






October 30, 2014 Trick or Treat in Elida

The Business of Church



For eight months ending August 31, 2014, our checking account balance was \$91,530 compared to \$65,122 at August 31, 2013. The General Operating Fund at the end of August, 2014 was \$57,675 compared to \$46,195 at August 31, 2013. The Memorial Fund balance has remained steady at \$2,397 today vs. \$2,343 one year ago. Building Fund II stands at \$21,573 up considerably from last year following our mortgage pay-off and a balance of \$4,907. New in 2014 is a seed/emergency fund which represents 40% of Building Fund contributions. At the end of every month, our Treasurer Margie Best transfers 40% of the

monthly Building Fund contributions into a separate balance sheet line item. At August 31, 2014, this fund carries a balance of \$2,181. Our Permanent Endowment Fund (restricted) matured recently and was reinvested into same CDs and, with accrued interest, now stands at \$14,576.

You remained faithful givers over the summer months as income over expenses were +\$6,879 for August, 2014 (+\$1,131 August, 2013) and +\$10,771.60 Year-to-Date (+\$12,624 last year at 8/31). During August, we received an anonymous unrestricted gift to our General Operating Fund of \$3,000.

The Board of Trustees has engaged in the following projects thus far in 2014:

- \Rightarrow New carpet in the main sanctuary.
- ⇒ Painted stairs in the Education wing; painted west fire escape off peanut gallery; painted outside moldings/frames of west-side stained glass windows.
- \Rightarrow Sealed new east-side parking lot and alley.
- \Rightarrow Installed new water line into Parsonage and new water service and misc. plumbing upgrades in the church building.
- \Rightarrow Purchased two new air conditioners for the Education wing and cleaned out the old basement.
- \Rightarrow Replaced damaged ceiling tiles in the new library and inefficient hallway lights in the Education wing.
- \Rightarrow Purchased new dishwasher for Parsonage.

This activity expended \$5,485 of the \$12,000 budgeted for Capital Expenditures; Parsonage Maintenance; and Building/Equipment/Maintenance Repairs.

Proposed for the remainder of 2014:

- New audio/visual storage cabinet sanctuary peanut gallery area.
- New cabinet island, fellowship hall kitchen.
- Down spouts and sump pump all tied into main drain Parsonage.
- West lawn re-grade area immediately adjacent to sidewalk where former Parsonage stood for easier lawn mowing and snow removal.
- New windows in Parsonage basement.
- Repair drywall in new library area and main entrance area.

Our Strategic Initiatives of Caring for the Elderly and support for the community E.A.S.Y. Program have substantial financial support as do all of our program ministries including Education, Music, Nurture, PPR, Worship, and in-house Youth Ministries. All are within budget and on-target to meet their respective goals for 2014. What these efforts could use, however, are more human resources to make a difference in our community. Being good stewards of our money is challenging and requires substantial effort to spend and invest wisely. Please give freely of your time and talents when the Nominations Committee knocks on your soul this fall.

Creatures from the Wild and playing video games are Channing's hobbies, so in his spare time he plays a lot of video games.



Plant A Tree, etc.



The renowned reformer Martin Luther is quoted as saying, "Even if I knew that tomorrow the world would go to pieces, I would still plant my apple tree."

In Jeremiah 32:6-15 we read of Jeremiah buying a field. This wouldn't be too consequential except for the fact that Jeremiah knew the pending realities: Judah would be overrun by foreigners and the people would be sent into exile. Yet, Jeremiah invests in the future.

How many of us would have that kind of faith or courage? Jeremiah provides us with a wonderful example - as does Martin Luther several centuries later. Even if we knew tragedy and difficulty were coming, we are challenged still to trust in, and invest in, the future God has promised. May we never be afraid to plant a tree.

Four Comfortable Words

Several years ago I was at a conference. During our time together we read several weeks of lectionary texts. One person began to read

lectionary texts. One person began to read 1 Timothy 1:12-17. When they got to verse 15, several of us joined in - in good King James English - to recite the words along with the reader: "This is a true saying, and worthy of all . . . to be received, that Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners."

We - that is, the ones who had joined in quickly realized we had grown up in the Anglican or Episcopal church.

In the older days of that tradition a part of the communion service was known as the "Four Comfortable Words," one of which was 1 Timothy 1:15. The other three are Matthew 11:28 ("Come unto me all that labor and are heavy-laden and I will refresh you"); John 3:16 ("God so loved the world, that he gave his only-begotten Son, to the end that all that believe in him should not perish, but have eternal life"); and 1 John 2:1-2 ("If any[one] sin, we have an Advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous, and he is the propitiation for our sins").

As a youngster I was confused by the word propitiation, although I have since had it explained to me as the "act of gaining another's good will." In other words the image is of Jesus, as an advocate, speaking to God on our behalf, and gaining God's good favor for us.

I had not thought of these verses for many years, yet was intrigued the way they came

flooding back. Since then, I have tried on a regular basis to think of other biblical verses that have found a place in my lasting memory. What "comfortable words" do you lean on?



Compassion

Do you ever think about the word compassion? It may come from the Latin for "to suffer with" or "to walk with." The Bible calls us to be compassionate to join one another in suffering and to join one another in the journey of life. We share together and are at one with each other in joys and in suffering.

Kenneth Carder, Duke Divinity School professor and retired United Methodist bishop writes: "Christian discipleship requires being held in love and being held accountable. We simply cannot follow Christ apart from a community that holds us in compassion and calls us to accountability. Solitary discipleship is a misnomer. We cannot be Christian alone."

Pay attention to the ways God may be calling you to show compassion and receive the love and care of others.

Living Our Faith

Praying Our Questions

In my own spiritual journey, and in accompanying the spiritual journey of others, I have found questions to be the single most important tool for the journey. And I have also found how much we prefer answers!

A good question, allowed to deepen and be held prayerfully before God for some time, yields amazing discoveries. Questions take us somewhere. They move us out of the familiar and allow new insights and possibilities to present themselves.

God bless those who question God, their faith, and the church! Without them we would never have inherited the faith and the church that we often subconsciously think has "always been like this."

Jesus asked many questions "What do you want me to do for you?" "Will you lay down your life for me?" "Do you want to be made well?" "What are you looking for?" "Do you love me?" The whole thrust of Jesus' ministry was to stir up people's minds and spirits, to kindle their imagination, to invite a new way of seeing and doing things. Conversion to the new is a

lifelong process, curiosity and questioning gets us to turn around and search. Praying our questions has to do with naming them before God, and taking time to look at them, to deepen them, to find the deeper questions that emerge, and to watch and wait. To have the humility not to know. To be open. In time a response presents itself. It may come in the form of an insight, a feeling, an event, or the experience of suddenly seeing things in a new way.

Let your questions take you somewhere. Don't be shy, or worry that you should have a strong faith that is never shaken. There is much about God that is always beyond our capacity to contain in words or ways of doing things, and the way we "do" church now is not how it's always been or how it's intended to stay forever. So, take courage, and embrace the questions.
