-communion collection in *September* in the amount of \$87.18 went to the **Samaritan House**. The coins-for-communion collection in *October* will be for **Family Promise of Lima**.

Collections for **health and school kits** began in August and went through **September 15th**. A list of needed items appeared in the August newsletter and in the bulletins. Maedene and her army of helpers will check out the kits during the week of September 15th so the kits may be delivered by September 21st by Pastor Paul for the West Ohio Conference's **Festival of Sharing** to be held at Otterbein College on September 28th.

The next collection for \$5 on the Fifth to benefit the United Methodist Children's Home Family Services will be on Sunday, September 29th. Support of this program to help children in foster homes remains strong. UMCH Family Services is asking that each member of our congregation give \$5 every fifth Sunday to serve the children.

Meals 'til Monday will host a 5K and ½ marathon called "Keeping Hunger On the Run" on Saturday, October 26, 2013, at 9 AM, starting and finishing at Elida Elementary School. See flyer on Missions bulletin board if you are interested in participating or helping.

At *Halloween* we plan on asking for volunteers to help handout free coffee to parents and hot chocolate to *Trick-or-Treat* children in front of our church. Possibly we will also give out pencils with St. Paul's name on it.

At least one person at St. Paul's plans on going to **Haiti** with **Living Waters International** yet this year to help repair wells. With 9.7 million people, Haiti has no centralized water system. The trip will cost around \$1,800 per person.

Haiti Mission Trip

Jamie Wyant will be going on a mission trip to Haiti at the end of October with Living Waters International to help repair water wells. With 9.7 million people, Haiti has no centralized water system so thousands of wells supply clean, safe water to many people. At any one time, up to one-third of the wells are broken and need repair by volunteers from Living Waters International. The trip will cost around \$1,800 per person. Our St. Paul's Mission Fund is almost depleted so we are asking that individuals wanting to help fund this mission to put donations in a pew envelope and mark it for "Haiti Mission Fund". Your donations, thoughts and prayers for Jamie will be extremely appreciated.


Thank You to everyone who donated School and Health kits. We had a record number of kits donated this year.

The Lima Public Library has opened a new Teen Spot Lounge. The lounge was designed and created by **Steve Moser**, Teen Librarian, and Jackson Donley, Teen Advisory Group Member. The project was spearheaded by **Jackson Donley** as his Eagle Scout Project during the summer of 2013. The lounge provides a safe place for teens to come hang out with friends, use computers, play video or board games, and create arts and crafts projects. This new space was funded through grants and donations from our community. The work was completed using volunteers who provided well over 300 hours of service. The Teen Spot Lounge officially opened on Thursday, August 29, 2013.

One Out of Ten



On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going between through the region Samaria Galilee" (Lk 17:11). The Talmud refers to Galilee as "Galilee of the Gentiles." Galilee had been part of Israel - the northern kingdom that was invaded by the Assyrians in 722 BC. Its people had been scattered; those that remained had intermarried with Gentiles. In spite of the beauty of Galilee, the people of Jerusalem and the south looked down on it because in their view, it was unclean and contaminated. The Samaritans were even worse than the Galileans. They followed only the five books of Moses and rejected the writings of the prophets. They worshiped on Mt. Gerizim rather than at the temple on Mt. Zion. They, too, had intermarried with Gentiles.

But this was the neighborhood in which Jesus liked to spend his time. He seems to have loved the beautiful region of the Galilee with its high hills and blue lakes. Although a devout Jew, Jesus welcomed into his fellowship Samaritans and Gentiles, thieves and prostitutes, those who were crippled and leprous.

As Jesus made his long, slow, tragic journey toward crucifixion in Jerusalem, he passed along between Galilee and Samaria. Spying Jesus, who by now had a reputation as a wandering miracle worker, a group of lepers called out, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!" A poignant request - not "heal us" but simply "have mercy."

What did Jesus do? First, he was careful to keep his distance - no sense in risking ritual uncleanness.

After all, he was planning to attend Passover services at the temple when he arrived in Jerusalem. Then, he asked whether they were Jews, or Gentiles, or Samaritans. If they were Jews he would certainly heal them; if they were the right kind of Gentiles he might heal them; if they were Samaritans he would tell them to get lost. Finally, Jesus asked what kind of medical insurance they had - can't heal everybody. Pretty soon Jesus wouldn't have time for himself!

Of course, that's not what happened. The text says that the men with leprosy kept their distance from Jesus, not that Jesus kept his distance from them. Jesus made no inquiry about their ethnic or religious background, and, of course, he did not heal for money.

What is wrong with this picture? Jesus was in the wrong place - between "Galilee of the Gentiles" and Samaria. He was dealing with the wrong people - lepers.

Without any inquiry or demand, Jesus healed them and sent them off to a priest so that they could be certified as clean and once again take their place in society. The men did just as Jesus said; all except one Samaritan. Instead of going to a priest, he returned to Jesus, fell at his feet, and thanked him. The other nine did nothing wrong; they carried out Jesus' command to the letter. But only the Samaritan went beyond the literal command and followed a higher law.

We are a lot like the nine lepers. We have a great deal to be thankful for, but how often do we really show our gratitude? Even on the worst of days, we have blood coursing through our veins and air to fill our lungs. The blue sky is full of white clouds and a bright sun warms us and gives us light. We have purpose, and above all, there is God who created us, sustains us, and loves us, who came among us as one of us, who showed us that we are not alone in our deepest pain and suffering, and who promises to raise us from death to life eternal.

The one leper, the "foreigner," who returned to give thanks had made a breakthrough. Nine lepers were made clean, but the tenth was made whole. Or as William Willimon put it, "Nine lepers got healed; one got saved."



Double-Dipped Gourmet Caramel Apples By Mary Steiner **Ingredients Instructions** 4 or 5 Medium apples Wash and dry apples; insert stick into stem end of each apple. Kraft caramels, divided 2 pkgs. Microwave 1 pkg. of caramels and 2Tbl. of water on high 2 1/2 to 3 1/2 minutes until smooth, stirring every minute. 4 Tbl. Water, divided Dip apples into hot caramel sauce; turn until coated. Scrape Wooden sticks excess sauce from bottom of apples. Place on greased wax paper. Refrigerate 1 to 2 hrs. After refrigerating, repeat microwaving and dipping directions with remaining caramels and water for second caramel layer. Refrigerate 1 to 2 hrs; decorate as desired after refrigeration. Store in refrigerator. Let stand at room temperature 15 min. before serving.





## **Living Our Faith**

#### Who Brews the Coffee?
