






Brad Joseph Golf Outing





On August 3, 4, and 5, St. Paul's continued its summer mission work in this same 241 Harrison St. area (east Lima) with the construction of two handicap ramps. Work commenced about 5 p.m. each evening although Jamie Wyant purchased all building materials, performed some preliminary deckwork, and loaded the materials and preliminary decking into his work trailer for transport to the jobsites prior to 5 p.m. each evening.

Work on the first ramp didn't beat sundown and, despite some work August 3 under the lights, was competed August 4. The second ramp, which included three boardwalks, ended successfully after about five hours each evening on August 4 & 5.

Many thanks to Steve Sdao, Jamie Wyant, Dennis & Shara Bowsher, Larry Moser, Jeff Gast & Lindsay Foust (I.U.M.), and Marty White for their efforts with this particular project. Funding for this work was through St. Paul's and outside sources.

Larry & Shirley Moser, Don Chaffins, and Gene Craft were the St. Paul's foursome in this year's Brad Joseph Memorial Golf Outing at Colonial Golfers Club near Allen East on July 23. Dan Best, Norm Grigsby, and Tim Piper assisted with Outing Operations as volunteer workers from St. Paul's. Brad's Uncle John Fleming made a presentation to our congregation prior to Sunday service June 5. St. Paul's also sponsored a hole for \$100. Coins for Communion July 3, 2011, netted \$139.38 for the outing, too.

Apple Bread


Traditional Amish Recipe

Ingredients		Instructions
1 1/2 cup	flour	In medium bowl, mix together dry ingredients.
1/4 cup	sugar	Stir in apples. Set aside.
2 tsp.	baking powder	In small bowl, combine milk, oil, and egg until blended.
1/2 tsp.	cinnamon	In sman bowi, comonie mink, on, and egg until blended.
1/4 tsp.	salt	Add to dry ingredients; stir just until moistened.
1/8 tsp.	nutmeg	Pour into greased loaf pan.
1 cup	apples, shredded	Bake at 350 degrees for 45-50 minutes.
1/2 cup	milk	
1/4 cup	vegetable oil	
1	egg, beaten

Ingredients		Traditional Amish Recipe Instructions
3-4 cups	diced apples	Beat egg; add flour and vinegar to egg and mix well.
3 cups	mini marshmallows	Drain pineapple and save juice. Add juice and sugar to egg
1 1/2 cups	salted peanuts	mixture and mix well.
8 oz.	Cool Whip	Heat over low heat until "gravy-like" thick.
20 oz. can	crushed pineapple	Cool mixture. Then add Cool Whip, mixing it in well.
1 Tbl.	flour	
1/2 Tbl.	vinegar	Add apples, pineapple, marshmallows, and peanuts. Mix well.
1/2 cup	sugar	Refrigerate overnight.

Living Our Faith

Exodus –

The Story of the Way Out

During August and September this year many churches read from the book of Exodus, which contains some of the Bible's oldest stories. We meet Moses. He was born as a Hebrew slave, but through a surprising twist of fate, he was raised by the Princess of Egypt! You can read about this in Exodus 1:8-2:10. What do you think it might have been like to be young Moses?

When Moses grew up, he was troubled by the way the

Egyptians oppressed the Hebrew people, and this got him into some trouble that forced him to run away. You can read what happened next in Exodus 3:1-15. If you were Moses, what do you think you might be feeling as you saw the burning bush and heard God speak to you?

God asked Moses to do something that was very difficult. God wanted Moses to go to Pharaoh, the most powerful person in the world, and demand the freedom of the Hebrew people. Moses didn't think he was the right person for the job, but God let Moses know that he wasn't going alone. It was not through Moses' power and might that the people would be reed – but through God's power and might.

And so, in God's name, Moses and his brother Aaron went to Pharaoh. Read Exodus 7:14-10:29 to learn about the nine plagues experienced by Pharaoh and the people of Egypt. Which plague would have been the worst for you to experience? Which plague do you think was the most awesome, showing God's power?
