

Lay Leadership (Nominations) Committee has already met and has nearly completed their section of the work. Hopefully the rest of the information will come together smoothly and we will be ready for another exciting year of following God in becoming the church God wants us to be.

Thanks for trusting and following me on this Journey. I look forward with anticipation to what God has in store for St. Paul's United Methodist Church and the Elida Community.





JOIN US FOR OUR MORTGAGE BURNING CELEBRATION SEPTEMBER 29

It all began with 'dots'.....and with faith.

'For I tell you, if you have faith the size of a mustard seed, you will say to this mountain, 'Move from here to there,' and it will move; and nothing will be impossible for you' Matthew 17:20

Back when St. Paul's mission work included building ramps and refurbishing roofs, project leader Jamie Wyant scheduled such events without a clue as to who would show up at the appointed time and place. 'Why do you do that?' I asked him. 'Have faith' was his reply. And when the last shingle was nailed into place or the last board screwed onto the ramp's framing, I asked myself, 'How does he do that?', or perhaps 'How does *He* do that?' Faith at work.

THE ULTIMATE SHOW OF FAITH

By 2004-2005, our basement area could no longer sustain band-aid repairs and we were throwing good money after bad at it. The cumulative effect of years of basement flooding was quite evident in the grand room and kitchen areas. There was no handicap accessibility to the basement area either. The St. Paul's Board of Trustees and Finance Committee decided we needed a serious plan for refurbishing the basement area along with long-range plans for implementing physical improvements to other areas of the church. In 2005, we held 'Dot Sunday' – a formal process of polling our parishioners for priority rankings in the areas of Worship, Programs, Outreach/Missions, and Physical Plant as to fill a vision for St. Paul's to be a thriving church body in creating disciples for Christ.

Following eight months of meetings, planning, drawing, re-drawing, estimating, and re-estimating by a 16-member Ad Hoc Committee for St. Paul's Family Building Campaign, September 2006 was themed 'Standing on the Promises, Building on the Premises'. Along with a 'Catch the Spirit'-themed celebration by members of the Christian Education Department, Sundays during September 2006 were filled with presentations describing the results of the Ad Hoc Committee's work, how it was to be implemented, and how it was to be funded. The goal of the Committee was 'to be good stewards of St. Paul's finances and resources.' Ultimately, in terms of Physical Plant, the fellowship hall and kitchen areas were refurbished and an elevette installed between the basement and sanctuary levels of the church beginning 2007. In addition to upfront donations, a mortgage of \$140,000 was secured to finance this particular project amortized over seven years. However, as a show of faith, Building Fund commitments were only taken for five years.

FAITH TESTED AGAIN

During 2010, the chimney to our boiler was crumbling and repairs could no longer be delayed. In 2007, we only used \$123,500 of the available \$140,000 mortgage (basement) loan leaving \$16,500 of approved funding available toward the \$20,000 chimney repair bill. The Finance Committee and Board of Trustees went before the congregation with a proposal to utilize the available \$16,500 plus ask for immediate pledges of \$3,500 to fund this emergency project. Part of their proposal was to extend an individual's initial Building Fund commitment from five years to seven years. Year One was 2007, Year Seven is 2013.

WE DID IT/FAITH REWARDED

The mountain moved from here to there! During July, 2013, the final mortgage loan installment was paid. Let it be known, however, that as we sowed and reaped, we also were the beneficiaries of a most generous donation to the Building Fund earlier this year by an anonymous donor in the amount of \$10,000. We are truly blessed and God's grace and mercy have shone brightly upon St. Paul's Elida.

A pledge is a commitment. As stated, we are in Year Seven of 'Standing on the Promises, Building on the Premises.' Please honor your Year Seven Building Fund Pledge. We have annual General Operating budget line items for Building/Equip./Maint. and Capital Expenditures but our budget is not totally funded. Presently, bell tower tuck pointing is in progress. This work and repairs to the Narthex/Library and front-entrance way walls will deplete most of said line items for 2013. The north parking lot sealer and striping project account for another portion of this year's Trustees' spending.

Please make plans to join us for our September 29 mortgage burning celebration immediately after our worship service.

Chocolate Cake

Bv	Corini	ne Pi	per

Ingredients		
1 3/4 cup	All purpose flour	
2 cups	Sugar	
3/4 cup	Cocoa powder	
2 tsp.	Baking soda	
1 tsp.	Baking powder	
1 tsp.	Salt	
2	Eggs	
1 cup	Strong black coffee, cooled	
1 cup	Buttermilk	
1/2 cup	Vegetable oil	
1 tsp.	Real vanilla extract	

Combine flour, sugar, cocoa, baking soda, baking powder, and salt in a large mixing bowl or stand mixer.

Add eggs, coffee, buttermilk, oil, and vanilla. Beat at medium speed for 2 minutes. Batter will be thin.

Pour batter into greased and floured 9x13 pan or two 9 in. cake pans. Bake at 350 degrees for 35-40 min. for 9x13 pan; 30-35 min. for 2 pans. Combine frosting ingredients and mix with hand or stand mixer. Spread on cooled cake.

Frosting:

1/2 cup margarine, softened 2 oz. melted unsweetened chocolate, cooled 3 cups powdered sugar

3 Tbl. milk

2 tsp. real vanilla extract

1 pkg.	Instant vanilla pudding	Add 1/2 cup cool whip to the chocolate pudding mixture.
1 8 oz.	Cool whip	Add peanut butter to the vanilla pudding mixture.
1 pkg.	Chocolate chip cookies (use the hard ones)	Layer as follows: *Chocolate pudding mixture
2 cups	Milk	*1/2 of cool whip *1/2 the cookies (crumbled)


